HEREAS Our Parliament stands prorequed to Thursday the first Day of Catober next, We, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby published and declare, that the faid Parliament shall be firstner prorogued on the faid sirst Day of October next, to Unorsday the twenty-fixth day of November following: And We have given Order to Our Changellor of Great Britain, to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly. And We do hereby surther declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said twenty-fixth Day of November next, be held for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burgesses, and the Commissioners are hereby required to give Attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said twenty-fixth Day of November next. Given at Our Court at St. James's the twenty-fifth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-eight, in the Eighteenth Year of Our Reign.

For granting the Distribution of Prizes during the present Hostilities.

cil dated the Twenty-ninth Day of July last, We have ordered, That general Reprisals be granted against the Ships, Goods and Subjects of the French King; and that as well Our Fleets and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vessels that shall be commissionated by Letters of Marque or general Reprisals, or otherwise, by Our Commissioners for executing Our Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully seize all Ships, Vessels and Goods belonging to the French King, and bring the same to Judgement in any of Our Courts of Admiralty within Our Dominions: We, being destrous to give due Encouragement to all Our faithful Subjects who shall lawfully seize the same; and having declared in Council, by Our Order of the Seventh of last Month, Our Intentions concerning the Distribution of all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes and Reprisals, of all Ships and Goods, during the present Hostilities, do now make known to all Our loving Subjects, and all others whom it may concern, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, that Our Will and Pleasure is, That the Neat Produce of all Prizes taken, the Right whereof is inherent in Us and Our Crown, be given to the Takers, in the Proportion and Manner of Proceeding herein-after set forth: That is to say, That all Prizes taken by Ships and Vessels having Commissions of Letters of Marque and Reprisals, may be sold and dispesed of by the Merchants,

Owners, Fitters, and others to whom such Letters of Marque and Reprisals are granted, for their own Use and Benefit, after final Adjudication, and not before. And We do hereby surther Order and Direct, That the Neat Produce of all Prizes which are or shall be taken by any of Our-Ships or Vessels of War, shall be for the entire Benefit and Encouragement of Our Flag Officers, Captains, Commanders, and other Commissioned Officers in Our Pay, and of the Seamen, Marines, and Soldiers, on Beard Our said Ships and Vessels at the Time of the Capture; and that such Prizes may be lawfully sold and disposed of by them and their Agents, after the same shall have been to Us sinally adjudged lawful Prize, and not otherwise. The Distribution shall be made as follows; the Whole of the Neat Produce being first divided into Eight equal Parts:

The Captain or Captains of any of Our said Ships and Vessels of War, who shall be assuably on Board at the Taking of any Prize, shall have Three Eighth Parts; but in case any such Prize shall be taken by any of Our Ships or Vessels of War, under the Command of a Flag or Flags, the Flag Officer or Officers being actually on Board, or directing and affisting in the Capture, shall have One of the said Three Eighth Parts; the said One Eighth Part to be paid to such Flag or Flag Officers in such Proportions, and subject to such Regulations, as are herein-after mentioned:

The Captains of Marines and Land Forces, Sea Lieutenants, and Master on Board, shall have One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them:

The Lieutenants and Quarter-Masters of Marines, and Lieutenants, Ensigns, and Quarter-Masters of Land Forces, Secretaries of Admirals or of Commodores, with Captains under them, Boatswains, Gunners, Purser, Carpenter, Master's Mates, Chirurgeon, Pilot, and Chaplain on Board, shall have One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them:

The Midshipmen, Captain's Clerk, Master Sail-maker, Carpenter's Mates, Boatswain's Mates, Gunner's Mates, Master at Arms, Corporals, Yeomen of the Sheets, Cockswain, Quarter-Masters, Quarter-Masters, Quarter-Masters, Mates, Yeomen of the Powder Room, Serjeants of Marines, and Land Forces on Board, shall have One Eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them:

The Trumpeters, Quarter-Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Stewards, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, Able Seamen, Ordinary Seamen, and Marines, and other Soldiers, and all other Persons doing Duty and affishing on Board, shall have Two Eighth Parts, to be equally divided among them:

