AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 30th Day of *April*, 1761.

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 27th of October last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, expired upon the 29th Day of this Instant April — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of this Instant April, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entituled, " An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lieutenant Governor and Council of Jamaica.

May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lieutenant Governor and Council of this your Majesty's Island of Jamaica, in great Humility embrace this first Opportunity to condole with your Majesty on the Death of your Illustrious Grandfather, whose long and prosperous Reign hath always been remarkably distinguished in Support of the Religion, Laws, and Rights of his Kingdoms, and whose many and eminent Virtues have left such lasting Impressions on the Minds of a grateful People, as must ever endear his Memory to the present and future Ages.

A Loss so very affecting, and at so important a Conjunction, can only be repaired by your Majesty's happy Accession to the Crown. Permit us, Most Gracious Sovereign, with the warmest Sentiments of Duty and Affection, to offer our Congratulations on this Occasion, and from those Virtues for which your Majesty hath always been conspicuous to express our entire and well-grounded Confidence in your Majesty's Wisdom, Fortitude, and perfect Abilities, to sway the Sceptre of your Kingdoms.

Nor can we, although remotely placed from your Royal Throne, the less depend that we shall experience all the happy Effects of your Majesty's Favour and Protection, which shall be conferred on the nearest of your Subjects.

Allow us, most Gracious Sovereign, to offer our sincere Assurances of perfect Attachment and Fidelity to your Royal Person and Government, our constant Zeal for your Majesty's Service, and our fervent Wishes for your Majesty's long and auspicious Reign, and that there may never be wanting one of your Royal Line to perpetuate the Blessings we have enjoyed to the latest Posterity.
