WHEREAS by divers Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, duly issued under the authority of the Act passed in the Session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent, until the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act of the last Session of Parliament,—which Orders recited that a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," prevailed amongst cattle in England and Wales, the Lords of the Council have made various regulations for prevent-

ing the spread of the Cattle Plague, and among other matters have provided for the movement of cattle upon highways in England and Wales, and for the importation of cattle into England and Wales from Ireland;

And whereas it is expedient that fresh regulations should be made in respect of cattle imported from Ireland and afterwards moved in England and Wales, and also in respect of cattle moved from Scotland into England and Wales:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby order as follows:—

1. From and after the date of this Order cattle may be imported from Ireland and landed at any port or place in England and Wales, except in South Wales and Monmouth, and be moved to the place of their ultimate destination in England or Wales, subject to the following provisions, anything in any Order heretofore issued by the Privy Council to the contrary notwithstanding.

2. Previous to such cattle leaving Ireland the owner may obtain a licence for the moving of such cattle in the following form, and cattle imported from Ireland may be moved in England or Wales with such a licence:—

This Licence shall be available for six days from the date hereof, *and no longer*; and no cattle can be moved under it upon any highway in England between sunset and sunrise; and cattle moved under it cannot be again moved, except in accordance with the regulations applicable to English cattle.

NOTICE.—Any person who forges or alters any licence, or offers or utters the same, knowing it to be forged or altered, will be liable to a penalty of Twenty Pounds, or to be imprisoned, with hard labour, for the term of three months. See 29 and 30 Victoria, cap. 110, sec. 10.

3. Nothing herein contained shall apply to cattle imported from Ireland to be slaughtered in the port or place at which they are landed; but all the provisions of the several Orders now in force relating to cattle so landed shall continue to apply thereto.

4. Animals may be moved from Scotland into England and Wales with a licence in the form described in the Order of Council bearing date the 11th day of April last, and designated Store Stock Licence, together with the declaration and certificate which accompany the same.

5. Provided that nothing herein contained shall apply to any part of England and Wales where, under any Order of the Privy Council, the Local Authority is empowered to make special regulations as to the movement of animals into its district.

6. This Order shall be construed in like manner as the Order of the 24th of March last; and the provisions of the said Order relative to the offences in contravention thereof, and the penalties for the same, and otherwise, now in force, except so far as they may be inconsistent with anything herein contained, shall be applied to this Order.

#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 57.)—BLACK SEA.—RIVER BUG.

Red Light near Sievers Point.

The Imperial Ministry of Marine at St. Petersburg have given notice that a light is now exhibited from a wooden tower, erected on rising ground near Sievers Point, on the left bank of the Bug River.

The light is a *fixed red* light, at an elevation of 55 feet above the level of the River; and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 8 miles. The light is distant 818 yards in a N. E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E. direction, from the *fixed* white light on Sievers Point; and the two lights in line, on the above bearing, lead clear of the shoals on both banks of the river from Sievers Point to abreast of the village of Little Dereklea, a distance of nearly 8 miles.

[All bearings are Magnetic. Variation  $4^{\circ} 40'$  West, in 1866.]

Continuation of Light Vessels during the winter months.
