The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz.:-

REGULATIONS FOR THE RECRUITMENT OF EXPERIMENTAL OFFICERS AND ASSISTANT EXPERIMENTAL OFFICERS IN VARIOUS GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS.

1. Both men and women may compete.

2. Age.

For the Experimental Officer grade candidates must be at least 26 years and under 31 years of age on 31st December, 1958.

Candidates for the Assistant Experimental Officer grade must be at least 18 years and under 28 years of age on 31st December, 1958. But

(i) For each grade a candidate who has served or is serving on a regular (including a regular short-service) engagement in H.M. Forces or is or has been a member of H.M. Overseas Civil Service may for this purpose deduct from his actual age the period of such service rendered before 31st December, 1958.

(ii) Candidates who, at the time of application hold a permanent appointment in the Assistant (Scientific) Class and who are at least 28 and under 31 on 31st December, 1958, may be admitted to the Assistant Experimental Officer grade competition.

(iii) The Commissioners may exceptionally, at their discretion, waive the maximum age limit for the Experimental Officer grade in favour of a candidate who has special qualifications or experience.

3. Nationality.

(1) To be eligible for appointment (other than to a situation in the Admiralty, War Office, Air Ministry or Ministry of Supply) a candidate must be a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic and in addition satisfy one of the following conditions:-

(a) if he was a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic at birth—

(i) at least one of his parents must be, or have been at death, a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic, or

(ii) the candidate must have resided in a country or territory within the Commonwealth or in the Irish Republic or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown or partly have so resided and partly been so employed for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of his appointment;

(b) if he was not a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic at birth, he must have resided in a country or territory within the Commonwealth or in the Irish Republic or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown or partly have so resided and partly been so employed for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of his appointment;

(c) if not qualified under sub-paragraph (a) or sub-paragraph (b) of this paragraph, he must satisfy the Commissioners that he is so closely connected with a country or territory within the Commonwealth either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in his favour.

(2) A candidate will not be eligible for appointment to a situation in the Admiralty, War Office, Air Ministry or Ministry of Supply unless (i) at all times since his birth he has been either a British subject or a citizen of the Irish Republic and (ii) he was born in a country or territory which is (or then was) within the Commonwealth or in the Irish Republic and (iii) each of his parents was born in a country or territory which is (or then was) within the Commonwealth or in the Irish Republic and is or was at death a British subject or a citizen of the Irish Republic and has or had been one or the other at all times from birth;

Provided that, notwithstanding that the aforesaid conditions are not satisfied, he may, if the conditions specified in paragraph (1) of this Regulation are satisfied, be admitted to appointment by special permission of the First Lord of the Admiralty, Secretary of State for War, Secretary of State for Air, or Minister of Supply, as the case may be.

4. Qualification.

Normally every candidate must be in possession of one of the undermentioned qualifications:-

(a) The Higher School Certificate with Mathematics or a science subject as a principal subject, or an equivalent qualification.

(b) A General Certificate of Education in five subjects at the levels shown in brackets:-

(i) English language (Ordinary)

(ii) Two mathematical or scientific subjects (Advanced)

(iii) Mathematics (Ordinary), if no mathematical subject is offered in (ii)—except in the case of candidates who offer two biological subjects (Advanced) in (ii)

(iv) A scientific subject (Ordinary) if no scientific subject is offered in (ii)

(v) Balance of one or two subjects (Ordinary) at candidates' choice.

Passes in the Intermediate B.Sc. Examination will be accepted in lieu of Advanced level passes.

To assist candidates during the change-over period they will be admitted to this competition if they already possess a School Certificate and in addition obtain passes at the General Certificate of Education examination in two mathematical or scientific subjects at Advanced level.

(c) The Scottish Leaving Certificate with passes in five subjects, of which one must be English. Three of the passes must be on the higher grade; one of the higher grade passes must be mathematics and another must be science. Passes at the Scottish Universities Preliminary Examination will be accepted as equivalent to passes in the Scottish Leaving Certificate.

