WHEREAS by the late Act of Uniformity, which establisheth the Liturgy, and Enacts, That no Form or Order of Common Prayers be openly used, other than what is prescribed and appointed to be used in and by the said Book, it is notwithstanding provided, That in all those Prayers, Litanies, and Collects, which do anywise relate to the King, Queen, or Royal Progeny, the Names be altered and changed from Time to Time, and fitted to the present Occasion, according to Direction of lawful Authority; His Majesty was pleased this Day in Council to declare His Royal Will and Pleasure, that in all the Prayers, Liturgies, and Collects for the Royal Family, instead of the Words, [*their Royal Highnesses George Prince of Wales, the Princess Dowager of Wales, the Duke, the Princesses, and all the Royal Family*] be inserted [*Her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales, and all the Royal Family*.] And His Majesty doth strictly Charge and Command, That no Edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed but with this Amendment; and that in the mean Time, 'till Copies of such Edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars and Curates within this Realm, do, (for the Preventing of Mistakes) with the Pen, correct and amend all such Prayers in their Church-Books, according to the foregoing Direction: And for the better Notice hereof, that this Order be forthwith Printed and Published, and sent to the several Parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take Care that Obedience be paid to the same accordingly.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His late Majesty's Order in Council of the 25th of April last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of this Instant October—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time—His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of this Instant October, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

Requiring all Persons being in Office of Authority or Government at the Decease of the late King, to proceed in the Execution of their respective Offices.

G E O R G E R.

WHEREAS by an Act made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of her late Majesty Queen Anne, entitled, "An Act for the Security of

" of her Majesty's Person and Government, and of the Succession to the Crown of Great Britain in the Protestant Line," it was enacted, That no Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney and Sark, or any of her Majesty's Plantations, should become void by Reason of the Demise of her said late Majesty, her Heirs or Successors, Kings or Queens of this Realm, but that every Person and Persons, in any of the Offices, Places and Employments aforesaid, should continue in their respective Offices, Places and Employments, for the Space of Six Months next after such Death or Demise, unless sooner removed and discharged by the next Successor, to whom the Imperial Crown of this Realm was limited and appointed to go, remain and descend; And that all Officers in any Offices, Places or Employments, who should be by that Act continued, should take the Oaths therein mentioned, and do all other Acts requisite by the Laws and Statutes of this Realm to qualify themselves to be and continue in such their respective Places, Offices and Employments, within such Time, and in such Manner, and under such Pains, Penalties and Disabilities, as they should, or ought to do, had they been newly elected, appointed, constituted, and put into such Offices, Places or Employments, in the usual and ordinary Way: We therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure to be, and do hereby direct and command, That all Persons, who at the Time of the Demise of Our late Royal Grandfather, of Glorious Memory, were duly and lawfully possessed of, or invested in any Office, Place or Employment, Civil or Military, within Our Kingdom of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney or Sark, or any of Our Plantations, do, with the first Opportunity, take the respective Oaths of Office, and all other Oaths as required by the said Act; and in the mean Time do not fail every one severally, according to his Place, Office, or Charge, to proceed in the Performance and Execution of all Duties belonging to their respective Offices. And We do hereby require and command all Our Subjects to be aiding, helping and assisting at the Commandment of the said Officers and Ministers, in the Performance and Execution of their respective Offices and Places, as they and every of them tender Our utmost Displeasure, and will answer the contrary at their Perils.

Given at Our Court at Saville House the Twenty Seventh Day of October 1760, in the First Year of Our Reign.

And His Majesty is pleased to permit the Officers of the Army to appear before Him in Red faced with Black; and the Officers of the Fleet in Blue faced with Black.

This Day the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London waited on His Majesty, and being introduced to His Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Devonshire, Lord Chamberlain of the Household, Sir William Moreton, Knt. the Recorder, made their Compliments of Congratulation and Condolence in the following Address.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

YO U R Majesty's truly dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London, beg Leave to approach your Royal Person, and congratulate your Majesty upon your happy Accession to the Imperial Crown of these Realms; and, at the same Time, to condole the Loss of our late most Gracious Sovereign, whose Glorious Reign and Princely Virtues must ever make His Memory Dear to a grateful People.

It is our peculiar Happiness, that your Majesty's Heart is truly English, and that you have discovered in your earliest Years the warmest Attention to the Laws and Constitution of these your Kingdoms; Laws so excellently formed, that as they give Liberty to the People, they give Power to the Prince; and are a mutual Support of the Prerogative of the Crown, and the Rights of the Subject.

Your Majesty is now in Possession of the United Hearts of all your People, at a Time when the Honour and Credit of the Nation are (by the Courage and Activity of your Majesty's Fleets and Armies) in the highest Extent; a Time when we have happily no Divisions at Home to obstruct those Measures which have carried Terror to our Enemies Abroad.

As Your Majesty's Reign is so happily begun with the universal Approbation and Joy of the whole Nation, permit us, Great Sir, to express the high Sense we have of your Majesty's Virtues, by the strongest Assurances of our unalterable Zeal for your Majesty's Sacred Person and Government; being convinced that your Majesty has the true Interest of this Nation intirely at Heart, and that your Power will ever be exerted in protecting the Trade, Rights and Liberties of your Subjects. May your Majesty reign long in the Hearts of your People; and may the Crown of these Kingdoms ever descend to one of your Majesty's illustrious Family to latest Posterity.

The following Relation of the Action of the 15th at Campen, has been received here from an Officer of Distinction in the Troops under the Command of His Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, in a Letter dated the 17th Instant.

