All who appeared at Fridericsberg came dressed in Black. The King however shewed himself in the Circle, dined in Publick with the Royal Family, and

was pleased to make some Promotions. Excellency M. du Reventlau, lately promoted to the Post of Grand Chamberlain, received the Honor of the Blue Ribband, belonging to the Order of the Elephant. The White Ribband of the Order of Danbrogg was conferred on the Five following Persons: M. de Schack, the Danish Minister at Stockholm; M. de Reventlau, Master of the Queen-Mother's Court; General Fink; Lieutenant-General Arnstedt; and M. de Moltke, lately Marshal to his Royal Highness the Prince. The Key of Chamberlain was also given to Count Holck, who had been Gentleman of the Bedchamber to his Danish Majesty while Prince Royal; and to M. de Plessen, M. de Holstein, and M. de Rantzau, who were Gentlemen of the Bedchamber to the late King.