A pass on the higher grade in English or a second pass on the higher grade in science whether gained at the Scottish Leaving Certificate Examination or the Scottish Universities Preliminary Examination will be accepted as the equivalent of a pass in two subjects on the lower grade if the Scottish Education Department certifies that the appropriate standard was reached in both papers set in the subjects concerned.

Scottish candidates who do not hold the requisite number of passes in the Scottish Leaving Certificate Examination or the Scottish Universities Preliminary Examination may, in appropriate circumstances, offer instead a Certificate of equivalent qualifications based on their results in either or both of these examinations.

(Applications for Certificates, including those which relate to performance in the Scottish Universities Preliminary Examination, should be made to the Secretary, Scottish Education Department (Examinations Branch), Government Buildings, Broomhouse Drive, Saughton, Edinburgh, 11, quoting S94-95/58). or

(d) The Senior Certificate of the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland showing passes in English Language; and

(i) passes in two Science subjects at Advanced level, in Mathematics at Ordinary level, and in one other subject; or

(ii) passes in one Science subject at Advanced level and in two Mathematical subjects at Advanced level and in two other subjects; or

(iii) passes in three Mathematical subjects at Advanced level and in one Science subject and in one other subject; or

(iv) a statement from the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland showing that they have attained a standard equivalent to that required by (a) or (b) above; or

(e) A university degree in a scientific or engineering subject or in Mathematics; or

(f) Graduate membership of any professional institution accepted by the Commissioners as appropriate (e.g., Institution of Civil Engineers, Institution of Mechanical Engineers, Institution of Electrical Engineers); or

(g) The Higher National Certificate; or

(h) The final certificate of a grouped course (Advanced Grade) at the City and Guilds of London Institute in Telecommunications, Metallurgy, Paint Technology or Fuel Technology.

but (i) Candidates who are not in possession of such certificate or equivalent qualifications may be admitted exceptionally by the Commissioners, at their discretion, if evidence of suitable experience on scientific research and development work can be produced; such candidates at present serving in a Government Department must forward their completed application forms to their Establishment officers who will arrange for the transmission to the Civil Service Commission of those they support.

Candidates over 22 (other than established members of the Assistant (Scientific) Class) will generally be expected to have a Pass Degree in an appropriate subject, or a technical qualification, e.g., a Higher National Certificate either in appropriate subjects or with appropriate endorsements.

5. Application.

A candidate may submit an application if he is not yet qualified under Regulation 4 but is sitting for a qualifying examination during 1958. If he is selected for interview

and found acceptable he will not be declared successful until it is known from the result of his examination that he satisfies Regulation 4.

A candidate admitted under this concession will be expected to furnish documentary evidence of the result of the examination to the Commissioners as soon as possible.

A candidate may make one, and only one, application under these Regulations during the year.

6. *Competition.*

(i) The Commissioners may at their discretion summon candidates to a preliminary informal interview.

(ii) A certain number of the candidates will be chosen on the basis of the information available, to appear before a Selection Board appointed by the Commissioners.

7. *Health and Character.*

Successful candidates must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character.

8. *Candidates Trained as Teachers.*

Candidates who have been trained as teachers in Northern Ireland or in the Irish Republic, and upon whose training public money has been spent, cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority has been notified to the Commissioners.

9. *Refund of Marriage Gratuity.*

Married women who have formerly been established civil servants and have drawn marriage gratuity (other than those who resigned compulsorily on marriage and whose resignation took effect before 15th October, 1946, or who are widowed or divorced, or who are separated from their husbands, or whose husbands suffer without hope of recovery from total physical or mental incapacity) will not be eligible unless they undertake to refund on appointment the marriage gratuity paid. Provided that this undertaking will not be required if the break between the first period of service (including any period of unestablished service immediately following the period in respect of which the gratuity was paid) and the date of re-establishment is more than seven years.

