*Vienna, October 9.* A Scarcity of Corn ha-  
ving been actually felt, or apprehended, in the  
Archduchy, but particularly in this City, the  
Price of Bread here has been already advanced  
in Consequence thereof; and Letters Patent  
have lately been published by the Court, to con-  
tinue in Force till February next, allowing the  
Importation of Corn into Austria, from the  
Kingdom of Bohemia and the Provinces of Mo-  
ravia and Silesia, free of all Duties and Imposts.  
This Exemption does not extend to the King-  
dom of Hungary, where Grain of all Kind is,  
doubtless, in the greatest Abundance: An Ar-  
gument that the Apprehensions of Distress are  
not hitherto very alarming. It is indeed some-  
what difficult to see how any real Scarcity  
should arise, as the Crops both of this Year and  
the last are agreed to have been good.

Friday next is fixed for the Removal of the  
Court from Shonbrun to Town for the Winter.  
M. de Walmoden, His Majesty's Minister at  
this Court for the Affairs of Hanover, is ex-  
pected here daily.

*Lisbon, October 25.* Their most Faithful Ma-  
jesties and the Royal Family, accompanied by  
Dom Luis da Cunha, set out for Mafra on  
Tuesday the 21st, to take the Diversion of  
Hunting in the Royal Park.

The late heavy Rains, which lasted from the  
27th of September to the 12th Instant, with  
great Violence, have done considerable Damage.  
The Vintage, which did not promise much be-  
fore, is almost entirely destroyed. After a plea-  
sant Harvest, which seldom happens in this  
Country, a great deal of Corn, which still lies  
upon the Ground, not trod out, is spoilt: The  
Olives shaken from the Trees; and other Grains  
and Fruits have suffered.

*Florence, November 1.* The Great Dutchess  
continues to recover her Strength, and will come  
to Town in a few Days.

*Hamburg, November 4.* There have been  
exported lately from hence to the Mediterranean  
One Hundred and Twenty Thousand Quarters  
of Wheat and Rye: And Oats are beginning to  
be shipped for England.

The Weather and the Wind having been  
both very fair on the 31st past, it is not to be  
doubted but that the Queen of Denmark had  
a fine Passage over the Great Belt on that Day.

*Copenhagen, November 4.* Her Danish Ma-  
jesty came to Roeskild on Sunday Evening the  
2d Instant, where the King met her the next  
Morning, and, after a few Hours Stay, took  
Majesty along with him in his own Coach, and  
brought her to Fridericksberg about Four in the  
Afternoon. In that Palace her Majesty reposed  
herself till Saturday the 8th Instant, which is the  
Day appointed for her Publick Entry into the  
City, and for the final Celebration of the Royal  
Nuptials.
