AT the Court at St. James's, the 9th Day of September 1763,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to declare his Grace John Duke of Bedford Lord President of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and his Grace took his Place at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable John Earl of Sandwich to be one of His Principal Secretaries of State, his Lordship was this Day, by His Majesty's Command, sworn one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State accordingly.

This Day the Right Honourable Thomas Lord Hyde was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

Dresden, August 28. The Russians are advanced as far as Kaun, a considerable Town in Lithuania; but give out, that they are going to Kiow; and pay for all they take.

Count Bruhl is so much better, that he took an Airing Yesterday in his Garden in a Sedan Chair.

Berlin August 30. M. d'Alembert, the French Academician, who has been some Months at Potsdam, set out for Paris last Week. It is said his Prussian Majesty made him Presents of upwards of 400 L. in Money, besides a Snuff-box set with Diamonds, which contained the King of Prussia's Picture.

The Heats have been excessive; but the Harvest in general is plentiful, which was greatly wanted in this Country.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable Wills Earl of Hillsborough, of the Kingdom of Ireland, and Baron of Harwich in the County of Essex, Soame Jenyns, Edward Elliot, Edward Bacon, the Honourable John Yorke, and George Rice, Esqrs. the Right Honourable Francis Baron Orwell, of the Kingdom of Ireland, and Bamber Gascoigne, Esq; to be Commissioners for promoting Trade, and for inspecting and improving His Majesty's Plantations in America and elsewhere.

The King has been pleased to appoint Dudley Alexander Sidney Cosby, Esq; to be His Majesty's Resident at the Court of the King of Denmark.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Emanuel Mathias, Esq; to be His Majesty's Agent in the several Free Cities of Hamburgh, Bremen, and Lubeck.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Henry Talbot, Joshua Churchill, John Milbanke, and Denzil Onslow, Esqrs. together with Henry Fane, Esq; in the Room of Edward Atley, Esq; deceased, to be His Majesty's Commissioners for the Receipt and Management of the Duties on Salt.

His Majesty has been pleased to present Thomas Patrick Young, Clerk, Master of Arts, to the Rectory of Berkhamstead St. Mary's, otherwise North Church, in the County of Hertford and Diocese of Lincoln, void by the Death of Dr. Francis Ayscough, and in His Majesty's Gift, for this Turn, by Virtue of His Prerogative Royal.

St. James's, September 2, 1763.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, within these Twelve Months last past, there have been several Tumults and Riots in, and about, the Parish of Christ Church in the County of Middlesex; That, in particular, on Wednesday the 24th of August past, a great Number of Persons assembled about the House of one Joseph White, in Lamb Street in the said Parish, and, in a most outrageous and riotous Manner, broke all the Windows of the said House; and, about Three o'Clock in the Afternoon of the same Day, brought the Body of one Cornelius Saunders (who had been executed, that Day, at Tyburn, for Stealing out of the Dwelling-House of the said White upwards of Fifty Pounds,) and laid it before the Door, and, in the Evening of the same Day, broke open the said House, and took out all the Forms, Tables, Benches and other Things which were in the lower Part of the said House, and made a Bonfire before the Door, and burnt a Quantity of Linnen; and, also, pulled down and destroyed the Wainscot, Flooring and Stairs of the said House; and, on the next Day, assembled again, and could not be dispersed till near Midnight: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said outrageous and dangerous Riot, and in the Taking out of the said Goods, and burning them in the Manner aforesaid, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them, who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Facts, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
