THE Queen has been pleased to direct letters-patent to be passed under the Great Seal, granting the dignity of a Baron of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland unto the Right Honourable James, Baron Wensleydale, and to the heirs-male of his body lawfully begotten, by the name, style, and title of Baron Wensleydale, of Walton, in the county palatine of Lancaster.

WESTMINSTER, July 21, 1856.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *the Lords authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for transferring the powers of the Church Building Commissioners to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England.

An Act to constitute the Court of Session the Court of Exchequer in Scotland, and to regulate procedure in matters connected with the Exchequer.

An Act to abolish the jurisdiction of the Court of the liberties and manor of Saint Sepulchre, in and near Dublin, and for the future regulation of certain markets of the said manor.

An Act to amend the laws of Scotland affecting trade and commerce.

An Act to amend the law for the registration of persons entitled to vote in the election of Members to serve in Parliament for burghs in Scotland.

An Act to alter the mode of providing for certain expenses now charged upon certain parts of the public revenue.

An Act to provide for the maintenance of navigations made in connexion with drainage, and to make further provision in relation to works of drainage in Ireland.

An Act to continue an Act for the survey of Great Britain, Berwick-upon-Tweed, and the Isle of Man.

An Act to amend the Acts relating to grand juries in Ireland.

An Act to repeal certain Statutes which are not in use.

An Act to encourage the providing of improved dwellings for the labouring classes in Ireland.

An Act to extinguish certain rights of way and to stop up certain roads and paths near the Camp at Aldershot.

An Act to extend the period for applying for a sale under the Acts for facilitating the sale and transfer of incumbered estates in Ireland, and to amend the said Acts.

An Act to render more effectual the police in counties and boroughs in England and Wales.

An Act to amend the constitution of "The London Printing and Publishing Company, Limited."

An Act for enabling the Somerset Central Railway Company to construct a railway from Glastonbury to near Bruton, and for other purposes.

An Act for making a railway from Castle-Douglas, by Dalbeattie, to the Glasgow and South-Western Railway at Dumfries, and for other purposes.

An Act for authorizing deviations from the authorized line of the Severn Valley Railway, and for making further provision with respect to shares in the capital of the Severn Valley Railway Company, and for facilitating the completion of their undertaking, and for other purposes.

An Act for establishing and maintaining a ferry and floating bridge between Stokes Bay and Ryde, in the county of Southampton, with landing-places and approaches thereto.

An Act to extend the times limited for certain purposes by the Acts relating to the Metropolitan Railway, and to enable the Metropolitan Railway Company to form a Junction with the Great Northern Railway, and for other purposes.

An Act for more effectually repairing the road leading from Wem to the Lime Rocks, at Bronygarth, in the county of Salop, and for making several lines of roads connected with the same in the counties of Salop and Denbigh.

An Act to enable the Stirling and Dunfermline Railway Company to create additional shares for their undertaking, and for other purposes.



An Act to further amend the laws relating to prisons in Ireland.

An Act for making a railway from the town of Nairn to the town of Keith.

An Act to amend certain Acts relating to the Luton District Turnpike Road, and make other provisions in lieu thereof.

An Act for continuing the term and amending and extending the provisions of the Act relating to the Cleobury North, and Ditton Priors District, and the Cleobury Mortimer District of Turnpike-Roads, in the counties of Salop and Worcester.

An Act for making a railway from the Scottish Central Railway at Dunblane, by Doune, to Callander, to be called "The Dunblane, Doune, and Callander Railway."

An Act for authorizing a lease of the Wimbledon and Croydon Railway, and for authorizing the purchase of additional lands, and the raising of additional capital by the Wimbledon and Croydon Railway Company, and for other purposes.

An Act for granting further powers for lighting, cleansing, sewerage, and improving the borough of Leeds, and for other purposes.

An Act for regulating the rates and charges to be taken by the Grand Junction Waterworks Company, for a supply of water to parts of the parish of Paddington, and for other purposes.

An Act to grant further powers to the Crystal Palace Company for the raising of capital for the internal management of their undertaking, and with respect to Dulwich Wood.

An Act to consolidate the powers of the Gloucester Gas Light Company to enable them to raise money, and for other purposes.

An Act for the making of a dock and works at Thames Haven, and for other purposes.

An Act for the making, by the London and South-Western Railway Company, of a railway from Yeovil to Exeter, to be called "The Exeter Extension Railway," and for other purposes.

An Act to amend the Acts relating to the East Indian Railway Company.

An Act for making a railway from the Taff Vale Railway to the River Ely, in the county of Glamorgan; for converting part of the said river into a tidal harbour, and regulating the access thereto; for authorizing arrangements with the Taff Vale Railway Company; and for other purposes.

An Act for altering the Crewe and Shrewsbury Line of the London and North-Western Railway, for making provision with respect to station accommodation at Shrewsbury, and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the Londonderry and Enniskillen Railway Company to create preference shares, with priority of dividend over all the existing shares of the Company, and for other purposes.

An Act for making a railway from the authorized line of the West End of London and Crystal Palace Railway (extension to Bromley and Farnborough) at Shortlands, in the parish of Beckenham, in the county of Kent, to Saint Mary Cray, in the same county.

An Act to enable the Oxford, Worcester, and Wolverhampton Railway Company to raise further money for the completion of the broad gauge, and for other purposes; and to convert their mortgage debt into stock.

