A PROCLAMATION,

For a Day of Solemn Fast, Humiliation, and Prayer in Scotland.

VICTORIA R.

WE, taking into Our most serious consideration, the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our trust in Almighty God that He will graciously bless Our arms, both by sea and land, have resolved, and do, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, that a Public Day of Solemn Fast, Humiliation, and Prayer, be observed throughout that part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, on Wednesday the twenty-sixth day of April instant, that so both We and Our people may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain pardon of Our sins, and in the most devout and solemn manner send up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty for imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our arms for the Restoration of Peace to Us and Our Dominions: and We do strictly charge and command, that the said day be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation.

Our will is, therefore, and We charge, that this Our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith proceed to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other places needful, and there, in Our name and authority, make publication hereof, that none pretend ignorance: And Our will and pleasure is, that Our Solicitor do cause printed copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published; and We do appoint them to send copies hereof to the several Parish Churches within their bounds, that upon the Lord's day immediately preceding the day above mentioned, the same may be published and read from the pulpits, immediately after Divine Service.

By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords of the Council having taken into consideration certain applications for leave to export various articles, of which the exportation is prohibited by Her Majesty's Proclamation of the

18th February 1854, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered that the officers of Her Majesty's Customs do not hereafter prevent the export of any articles, except only—

Gunpowder, Saltpetre, and Brimstone,
Arms and Ammunition.

Marine Engines and Boilers, and the component parts thereof.

And that such last-named articles be prohibited from export only when destined to any place in Europe north of Dupkirk, or to any place in the Mediterranean Sea east of Malta; and that the officers of Her Majesty's Customs do permit the export of the said enumerated articles to any other part of the world, upon taking from the persons exporting the same a Bond that they shall be landed and entered at the port of destination.

Whereof the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and officers of Her Majesty's Customs, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Exhibition of a New Revolving Light at North Ronaldshay, and alteration of the Start-Point Light from a Revolving Light to a Fixed Light.

I.—NORTH RONALDSHAY LIGHTHOUSE.

The Commissioners of the Northern Lighthouses hereby give notice, that a Lighthouse is being built upon the Island of North Ronaldshay, in Orkney, the Light of which will be exhibited on the night of Friday the 1st September 1854, and every night thereafter, from the going away of daylight in the evening to the return of daylight in the morning.

The following is a description of the Lighthouse, and the appearance of the Light, by Mr David Stevenson, Engineer to the Commissioners:—

The Lighthouse is in N. Lat. 59° 23' 15", and W. Long. 2° 23' 38"; it stands on the northern point of the Island of North Ronaldshay, and by compass it bears from Moul-head of Papa-Westra W.N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ North, distance 15 nautic miles; and from Start-Point of Sanday Lighthouse, S.S.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ West, distance 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The North Ronaldshay Light will be known to mariners as a Revolving Light, producing a bright flash of the natural colour once in every 10 seconds. It will be visible all round the compass. The lantern is elevated 140 feet above the level of the sea; and the Light will be seen at the distance of about 18 nautic miles, and at lesser distances, according to the state of the atmosphere.

II.—START-POINT LIGHTHOUSE.

The Start-Point Light, which is 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles from North Ronaldshay Light, being at present a Revolving Light, producing a bright flash once in every minute; the Commissioners further give notice, that on and after the night of Friday the 1st September 1854, when the new Revolving Light at North Ronaldshay is to be exhibited, the present Revolving Light at Start-Point will be changed to a Fixed Light of the natural colour.
