This Day the Right Honourable George Henry Earl of Litchfield, Sir John Cust, Baronet, Speaker of the House of Commons, and Gilbert Elliot, Esquire, Treasurer of His Majesty's Household, were, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and took their respective Places at the Board accordingly.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 2d of April last, to direct, That the Bounties of Six Pounds for every able Seaman, and of Three Pounds for every ordinary-Seaman, should continue to be paid to every such able and ordinary-Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Royal Navy: And also that the Bounty of Twenty Shillings should be continued to be paid to every able bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty Five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the said 31st Day of May last, voluntarily enter themselves in like Manner to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Five Pounds for every able, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, should continue to be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secret themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of May last. — And whereas the Time limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards hath been continued and extended to the 31st of this Instant July; And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this Instant July, to the 30th Day of September next. And that the said Bounties and Rewards be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council of the 2d of April last. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Stockholm, June 27.* The Diet of this Kingdom having separated the 21st Instant, their Swedish Majesties set out this Day from Dronningholm for the Waters of Lokka, and will continue there till the Beginning of August.

*Breslaw, June 30.* Last Saturday the Cossacks passed the Oder at Auras, and the next Day joined the King of Prussia's Army. His Prussian Majesty led them himself to the Austrian Fore Posts, which they attacked, and made a few Prisoners. The Cossacks were highly pleased with the Honour of fighting under the King of Prussia's Eye.

Last Monday the Corps of General Czernichew arrived at Auras, where they passed the Oder the next Day; and this Morning they are to encamp at Lissa upon the Schweidnitz-Wasser, where the King of Prussia will give a grand Entertainment to the General Officers of that Corps. The Garrison, that was in this City, marched out two Days ago; and other Regiments, that were in the more distant Quarters of Cantonment, have moved on towards the Schweidnitz-Wasser.

The Corps of Austrians under General Beck, in the Upper Silesia, have abandoned the Neighbourhood of Ratibor; and, upon the Approach of the Duke of Bevern, have retired into the Country of Tetschen.

On the 28th Instant his Prussian Majesty removed his Quarters from Bettlern to the Village of Klein-Tintz, which is about half a German Mile farther on.

*Copenhagen, July 3.* We hear from Gottorp, that his Serene Highness Friderick Ernest, Margrave of Brandenburg Culmbach, Uncle to the King of Denmark, and Governor of Sleswick and Holstein, died, on the 23d past, after a short Illness, at his Country-Seat called Friderichswe, in the 59th Year of his Age.

*Hambourg, July 9.* We have received Advice, that the King of Prussia marched the 3d Instant to Buntzelwitz near Sweidnitz; and that Marthal Daun had his Camp at Bogendorff.

Syndic Klefeker, and Senator Drefky, who were named Deputies to compliment the King of Denmark upon his Arrival in his Holstein Dominions, are returned from Travendahl, where they were graciously received by his Danish Majesty.

The Reigning Duke of Mecklenbourg Schwerin set out Yesterday from Hena, for his Residence at Schwerin.

*Hague, July 9.* Our News from the Armies in Hesse are, That the Marquess of Granby, after having obliged Lieutenant General de Rochambeau to abandon Fritzlar, attacked him again near Hombourg, and obliged him to retire to Ziegenhayn: That Colonel Riedesel had destroyed a Magazine of the Enemy at Rothenbourg; and that General Luckner had taken the French Partisan Monet, with his whole Corps, at Schaffhoff, within Two Hundred Paces of Cassel.

The Prince of Condé has detached Ten Battalions to the Upper Rhine; and we hear that the Cavalry

valry of the French Household, which was at or near the Camp at Dunkirk, has had Orders to march the same Way likewise.

The Retreat of the Army of the Empire toward Bamberg, and the Disappointment of Marshal Serbelloni in his Attack of the Left Wing of the Prussians, on the 27th past, has turned the Scale again in Saxony, greatly in Favour of Prince Henry of Prussia. Nothing had yet happened in Silesia.

Hague, July 13. The Detachments from the Prince of Condé, are in Part made for the Upper Rhine.

We have nothing of a later Date from Wilhelmshal, than of the 6th Instant. The two Corps, under Lord Granby and Lord Frederick Cavendish, had cleared the Eder, and had beaten M. de Rochambeau at Hombourg. The French had made large Detachments to keep open their Communication with Frankfort, though they had, in the mean While, lost their Magazines at Melfungen and Rotherbourg. The Position of the Armies at that Time was as follows:—

The main Body of the French upon the Heights between Cassel and Munden: General Chevert, with Eight Thousand Men, at Deyerode. between Göttingen and Witzenhausen: General Stainville, with Fifteen Thousand Men, between Melfungen and Hombourg, to cover the Communication.

Prince Ferdinand was encamped upon the Heights between Holtzhausen and Weismar: Lord Granby at Hoff and Niedenstein: Lord Frederick Cavendish along the Eder; and a large Detachment at Uslar in the Solling.