10. *Canvassing.*

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

11. *Fee.*

REGULATIONS FOR THE RECRUITMENT TO THE NATIONAL AGRICULTURAL ADVISORY SERVICE (GENERAL AGRICULTURE, HORTICULTURE, HUSBANDRY AND MACHINERY ADVISORY OFFICERS) UNDER THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE, FISHERIES AND FOOD.

1. Both men and women, including married women, may compete under these Regulations.

2. *Age.*

Candidates must on 1st August, 1958, be at least 20½ years of age for appointment to Grade IV (a) or Grade IV (b), and at least 25 years of age for appointment to Grade III. A candidate under 25 years of age on 1st August, 1958 may, however, be accepted for appointment to Grade III if he is exceptionally well qualified.

There is no upper age limit specified for this Competition, but in appointing persons in a permanent capacity Departments expect regular and effective service for a reasonable period, and the Commissioners will take this requirement into account.

3. *Nationality.*

To be eligible for appointment a candidate must be a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic and in addition satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) if he was a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic at birth—

(i) at least one of his parents must be, or have been at death, a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic, or

(c) if not qualified under sub-paragraph (a) or sub-paragraph (b) of this paragraph, he must satisfy the Commissioners that he is so closely connected with a country or territory within the Commonwealth either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in his favour.

4. *Qualifications.*

(a) Candidates for Grades III and IV must have, or obtain in 1958, a University degree in agriculture, horticulture, or the appropriate natural sciences, or engineering, or a National Diploma in appropriate subjects, or a qualification accepted by the Commissioners as of equivalent academic standard. Candidates for the Grade III post for a systematist in Horticulture must have an Honours degree in Botany. For posts in Grade IV (a) candidates must have obtained a University degree with first or second class honours in the appropriate scientific subject or an equivalent academic qualification. In addition candidates for posts in general agriculture, horticulture or husbandry must have had appropriate practical experience normally for at least one year. For posts at Experimental Husbandry Farms experience in experimental technique is an advantage.

(b) Candidates sitting for their examinations in the summer of 1958 may be admitted to this competition, but will not be appointed unless on the result of the examination they satisfy Regulation 4 (a) above.

(c) Ability to drive a motor car is necessary for almost every post in the Service, and candidates who do not hold a current driving licence are normally expected to obtain one within three months of taking appointment.

5. *Competition.*

Candidates who appear from their applications to have the best qualifications will be summoned to a Selection Board in London consisting of representatives of the Civil Service Commissioners and the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. The Selection Board will take into consideration the candidates' record of education, training and experience (with due regard to loss of opportunity and professional knowledge by those who have served in the Forces) any recommendation that they may receive from persons named by candidates as having direct knowledge of their work in the past, and the personal qualities of the candidates as shown at the interview.

The Selection Board will recommend the grade and type of work in which a successful candidate will be offered appointment, and may recommend a candidate to a grade or type of work other than that for which he has applied. If a candidate is to be interviewed solely for a grade or type of work other than that for which he has applied, he will if possible be informed before being summoned for interview.

6. *Health and Character.*

Successful candidates must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character.

7. Candidates Trained as Teachers.

Candidates who have been trained as teachers in Northern Ireland or in the Irish Republic, and upon whose training public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority has been notified to the Commissioners.

8. Refund of Marriage Gratuity.

Married women who have formerly been established civil servants and have drawn marriage gratuity (other than those who resigned compulsorily on marriage and whose resignation took effect before 15th October, 1946, or who are widowed or divorced, or who are separated from their husbands, or whose husbands suffer without hope of recovery from total physical or mental incapacity) will not be eligible for appointment under these Regulations to situations which render them eligible for pension and other benefits under the Superannuation Acts, unless they undertake to refund on appointment the marriage gratuity paid. Provided that this undertaking will not be required if the break between the first period of service (including

any period of unestablished service immediately following the period in respect of which the gratuity was paid) and the date of re-establishment is more than seven years.
