The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Saturday, August 13, 1859.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

WE are commanded by Her Majesty to release you from further attendance in Parliament, and at the same time to convey to you Her Majesty's acknowledgments for the zeal and assiduity with which you have applied yourselves to the performance of your duties during the Session of Parliament now about to close.

Various circumstances, which occasioned interruptions in the usual course of business, prevented the completion of important matters which Her Majesty pointed out to the attention of Her Parliament in the beginning of the present year; but Her Majesty trusts that those matters will be taken into your earnest consideration at an early period of the next Session.

The war which had broken out in Northern Italy having been brought to a close by the Peace of Villafranca, various overtures have been made to Her Majesty, with a view to ascertain whether, if Conferences should be held by the Great Powers of Europe for the purpose of settling arrangements connected with the present state and future condition of Italy, a Plenipotentiary would be sent by Her Majesty to assist at such Conferences; but Her Majesty has not yet received the information necessary to enable Her Majesty to decide whether She may think fit to take part in any such negotiations.

Her Majesty would rejoice to find Herself able to contribute to the establishment of arrangements calculated to place the general Peace on satisfactory and lasting foundations.

Her Majesty, in accordance with the stipulations of the Treaty of Tien-sing, has instructed Her Plenipotentiary in China to repair to the Imperial Court at Peking, and Her Majesty trusts that such direct communication with the Imperial Government will have a beneficent effect upon the relations between the two Countries.

Her Majesty commands us to inform you that She looks forward with confidence to the continued maintenance of those friendly relations which so happily subsist between Her Majesty and all Foreign Powers and States.

Her Majesty is glad to be able to congratulate you on the complete restoration of tranquillity in

Her Indian Dominions. It will be Her earnest endeavour to promote their internal improvement, and to obliterate the traces of those conflicts which Her Majesty witnessed with such deep concern.

The financial arrangements of that portion of Her Majesty's Empire will continue to engage Her Majesty's serious attention.

Her Majesty has had much satisfaction in giving Her assent to the Bills which you presented to Her for the formation of a Naval and Military Reserve Force. A complete and permanent system of National Defence must at all times be an object of paramount importance.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

Her Majesty commands us to convey to you Her cordial thanks for the readiness and zeal with which you have provided the necessary supplies for the service of the year.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

Her Majesty commands us to express to you Her heartfelt gratification at witnessing the general well-being and contentment which prevail throughout Her Dominions. The happiness of Her Majesty's People is the object dearest to Her heart.

In returning to your respective Counties you will have duties to perform intimately connected with the attainment of this great end, and Her Majesty fervently prays that the blessing of Almighty God may attend your exertions in the performance of those duties for the common good of all classes of Her Majesty's Subjects.

This day the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them that *the Lords authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to enable serjeants, barristers-at-law, attorneys, and solicitors, to practise in the High Court of Admiralty.

An Act to amend an Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty, for allowing verdicts on trials by jury in civil causes in Scotland to be received, although the jury may not be unanimous.

An Act to remove doubts as to the qualification of persons holding diplomatic pensions to sit in Parliament.

An Act to amend the Act for the better administration of criminal justice in Middlesex.

An Act to amend an Act of the thirty-ninth and fortieth years of King George the Third, for better regulating the business of pawnbrokers.

An Act to amend the Act of the twentieth and twenty-first years of Victoria, chapter forty-five, relating to the survey of boundaries in Ireland.

An Act to provide for the exercise of the duties of Chief Superintendent in China, in certain cases.

An Act to empower the Legislature of Canada to make laws regulating the appointment of a Speaker of the Legislative Council.

An Act to suspend the making of lists and the ballots for the Militia of the United Kingdom.

An Act to enable the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Works to acquire a site for the purposes of Her Majesty's Court of Probate, and other courts and offices.

An Act to authorise the Oxford, Worcester, and Wolverhampton Railway Company to extend their Kingwinford branch, and to alter certain parts of their main line of railway, and to carry into effect an agreement with the Great Western Railway Company for the completion of the main line on the Narrow Gauge only, and for other purposes.

An Act for continuing an Act for more effectually making, amending, widening, repairing, and maintaining the Great North Roads leading from the North Queensferry and from Burntisland, both in the county of Fife, by Kinross, to the city of Perth; and for enabling the trustees of the said roads, and the trustees of other roads, to enter into mutual arrangements.

An Act for making a pier in Swanage Bay, in the county of Dorset, and a tramway in connexion therewith, and for other purposes.

An Act for inclosing the commons or waste lands called "The Commons of Bray," in the parish of Old Connaught, in the county of Dublin.

An Act to authorize the Charleston Railway and Harbour Company to purchase and acquire the Charleston Railway and Harbour, and to extend and improve the said railway and harbour.

