The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS Day the Right Honourable Sir John Goodricke, Baronet, was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, That the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Tuesday the Seventh Day of this Instant September, should be further prorogued to Tuesday the Twelfth Day of October next.

Berlin, August 21. His Prussian Majesty left Potsdam on Sunday last the 15th Instant, between Two and Three in the Morning, in order to review his Troops in Silesia. His Majesty has given Leave to several Foreign Officers of Distinction to be present at these Reviews, and among others the Prince Adolphus of Hesse Philippsdahl.

As the Weather still continues favorable, there is a good Prospect of fine Crops of Barley in these Parts, and of Wheat near Magdeburg.

Hague, August 31. On Saturday last died, after a very long Illness, Mr. Francis Fagel, Second Greffier to their High Mightinesses the States-General, and Son of the Greffier. This Gentleman is universally regretted on Account of the many amiable Qualities he possessed, and the distinguished Abilities with which he filled that very high Office, to which he was appointed in the Year 1766. His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange has been pleased to nominate Mr. Dierquens, Nephew to the Greffier Fagel, to be First Secretary to their High Mightinesses.

St James's, September 4.

The King has been pleased to appoint Sir Hugh Palliser, Bart. Sir John Williams, Knight, George Marth, Timothy Brett, William Palmer, and William Bateman, Esqrs. Sir Richard Temple, Bart. Frederick Rogers, James Gambier, and Charles Proby, Esqrs. to be Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy.
