WESTMINSTER, May 2, 1825.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An act to extend the provisions of an act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty, concerning the disposition of certain real and personal property of His Majesty, his heirs, and successors.

An act to amend the laws relating to Bankrupts.

An act to make further provision for the payment of the crews of His Majesty's ships and vessels.

An act for the amendment of the law as to the offence of sending threatening letters.

An act for enabling the Glasgow gas light company to raise a further sum of money, and for other purposes relating thereto.

An act to continue and render more effectual certain acts for laying a duty of two pennies Scots, or one sixth part of a penny Sterling, on every Scots pint of ale or beer brewed for sale or vended within the town and parish of Dalkeith, for the purposes therein mentioned.

An act to enable the Royal Exchange Assurance Companies and their successors, to advance money or lend stock upon the security of freehold, copyhold, or leasehold estates.

An act for maintaining and improving the road from Deanburn, in the county of Haddington, through Greenlaw, in the county of Berwick, to Cornhill, in the county of Durham, with branches from Carfrae-mill through Lauder, from Orange-lane to Swinton-mill, and from Coldstream to Mount-Pleasant, all in the county of Berwick, and for maintaining the bridge over the River Tweed at Coldstream.

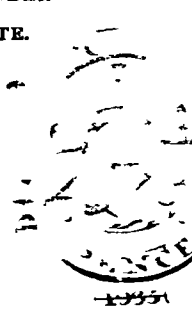
