Lisbon, January 25. Their Majesties set out on Saturday for Salvaterra, with the Princesses and the Infante Dom Pedro, accompanied by M. da Cunha; where, it is said, they will reside as usual until the Beginning of March.

Their Majesties put on Mourning Yesterday for his late Royal Highness Prince Frederick-William, for Fifteen Days.

Two Packets arrived Yesterday; the King George Packet in Nine Days, with the Mail of the 7th; and the Duke of York Packet in Five Days, with That of the 14th Instant.

Copenhagen, February 1. The several Apartments at Christiansbourg being now in Order, and the Mourning Equipages ready to be made Use of To-morrow, the King of Denmark, with the Queen Mother, and the Two Princesses, return this Evening to reside again in Town.

The 29th past was his Danish Majesty's Birth-Day, when he entered into the 18th Year of his Age. The 30th was the Birth-Day of her Royal Highness the Princess Louisa, his Sister, who is just one Year younger than his Majesty; on Account of the present melancholy Situation of the Court neither of those Days was celebrated with the usual Festivities. All who appeared at Fridericksberg came dressed in Black. The King however shewed himself in the Circle, dined in Publick with the Royal Family, and

was pleased to make some Promotions. His Excellency M. du Reventlau, lately promoted to the Post of Grand Chamberlain, received the Honor of the Blue Ribband, belonging to the Order of the Elephant. The White Ribband of the Order of Danbrogg was conferred on the Five following Persons: M. de Schack, the Danish Minister at Stockholm; M. de Reventlau, Master of the Queen-Mother's Court; General Fink; Lieutenant-General Arnstedt; and M. de Moltke, lately Marshal to his Royal Highness the Prince. The Key of Chamberlain was also given to Count Holck, who had been Gentleman of the Bedchamber to his Danish Majesty while Prince Royal; and to M. de Plessen, M. de Holstein, and M. de Rantzau, who were Gentlemen of the Bedchamber to the late King.

Florence, February 1. Count Rosenberg arrived here two Days ago from Vienna, and is lodged in the Palace: He has brought with him the Grand Ducal Crown and Robes, which the late Emperor carried with him to Vienna: The Crown is very rich, and made Part of the Jewels of the State.

Hamburg, February 7. This City and Lubeck have named Syndick Faber and Senator Wagener to go to Vienna, to compliment the Emperor upon his Accession to the Imperial Throne.

The Frost is set in again with such Severity, that the Elbe, which was open, is shut up a Second Time.

Berlin, February 8. Last Sunday the King of Prussia returned to Potsdam; and, a few Days after, the Prince Royal of Prussia, together with the Princess his Consort, young Prince Henry, and the two Princes of Brunswick in this Service, likewise set out from hence for that Place.
