7 HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 27th of October laft, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coaftwife, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, expired upon the 29th Day of this Inftant April — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition should be continued for fome longerTime : His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, That no Perfon or Perfons whatfoever (except the Master General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid 29th Day of this Instant April, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the fame Coaft-wife, without Leave or Permiffion in that Behalf first obtained from His Majefty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and fuffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His late Majefty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to impower His Majefty to pro-" hibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce " the Law for impowering His Majelty to prohibit " the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of " Arms and Ammunition ; and also to impower His " Majefty to reftrain the carrying Coaffwife of Salt " Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammu-" nition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majelly's Treafury, the Commiffioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.