M. de Castries having drawn his Forces together, by forced Marches, reached Rhyenberg, and on the 14th obliged our Light Troops to quit their Post there. His Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince was there in Person, in order to support them, but found it impracticable. His Horse was wounded in this short, but brisk, Affair. Major General de Bock's Corps, which his Serene Highness immediately ordered to join him, could not arrive till the next Morning at Six o'Clock; Lieutenant General Waldegrave's at Eleven; and Lieutenant General Howard's in the Evening, when it grew dark. Four Hanoverian Battalions of those that were destined for the Siege, and were still on their March, could not complete their Junction the same Night. It was necessary to engage at a sufficient Distance from the Banks of the Rhine, in order to run no Risks in Case of Accident; especially as our principal Bridge was so much impaired by the Current of high Water, and the Storm there had been, that the Troops and the Cannon had passed it with Difficulty.

The Troops were posted in such a Manner, as to have Rhyenberg in their Front, and Offenbergh in their Rear.

The Enemy left no more than five Battalions and some Squadrons at Rhyenberg, and marching by the Left, came to encamp behind the Convent of Campen. According to our Intelligence of their Strength, they had not then been joined by their last Troops, which were to arrive the next and following Day. Hereupon his Serene Highness thought it absolutely necessary, to make Use of his Time that Night, in order to surprize M. de Castries in his Camp, and thereby to beat him if possible. His Serene Highness had under his Command 20 Battalions, and as many Squadrons; but, as has been said before, several Battalions had not been able to come up in Time; and four of them, together with five Squadrons, were left under Major General Bock, in order to observe Rhyenberg, and to attack that Post, in Case of Success on the Side of Campen.

M. de Castries had 30 Battalions and 38 Squadrons.

His Serene Highness marched at 10 o'Clock in the Evening. To reach the Enemy's Camp, it was necessary to overpower Fischer's Corps, which occupied the Convent of Campen, at Half a League in Front of the Camp. This could not be done without firing some Muskquet-shot, which gave the Alarm to M. de Castries, and enabled him at the same Time, to put his Troops hastily under Arms. He was however attacked, and drove back twice. It was a terrible, and well supplied Fire of Musketry, from Five in the Morning till about Nine at Night, without ceasing. His Serene Highness had his Horse killed under him, and received a slight Hurt, by the same Shot, in his Leg. His Highness, at length seeing that it would be to no Purpose to persist in the Attempt of driving the Enemy out of the Wood, of which they had possessed themselves, and our Infantry having spent all their Ammunition, he found himself obliged to order a Retreat, which was executed without a brisk Pursuit from the Enemy. Our Loss in this Action is computed to be about 1200 Men; and that of the Enemy is thought to be much greater. We took a Pair of Colours, and Two Pieces of Cannon, and lost One of our own, which burst. M. de Segur, Lieutenant-General, M. de Wangen, Brigadier-General, with several Officers, and some Hundreds of private Men, were made Prisoners; and on our Side, Lieutenant Colonel Pitt and Lord Downe, who were wounded, are in the Hands of the Enemy. Lieutenant-General Waldegrave, Major-General Griffin (who was slightly wounded in the Thigh) Lord George Lenox, and several other

Officers, as well British, as Hanoverians and Hessians, cannot be sufficiently commended. The Cavalry behaved extremely well. Major-General Elliot, Lieutenant Colonel Harvey, and another Officer of Rank, whose Name is not known, were wounded, but not dangerously. The Hereditary Prince marched by Genderich on the 16th in the Morning. An Attack was made on an advanced Body of our Troops, which was posted in a Wood before Elverick, and extended along the Rhine, with its Right at Geit, and some Battalions beyond it to cover its Flank. The Firing both of Cannon and Small Arms lasted till Night. A Column of the Enemy's Infantry, which was thought to be the Vanguard commanded by M. de Chabot, marched through Walach, and took Post at a Quarter of a League's Distance in our Front amongst the Thickets. The Rhine was so much swelled, and the Banks of it, about the Carthuyser Insul, so overflowed, that the Bridge, which we had over that River, was damaged to such a Degree, as made it necessary for us to repair, and remove it lower down. It was Five o'Clock in the Morning before that Work could be finished, and the Bridge refitted. The Enemy were only half a League from us. We however repassed the Rhine, in their Absence, without the least Molestation. The Passage could not possibly have been more ably conducted. The Hereditary Prince is now marching to Bruynen to fix his Head Quarters there.

Hague, October 25. We have no Accounts of any material Alterations made lately in the Position of the Armies commanded by Prince Ferdinand or Marshal Broglio. The French, on the other Side of the Weser, that had advanced as far as Nordheim in the Electorate of Hanover, have since fallen back to Gottingen. In the mean while the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick remained on the 23d in his Camp at Bruynen, which he occupied upon repassing the Rhine.

The King of Prussia, we hear, had reached the Town of Daun in Lusatia on the 20th, in his Way to Saxony; and Marshal Daun was following him, at the Distance of some few Days March.

The Town of Wittenberg in Saxony capitulated to the Duke de Deux Ponts on the 15th.

Some Light Troops from the Corps of French, under the Command of M. de Stainville, had made Incursions into Halberstadt, but left it, after levying Contributions, and taking Hostages.

The Body of Russians, that entered Berlin by Capitulation on the 9th Instant, quitted that City on the 13th; and have since retired into Poland by the Way of Furstenwalde.