An Act to repeal an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act for more effectually amending and keeping in repair the roads from

the town of Uttoxeter to the town of Newcastle-under-Lyme, in the county of Stafford, so far as relates to the Uttoxeter District of the said roads, and for making certain new pieces of road to communicate therewith, all in the said county of Stafford," and to confer larger and additional powers and provisions in lieu of those therein contained, and for other purposes.

An Act to amend "An Act for draining, embanking, and improving the fen lands and low grounds within the parishes, hamlets, townships, or places of Bardney, Southrow, otherwise Southry, Tupholme, Bucknall, Horsington, Stixwold, Edlington, and Thimbleby, in the county of Lincoln," and to confer further powers on the Commissioners under such Act, and for other purposes.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul-General at Monte Video, enclosing two Notices issued by the Monte Videan Government (translations of which are subjoined), calling the attention of the masters of Foreign merchant vessels bound to ports in that Republic, to the necessity of having their papers viséed by the Monte Videan Consul residing at their ports of departure, and to the fines which will be imposed in the event of their neglecting this precaution.

On the 28th of November 1850, and 27th of October 1852, the following Official Notices were published.—

Official Notice.

Monte Video, November 28, 1850.

THERE being repeated complaints from the Consuls of the Republic in Foreign parts against the abuse committed by captains of vessels which clear for this port in not bringing their papers endorsed as required by the respective Consuls, the following Articles of the 2d chapter of the Consular Instructions of the Republic which are still in force, are published for the information of those whom it may concern. "Article 18. The captains of Foreign and National vessels which clear at the ports where Consuls of the Republic reside, bound to ports of the Republic, are obliged to have legalized the manifest of the cargo, or ballast, the bill of health, and muster-roll. In the same provisions are comprised passengers' passports, powers of attorney, sentences, protests, certificates, and other documents which may be available in Courts of Law. Article 19. The captains who violate the provisions of the foregoing Article shall be subjected to pay the Consulate fees which

should have been paid at the port from which they departed, and also all other requisitions or penalties determined by the law." Consequently, Notice is given, that Doctor Don Carlos Eguia has been named and authorized by the Government, under the title of Fiscal Judge, to prosecute all captains of vessels who, having departed from ports where Consuls of the Republic reside, do not present their papers in the prescribed form, sentencing them to the penalty as stated, bringing against them all other actions that the case and the existing provisions may require.

Official Notice.

It being necessary to put a stop to the abuses committed by the passengers and masters of vessels that arrive in this Republic from ports where Consular agents reside, and having in view the requirements in this respect of the 2d chapter, 18th and 19th Articles of the Consular Instructions now in force, and with a view to the public interest, the Government have ordered to be made known 1st, That the above-mentioned vessels which do not bring their papers duly registered by the oriental Consul residing in the port from whence they depart, shall be compelled for the first time to pay the Consulate fees which should have been paid there; and should the same be repeated, the same fees, with a corresponding fine; without which requisition no vessel can be despatched in any of the custom-houses of the State: 2d, That the passengers who do not bring their passports endorsed by the Consul for the Republic in the port from whence they arrive, shall be compelled to pay the amounts of the respective Consulate fees, together with a fine of two Spanish dollars each person, without prejudice to their being subjected to the surveillance of the police for a reasonable time.—Monte Video, October 27th, 1852.

As the provisions contained in the above are in complete force, and notwithstanding this, due fulfilment of the same is not given, the Government have resolved to give notice to whomsoever it may concern, that from this date the said provisions shall be vigorously put in force, to which end the necessary orders have been issued.—Monte Video, May 6th, 1856.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Lisbon, transmitting the enclosed copy of a Decree, permitting the importation of grain, &c., into the Kingdom of Portugal until the 30th of June 1857.

DON PEDRO, by the Grace of God King of Portugal and of the Algarves, do hereby make known to all our subjects that the Cortes have decreed, and we approve of, the following law:

Art. 1st.—From the publication of this present law to the end of June 1857, the importation of Foreign grain, wheat, rye, barley, and oats, in grain, flour, or bread, shall continue to be ad-

mitted into all the ports and fiscal stations of the kingdom, for deposit and consumption. The deposits shall be only allowed to be made in Lisbon and Oporto.

The Foreign grain above mentioned, conveyed in vessels that may arrive in this Country after the 30th June 1857, shall be admitted according to the dispositions of this article, on proof being given by legal documents that said vessels sailed direct for their ports of destination before the 1st of the above-mentioned month.

Art. 2d.—Foreign grain, admitted in conformity with the terms of the foregoing article, shall pay without distinction, when entered for consumption, a special duty of 20 reis per 100 lbs. of grain, and 40 reis for an equal weight of flour or bread. Besides which special duty it shall be subject to the legal imposts as established for the same articles of National produce, according to the respective legislation.

Art. 3d.—When circumstances may require it, the Government is authorized to include Indian corn in the dispositions of the foregoing article, and may likewise lower the duties on potatoes and all kinds of Foreign pulse.

Art. 4th.—In the event of there being a great scarcity of grain, the Government is authorized to act as it may deem necessary regarding the supply of all alimentary articles.

Art. 5th.—The Government shall duly give an account to the Cortes of the use they shall have made of the authority conceded to them by this law.

Art. 6th.—All legislation to the contrary is hereby revoked.
