P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

This Day the Right Honourable Henry Arthur Earl of Powis, Comptroller of His Majesty's Household, was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable John Earl Delawarr, Lieutenant General of His Majesty's Forces, to be Governor of the Island of Guernsey, the usual Oaths, appointed to be taken by the Governor of that Island, were this Day administered to his Lordship.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, That the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Thursday the Second of July next, should be further prorogued to Thursday the Third Day of September following: And that the Convocations of Canterbury and York, which stand prorogued to Friday the Third of July next, should be further prorogued to Friday the Fourth Day of September following.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

For the Electing a Peer of Scotland to sit in Parliament, in the room of William Earl of Home, deceased.

WHEREAS by the Advice of Our Privy Council, We did summon a Parliament of Great Britain to meet and be held at Westminster the 19th Day of May last past: And whereas We prorogued the said Parliament to the 2d Day of July next: And whereas by the Advice of Our Privy Council We have thought fit to Order the said Parliament to be further prorogued to the Third Day of September next ensuing: And whereas William Earl of Home was nominated to be one of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, and as such was returned to sit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament: Which said William Earl of Home was, at the Time of and before the said Nomination, deceased, at Gibraltar, whereof the Lords Electors had no Notice at the Time of the said Nomination: In order therefore to the Electing a Peer of Scotland to supply the Defect of the said void Nomination, and to fill up the Number of Sixteen, according to the Treaty of Union, and the Statutes in that Case made and provided, We do, by the Advice of Our Privy-

Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy Rood House in Edinburgh, on Wednesday the Twelfth Day of August next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland to sit and vote in the House of Peers of the said Parliament of Great Britain, in the room of the said William Earl of Home, deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and the Proxies for such as shall be absent, such Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly signed before Witnesses, and both Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the Principal Clerks of the Session, as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes, and immediately after such Election made, and duly examined, to certify the Name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the same in the Presence of the said Peers, and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We strictly Charge and Command, That this Our Royal Proclamation may be published at Our Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns in Scotland, twenty-five Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such Election. Given at Our Court at St. James's the Twenty-fifth Day of June, 1761, in the First Year of Our Reign.
