## Fim Thursday July 1. to Monday July. 5 1675.

Portfmuth July 1. N Tuesday about three in the morning (as we fai 1 in our last) His Majesty weighed our of the Downes, with the Men of War and Yachts that attended Him, the wind at E.N.E. but very violent; The next day abour noon his Royal Highness came in here in the Anne, and his Grace the Duke of Monmouth in the Poirformatic Victor the Polifmouth Yachts, His Majefty with the reft of the Men of War and Yachts being fallen fo much to Leeward that He could not reach this Port at the fame time; and about feven that morning anchored on the back of the Isle of Wight. This morning about eight a clock, his Royal Highness and the Duke of Monmouth went out to Sea again to attend His Majefty.

Ditto, fuly 3. At fix a clock in the evening.

Yesterday morning carly His Majesty, having the day before been ashore on the ife of Wight, and been received and entertained by Sir Robert Holmes the Governor, arrived here in the Greyhound Frigat, together with his Royal Highnefs in the Anne Yacht, and the other Men of War end Yachts that waited on His Majefty. After having been fome hours afhore, His Majefty was pleafed, accompanied with his Royal Highnefs, to go and fee the Royal Fames, which was Launched on Tuefday laft, and feveral other pieces built by Commil-i fioner Dcane, with which His Majefty was extremely farisfied. In the Afternoon, His Majelty was pleafed to ville the Foreifications, and other things worthy His Majeffies observation here, and in the Evening, did our Governor Colonel Legge the Honour to Sup with This Morning His Majefly, and his Royal Highhim. nefs went to I hhfield, where Mr. Noel had the Honour to treat Them at Dinner; and this Evening about five a clock, His Majefty, after having been pleated to confer the Homour of Knighthood upon Sir John Tippets, Sir Richard Haddocke, Sir Anthony Deane, and Sir Roger Manley our Deputy Governor, is gone on board the Harwich Frigat, and his Royal Highnels on board the Anne Yacht, and are at prefent under Sail, the Wind W. S. W. and the weather very fair, towards the Downes.

Cadiz, June 10. The fecond inflant, failed from hence fix Spanish Men of War, having orders to go and join the Spanish Armada at Naples ; and the fixth, parted the Sieur de Ruyter, with four Men of War and feve-ral Merchantmen under his Convoy, towards Smithu, many people apprehend he may in his way rencouncer the French, who may be too ftrong for him. A Veffel arrived herefrom Naples, brings advice, That the French had had a defign upon the Scaletta, but that it had not fucceeded, and that the French and Mellinefes very well agree.

Madrid, June 20. The young King being now going to take upon himfelf the Government of his Kingdoms, it is faid that the Queen purposes to retire to Teledo, ha-ving chosen that City for the place of her residence. This week a confiderable fum of Money was fear from hence, to !!on Juan of Auftria, in order to his journel for Italy, which has been deferred, longer than his Might nefs intended, by his indificultion ; and we are now if-

fured, that he will very fuddenly embark at Barcelona, where fix Spanish Men of War expect him, to which will be joined certain Durch Men of War, who came into the Mediterranean to Convoy their Merchantmen, and three Gallies; on these ships will be likewise embarked 1 500 Foot Soldiers, with great flores of all Military Provifi ons, so that we yet seem here almost to promise our selves the reduction of Mefsina before the end of this Summer; notwithstanding our Letters from those parts tell us, that the French and Meffinefes live in very good correfpondence with each other. We have not heard any thing of moment from Catalonia, fince the raifing the fiege of Gironne, the French holding themselves still, expecting a fupply of Provisions, and reinforcement of Men from France. Our Letters from Lisbon of the 10 inftant, fay, That their Fleet was arrived from Brazile, that one thip was loft, and that the reft had for feveral hours been engaged with the Corfairs of Barbary: but without any lofs, except of fome Men.

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Strasburgh, July 1. The two Armies continue in the fame posture we told you in our last ; but it is faid that the French are very much incommoded through the overflowings of the Rhine, which is occasioned by the great Rains that have fallen of latey and that its thought that may oblige them to remove their Camp : Two stays Incowas a skitmish in the Village of Bischofheim, between the French and the Imperialists, in which it is weported that near 200 of the former were killed. The Bread that was baked here for the Germans, is turned into Bisket, to keep it from spoiling, there being at present not any poffibility to convey it to them.

Cologne, July 5. This day arrived here the Marquis de Grans from Bon, whither its thought he will return again, after having conferred with the Sieur Fijcher the Imperial Minister here, The two Armies continue still in the Neighborhood of *strasburg*, on the other fide of the Rhine, and its faid that General Montecuculi is refolved not to give the French any opportunity to fight him, unlefs with advantage to himfelf, but rather endeavor to weary him out, and oblige them to repais the Rhine; and on the other hand the French feem confident they shall be able to fublist in those quarters as long as their adverfaries in theirs. Our Letters from Mayence, give us an account of the Election of the Baron of Leyen Brother of the Blector of Treves, to the Electorate of Mayence; to the great satisfaction of the Imperialist, the Bishop of Aichftadt having excufed the fame by reafon of his great Age. The Duke of Lorrain is still here, though its faid he hath been very much defired to join with the Dukes of of Lunenburg. Liege, July 5. The French Army comes this way again, and two Bridges have been laid over the Menfe

near Maestricht, and at the fame time it is reported, as if his Majefty would pass the Menfe, but without any certainty. Provisions begin to grow very scarce in this Country, which is fo eaten up, that it is greatly feared the poorer fort will not be able to fubfift the next Winrer. The Duke of Lunenburg Zell, and Bishop of Ofnabrug, were, according to our last advices, encamped with their Troops near Jaliers, leaving us altogether uncer-
