THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers to bear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord President of the Council, the Lord Privy Seal, the Duke of Grafton, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty, by a Land Tax, to be raised in Great Britain, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy-one.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Marine Forces while on Shore.

An Act to continue for a further Time an Act made in the Eighth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act to continue and amend an Act made in the Fifth Year of His present Majesty, intituled, an Act for Importation of salted Beef, Pork, Bacon, and Butter, from Ireland, for a limited Time, and for allowing the Importation of salted Beef, Pork, Bacon, and Butter, from the British Dominions in America, for a limited Time.

An Act for the better paving, repairing, cleansing, lighting, and watching, the Streets and other publick Passages within the City of Winchester, and also within the several Parishes of Saint Bartholomew Hede, Saint John's in the Soken, Saint Peter's Cheesehill, Saint Swilbin, and Saint Michael, in the West Soken, in the Suburbs of the said City; and for preventing Nuisances and Annoyances therein, and for widening and rendering the same more commodious.

An Act to empower Charles Fitzroy, Esquire, to shut up several Footpaths, in the Parishes of Saint Pancras, alias Kentish Town, in the County of Middlesex, and to oblige him to make, and keep in Repair, for the future, a Footpath in Lieu thereof.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.
WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twelfth Day of October last, to promise and declare, amongst other things, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid to every such Seaman respectively, who should, on or before the Thirtieth Day of November last, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should also be paid to any Person, who should, on or before the said Thirtieth Day of November last, discover any Seaman or Seamen who should conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Ser-

vice: The Time for the Payment of which Bounties and Rewards was afterwards prolonged to the Thirty-first Day of this Instant December. And whereas His Majesty was likewise pleased, by another Proclamation, bearing Date the Thirtieth Day of November last, to promise and declare, that a Bounty of Twenty Shillings should be paid to each Able-Bodied Landman not above the Age of Thirty-five Years, nor under the Age of Twenty, who should, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant December, voluntarily enter themselves to serve on Board His Majesty's Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by the said Proclamation. And whereas the Time limited for paying the said respective Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said several Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant December, to the Fourteenth Day of February next, inclusive. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.