Provided. That if any Officer being on Board any of Our Ships of War, at the Time of taking any Prize, shall have more Commissions or Offices than One, such Officer shall be intided only to the Share or Shares of the Prices which, according to the above-mentioned Distribution, shall belong to his

fuperior Commission or Office. And We do hereby firially enjoin all Commanders of Our Ships and Vessels of War taking any Prize, as soon as may be, to transmit, or cause to be transmitted, to the Commissioners of Our Navy, a true List of the Names of all the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, and others, who were actually on Board Our Ships and Vessels of War under their Command at the Time of the Capture; which Lift shul contain the Quality of the Service of each Person on Board, and be fubicribed by the Captain or Commanding Officer, and Three or more of the Chief Officers on Board. And We do hereby require and direct the Commissioners of Our Navy, or any Three or more of them, to examine, or cause to be examined, such Lists by the Muster-Books of such Ships and Vessels of War, and Lists annexed therete, to fee that such Lists do agree with the faid Muster-Books and annexed Lists, as to the Names, Qualities, or Ratings, of the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, and others belonging to fuch Ships and Veffels of War, and upon Request forthwith to grant a Certificate of the Fruth of any List transmitted to them, to the Agents nominated and ap pointed by the Captors, to take care and diffcole of such Prize; and also upon Application to them (the faid Commissioners) they shall give, or cause to be giver, to the said Agents, all such Lists from the Muser-Books of any such Ships of War, and annexed Lins, as the faid Agents shall find requisite for their Direction in paying the Produce of fuch Prizes, and therwise that be aiding and affilling to the faid Agents in all fuch Matters as shall be necessary. We do hereby further Will and Direct, ne effary. that the following Regulations shall be observed concerning the One Eighth Part herein before mentioned to be granted to the Flag, or Flag Officers, who shall actually be on Board at the taking of any Prize, or shall be directing or assisting therein: First, That, a Flag Officer, Commander in Chief, when there is but One Flag Officer upon Service, thall have to his own Use the said One Eighth Part of the Prizes taken by Ships and Vessels under his Command: Secondly, That a Flag Officer, sent to command at Jamaica, or essewhere, shall have no Right to any Share of Prizes taken by Ships or Veffels employed there, before he arrives at the Pince to which he is fent, and actually takes upon him the Command: Thirdly, That when an inferior Flag Officer is fent out to reinforce a superior Fing Officer at Jamaica, or elsewhere, the superior Fing Officer shall have no Right to any Share of Prizes taken by the inferior Flag Officer, before the interior Flag Officer shall arrive within the Limits of the Command of the superior Plag Officer, and actually receive tome Order from him: Fourthly, That a Chief Flag Officer returning Home from Jamaica, or elsewhere, shall have no Share of the Prizes taken by the Ships or Vessels left behind to ace under another Command: Fifthly, That if a Flag Officer is fent to command in the Out-Ports of this Kingdon, he shall have no Share of the Prizes taken by Ships or Veffels which have failed from that Port by Order from the Admiralty: Sixthly, That when more Flag Of ficers than One serve together, the Eighth Part of the Prizes taken by any Ships or Vessels of the Fleet or Squadron faall be divided in the following Proportions, viz. If there be but Two Flag Officers, the Chief shall have Two Third Parts of the faid One Eighth Part, and the other shall have the remaining Third Part; but if the Number of Flag Officers be more than Two, the Chief shall have only One Half, and the other Half shall be equally divided amongst the other Flag Osficers: Seventhly, That Commodores with Captains under them shall be esteemed as Flag Osiicers with respect to the Eighth Part of Prizes taken, whether commanding in Chief, or ferving under Command. And We do hereby further Order, That in the Case of Cutters, Schooners, and other armed Vessels commanded by Lieutenants, the Share of fuch Lieutenants shall be Three Eighth Parts of the Prize, unless such Lieutenants shall be under the Command of a Flag Officer or Officers; in which