An Act for the making and maintaining of the Wansbeck Railway from Morpeth to a junction with the North Tyne section of the Border Counties Railway, and with branches to the Morpeth Branch of the Blyth and Tyne Railway, and the main line of the North-Eastern Railway respectively, and for other purposes.

An Act for continuing the term, and amending and extending the provisions of the Act relating to the Blackburn and Preston Turnpike Road, and for constructing a bridge over the river Ribble, in connection therewith, and for other purposes.

An Act for making a railway from the London and South-Western Railway, in the parish of Ringwood, to Christchurch, and an approach road at Christchurch, all in the county of Southampton, and for other purposes.

An Act for making a railway from West Cowes to Newport, in the Isle of Wight, and for other purposes.

An Act to alter, amend, and enlarge the provisions of the Acts relating to the Metropolitan Railway, to authorize the alteration and relinquishment of certain of the works, and to make further provision with reference to the construction of such railway, and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the Sittingbourne and Sheerness Railway Company to raise additional capital, to amend the Acts relating to the Company, and for other purposes.

An Act for amalgamating the Bedale and Leyburn Railway Company with the North-Eastern Railway Company, and for vesting in the latter the undertaking of the former Company, and the Rosedale Branch and property of the North Yorkshire and Cleveland Railway Company, and for other purposes.

An Act to renew the term, and continue, amend, and enlarge the powers of an Act passed in the third year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act for more effectually repairing the road leading from the Cross-of-Hand, near Finford Bridge, in the county of Warwick, through the town of Southam, in the same county, to the borough of Banbury, in the county of Oxford," and to make other provisions in lieu thereof, and for other purposes.

An Act to extend the powers of the West-end of London and Crystal Palace Railway Company for the purchase of lands and completion of their authorized extension to Farnborough Railway, and for other purposes.

An Act for better supplying with water the town of Eastbourne, and places adjacent thereto, in the county of Sussex, and for other purposes.

An Act to enable the North-Eastern Railway Company to construct branch railways for the purpose of uniting their Leeds and Thirsk, and Church Fenton, and Harrogate Railways, and for other purposes.

An Act to amend the Acts relating to the South Yorkshire Railway and River Dun Company, and to regulate the crossing of certain roads by the railway of the Company.

The Queen has been graciously pleased to give and grant unto William Backwell Praed, of Tyringham, in the county of Buckingham, and of Trevethoe, in the parish of Lelant, in the county of Cornwall, Esquire, the heir and representative of Sir William Tyringham, of Tyringham aforesaid, Knight of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, and Knight of the Shire for the county of Buckingham, in the reign of King Charles the Second, heir male of the family of Tyringham, of Tyringham, Her Royal licence and authority that he may, as the lineal heir and representative of the said family, henceforth take the surname of Tyringham, in lieu of his present surname of Praed, and also bear the arms of Tyringham; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise the said Royal licence and authority to be void and of none effect:

And further, to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul-General at Venice, enclosing the following Quarantine Regulations which have been

issued at Trieste, to be observed against Yellow Fever :

1. That to such vessels as shall arrive after a voyage of more than 30 days, without any aggravating circumstances having occurred during the voyage, free pratique shall be given subsequent to the sanitary visit, but this only in such ports as have either a central port and sanitary office, a port and sanitary office, a maritime lazaretto, or a port and sanitary deputation.
2. That in cases when the voyage shall have occupied only 30 days, or less, without the occurrence of any aggravating circumstances during such voyage, a quarantine of observation of 5 days, and with aggravating circumstances, of 7 days, shall be established on vessels, persons, and cargoes.

The remaining sanitary regulations not being altered, the quarantine law will stand as follows :—

I. Clean Bill of Health for Yellow Fever.

Vessel, persons, and cargo free pratique.

II. Foul Bill of Health for Yellow Fever.

1st. No aggravating circumstances having occurred during the voyage.

(a.) When the voyage has exceeded 30 days.—Vessel, persons, and cargo free pratique, after having undergone the sanitary visit at one of the fore-mentioned ports.

(b.) When the voyage has been made in 30 days or less.—Vessel, persons, and cargo five days' quarantine of observation in one of the maritime lazarettos.

2d. When aggravating cases have manifested themselves during the voyage.—Vessel, persons, and cargo 7 days' quarantine of observation in one of the maritime lazarettos.

III. Foul Bill of Health, aggravated by cases of Yellow Fever on the voyage.

In such cases the sanitary treatment, specified in the Notification of 7th November 1857, must be enforced, viz. —

The most rigorous measures, foreseen and prescribed in the new sanitary regulations of 1851, the longest quarantine being fixed at 15 days.

The foregoing Regulations came into force, provisionally, from the 17th July 1859.
