WHEREAS by divers Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, duly issued under the authority of the Act passed in the Session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent, until the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act of the last Session of Parliament,—which Orders recited that a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," prevailed amongst cattle in England and Wales, the Lords of the Council have made various regulations for prevent-

ing the spread of the Cattle Plague, and among other matters have provided for the movement of cattle upon highways in England and Wales, and for the importation of cattle into England and Wales from Ireland;

And whereas it is expedient that fresh regulations should be made in respect of cattle imported from Ireland and afterwards moved in England and Wales, and also in respect of cattle moved from Scotland into England and Wales:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby order as follows:—

1. From and after the date of this Order cattle may be imported from Ireland and landed at any port or place in England and Wales, except in South Wales and Monmouth, and be moved to the place of their ultimate destination in England or Wales, subject to the following provisions, anything in any Order heretofore issued by the Privy Council to the contrary notwithstanding.

2. Previous to such cattle leaving Ireland the owner may obtain a licence for the moving of such cattle in the following form, and cattle imported from Ireland may be moved in England or Wales with such a licence:—

FORM OF LICENCE.

I, _____, being appointed by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland for such purpose, do hereby license the person named below to move the cattle described in the annexed Certificate from the port of _____, in Ireland, to _____, in England or Wales, being the place of their ultimate destination, by the route described below, so that the said cattle shall not be driven or carried otherwise than by railway through any infected place, or within one mile of the outward boundary of an infected place, except to enter such a place to be there slaughtered.