Case the Flag Officer or Officers shall have One of the faid Three Eighths, to be divided among fuch Flag Officer or Flag Officers in the Manner hereinbefore directed in the Cafe of Captains ferving under Flag Officers: Secondly, We dired that the Share of the Master, or other Person acting as Second in Command, and the Pilot, (if there happens to be One on Board) shall be One Eighth Part, to be divided into Three equal Parts; of which Two Thirds shall go to the Master, or other Person acting as Second in Command, and the remaining One Third to the Pilot; but if there is no rilot, then tuch Eighth Part to go wholly to the Mader or Person acting as Second in Command: That the Share of the Chirurgeon, or Chirurgeon's Mate, (where there is no Chirurgeon) Middhipmen, and Clerk and Steward, shall be One Eighth; That the Share of the Boatswain's, Gunner's, and Carpenter's Males, Yeomen of the Sheets, Sailmaker, Quarter-Matter, and Quarter Matter's Mate, shall be One Bighth; and the Share of the Seamen, Marines, and other Pertons on Board, affifting in the Capture, shall be Two Eighth Parts. Our Intention nevertheless, that the above Diffri-bution shall only extend to such Captures as shall be made by any Cutter, Schooner, or armed Vessel, without any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels of War being present or within Sight of, and adding to the Encouragement of the Captors, and Terror of the Enemy: But in Case any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels of War shall be present, or in Sight, that then the Officers, Pilots, Petty Officers, and Men on Board fuch Cutters and Schooners, or armed Vessels, shall share in the same Proportion as is allowed to Persons of the like Rank and Denomination on Board His Majesty's Ships and Veftels of War. Lastly, It is Our Will and Pleasure, t'hut this Our Declaration, and Order in Council thereupon, shall extend not only to Captures from the French King, his Subjects, and others inhabiting his Countries, but also shall extend in the like Manner to all Ships and Goods now taken, and not finally adjudged and condemned, and divided, or to be taken hereafter, under the Act of Parliament of the Sixteenth Year of Our Reign; whereby it is enacted, That, for the Encouragement of Our Officers of Our Ships of War, the Flag Officers, Captains, Commanders, and other Commissioned Officers in Our Pay, and the Seamen, Marines, and Soldiers on Board, shall have the sole Interest and Property of and in all and every such Ships and Goods as therein are recited, which they shall seize and take; but being first adjudged, that is to say, finally adjudged lawful Prize, and which are by the faid Act declared for eited to Us, and to be divided and disposed of in such Proportion and after fuch Manner as We, Our Heirs and Successors, shall by Proclamation or Proclamations Order and Di-

Extract of a Letter from Smyrna, dated the 9th of July, 1778, transmitted to the Lord Viscount Weymouth by his Excellency Sir Robert Ainslie, His Majesty's Amhassador at Constantinople.

REVIOUS to the 16th of last Month, some flight Shocks of Earthquakes had been felt here, and on the Evening of that Day, an exceeding strong One happened; however happily without producing any Mischief, but the Shocks continued, from Time to Time, daily, 'till the 3d Instant, when at Half an Hour after Two in the Morning a most violent One happened, which damaged, more or less, a great Number of Buildings in the Town, and threw down a Turkish Mosque, where several People were killed; the Consternation and Terror this occasioned induced a great Part of the Inhabitants to retire to the neighbouring Villages, Gardens, &c. for Safety. The next Morning, amidst the repeated Shocks of Earthquakes, at Three o'Clock we had the dismal Profpect of a most dreadful and extensive Fire, which began in the Armenian Quarter of the Town, al-most opposite the French Consul's House, which being assisted by a strong Northerly Wind, and little Water attainable, upon Account of the Pipes being broke and choaked up with Earth, in consequence of the Earthquakes, and the People discouraged from giving Affiftance, by the frong Shocks which threw down damaged Houses, and killed many, occasioned the Fire to burn with most incredible Fury for near 24 Hours, consuming it is calculated near one Third of the City, which has occasioned a most melancholy Scene of Misery and Desolation; the Greek Nation has suffered an immense Loss of Property, Armenian Jews and Turks are very great Sufferers, and this City may be faid almost totally ruined; the Consequences in all Respects will be long and severely felt; a great Part of the Street inhabited by the Europeans has been destroyed, quite from the Custom House, where the European Merchandize is landed to near the Capucin Convent. It is now hoped that weshall be soon free from the alarming Apprehensions of the Earthquakes, as few have been felt within these Three Days past, and we are informed from a Dutch Captain who was off one of the Islands of Nourla, (about 18 Miles from Smyrna) that a frong Shock, felt here on the 5th, at near Three in the Morning, had occasioned a considerable Opening of the Earth, opposite to where he lay at Anchor, and that he apprehended his Ship to be damaged from the Violence of the Shock; and perceiving the Fire at Smyrna, it induced him to dispatch his Boat hither for Information, upon a Supposition that the City had been thrown down by the Earthquake, and was productive of the Fire. This Circumstance may probably contribute to our Safety, in having formed a Vent to expel the inflammatory Exhalations.

It is confidently affured, that the Fire was occafioned by Incendiaries, five or fix Jews; one was hanged, and another thrown into the Fire. Other Attempts, it is faid, have been made to renew this

dreadful Calamity.

Dresden, September 13. A Corps of Austrians has entered Saxony near Marienberg in the Circle of the Mountains, and has laid Anneberg under a Contribution of 30,000 Dellars; which the Citizens not being able to pay, the Austrians carried fome of the principal ones away as Hostages, and had refired to their Head Quarters at Bernstein. His Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussa has quitted his Camp at Nimes, and passed the Elbe Yesterday, the 12th sustant, at Leitmeritz. General Solms has joined General Platen with a few Officers; and Lieutenant-General Bennigsen has now the Command of the Saxons at Gabel.
