His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable John Earl of Bute to be one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; His Lordship was this Day, by His Majesty's Command, sworn one of His Principal Secretaries of State, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

This Day the Right Honourable William Earl Talbot, Lord Steward of His Majesty's Household, was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and took His Place at the Board accordingly.

This Day his Grace Charles Duke of Bolton, Lord Lieutenant of the County of Southampton and of the Town of Southampton and County of the same, took the Oaths appointed to be taken, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects, the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, Clergy and Freeholders of the County of Carmarthen, with all Humility beg Leave to approach your Royal Presence, and to unite, with the rest of our Fellow Subjects, in Condolence, on the great and general Loss we have sustained by the Death of your Royal Grandfather, our late most Excellent Sovereign.

So many Virtues uniformly exerted through such a length of Time, His Justice, His Magnanimity, the Wisdom as well as Clemency of His Government, have left too strong an Impression upon the Minds of a grateful People, to be easily effaced; but must for ever remain the Objects of their lasting Gratitude and universal Mourning.

In the Midst of our Grief, we cannot forbear to acknowledge the peculiar Care of Providence, in having so long continued His auspicious Reign, that your Majesty might attain that Maturity, which enables you to fulfil the warmest Expectations of your Subjects; and that, after every Effort of Faction, every Murmur of Discontent had been buried under a Series of Thirty-three Years Benefits, He might leave but one Mind and one Voice to congratulate your Majesty on your happy Accession to the Government of an united People.

Sire, His late Majesty has left you the fairest Inheritance, the Hearts of a great and brave Nation; He has left you the Inheritor of Victories and Triumphs: There is no Part of the Globe, in which the Glory of your Arms is not established; already you are sufficiently a Conqueror; but the greatest Pleasure we receive from these shining Advantages is, that they enable us to look up to your Majesty

for a Peace as solid and advantageous as the War has been successful and glorious; a Peace in which we may long behold your Majesty in that Character, by which you reign in our Hearts, in the uninterrupted Exertion of your mild and amiable Virtues.

These, Sire, have already filled us with the most happy Omens and Promises of your Reign; and when we see the highest filial Piety and fraternal Tenderness extending themselves to Publick Care; when we see, in the Vigour of Youth, a Command over Passion, and a Contempt of Pleasure hardly known in the maturest Age; when we see the most excellent of the private Virtues become Ornaments of the Throne, we cannot forbear to congratulate ourselves even more than we do your Majesty; and can form no new Wish for the Completion of our Happiness, but that we may long enjoy the Possession of those Blessings, of which we have now so noble a Prospect.

May your People be ever as sensible, as they are at this Day, of the Happiness they possess; and may your Majesty never hear any other Voice, than that of the sincere Praise and honest Joy with which the whole Nation is filled, upon this happy Occasion.

Copenhagen, March 14. The King of Denmark, since his last Accident, has continued in a very good Way, and will leave his Bed To-morrow.

Brunswick, March 20. Some Letters from the Camp before Cassel of the 17th mention, that the Enemy had made a considerable Sally the Night before, in order to destroy a Battery, which was erecting near the Town; but that they had been repulsed with great Loss.

M. de Belfunce, who has for some Time past held the Post of Northeim with Part of the Garrison of Gottingen, has been forced, by some Troops sent from hence, and from Hanover, joined with a small Body of Prussians, to quit the Possession of it.

Hague, March 23. Letters from Cologne advise, that the Bishop of Augsbouurg had declared himself a Candidate for the Electorate.

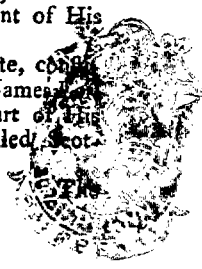
Hague, March 24. By Letters from the Army under Prince Ferdinand, we understand, that the main Body had its Position, on the 20th Instant, upon the Heights of Hombourg: That his Serene Highness had his Head Quarters still at Schweinsberg; the Marquis of Granby at Kirchayn; General Hardenberg behind Redechen, and Schweinsberg; and that the Hereditary Prince was advanced with his Corps towards Grunberg. At the same Time the Enemy occupied the Country along the Lahne, from Gladenbach to Allendorff, Lich, Hungen, and Laubach.

The Siege of Ziegenhayn still continued. There are no certain Accounts, in relation to that of Cassel, but it is said, that the French Garrison had made lately two very unsuccessful Sallies.

His Majesty's Ships the Magnanime, Chichester, and Niger, being on a Cruize, at the Mouth of the Channel; gave Chace to a small French Privatier Snow, which they saw in the Morning of the 10th Instant, and in the Evening the Niger took her. She is called the Marquis de la Chartre, of St. Maloes, of 6 Guns and 76 Men; had been out but two Days, and had not taken any Thing.

Admiralty Office, March 27.

His Majesty's Ship the Vengeance, of 28 Guns, (9 and 4 Pounders) and 200 Men, commanded by Capt. Nightingale, is arrived at Plymouth with two Prizes; one named the Entreprenant, pierced for 44, but now carrying only 26 Guns, (12 and 6 Pounders) with 203 Men, being equipt for War and Merchandize, and loaded with various Kinds of Goods for St. Domingo, with which she failed from Bourdeaux on the 8th Instant: The other a small Privatier of St. Maloes, carrying 4 Carriage and 4 Swivel Guns, with 45 Men, commanded by Joseph Merven, which the Vengeance fell in with off the Lizard on the 23d Instant: She came from Abbevrak the 21st, and had not taken any Thing. Captain Nightingale gives the following Relation of his Engagement with the Entreprenant; that he got up close along side of her at Five o'Clock in the Afternoon of the 13th, when the Action immediately began, and continued for three Quarters of an Hour, in which Time the Vengeance was five Times on Fire, (twice, as was imagined, from the Enemy's Wads setting Fire to the Main Rigging;) That the Vengeance's Rigging and Sails being then so much shattered, that the Ship was not under Command, the Enemy ran his Bow-sprit over her Taffarel for Boarding: That he was therein prevented, and the Vengeance sheer'd off, to repair her Rigging and Sails. As soon as the Ship was in Condition, Captain Nightingale got up again close to the Enemy, when the Engagement was renewed for an Hour, when the Entreprenant sheer'd off, and bore away: That the Vengeance being a second Time disabled in her Masts and Rigging, was some Time in Wearing: That at

Length she wore; and Captain Nightingale got again within Pistol Shot of the Enemy, and renewed the Engagement, which continued for an Hour and an Half, when the Enemy called for Quarter. The Entreprenant had 15 Men killed, and 24 wounded. The Vengeance had six killed, and 27 wounded, most of them dangerously; and two of them are since dead.

His Majesty's Ship the Bedford, of 64 Guns, commanded by Capt. Deane, has taken and sent into Plymouth, the Comete French Frigate of War, of 32 Guns and 250 Men, which the Bedford fell in with on the 16th Instant, 30 Leagues S. W. from Uthant, and, after a Chace of nine Hours, took her. She failed from Brest on the 9th Instant.
