Extract of a letter from Vice-Admiral KINGSMILL, Commander in Chief of his MAJESTY'S ships and vessels at Cork, to EVAN NEPEAN, Esq. dated Polyphemus, Cork Harbour, May 26.

Please to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that his Majesty's sloop Penguin arrived here yesterday evening from Portsmouth, and that, in her way hither, she captured a French lugger privateer; further particulars of which will be seen in the accompanying letter to me from Captain Pulling.

SIR, Penguin, Cork Harbour, May 25.
 I beg leave to inform you, that on the morning of the 24th instant, being off the Lizard with a convoy bound for this port, I fell in with and captured; after a short chace, Le Terrible French lugger privateer, of four guns and twenty-five men; out seven days from Morlaix, but had not taken any thing.

We rejoice in every circumstance that can give pleasure to the breast of our worthy and beloved Sovereign, and of our gracious Queen, in whose bosoms the tender feelings of domestic affection, and the most amiable private virtues, have ever been happily united with the patriotic regard for the welfare and best interests of their people.

In this noble alliance with a Protestant Prince, descended of the same stem with your illustrious House, and connected with the most respectable of the powers of Europe, we see with pleasure an additional security of the stability of your Majesty's throne, and of the consequent happiness of your people under the best of Governments; a constitution which has been the envy and admiration of enlightened nations, and which, it may with truth be affirmed, that all who are worthy of the blessings it bestows will join to venerate, and cordially unite to preserve.
