By the KING, PROCLAMATION. GEORGE R.

Hereas a great Number of disorderly Persons have for several Days past assembled themfelves together, in a Riotous and Tumultuous Manner, and have been guilty of many Acts of Treason Rebellion, and Felony, having formed Designs to break open and destroy the Gaols and Prisons, and to fet loose the Prisoners confined therein, and having actually broke into and fet on Fire the Gaol of Newgate, the King's Bench Prison, and the Prison of the Fleet, and released the Prisoners, and made Attempts on other Gaols and Prisons in and about this Metropolis; and having fet Fire to and pulled down the Dwelling-houses of divers of Our peaceable Subjects, and also set Fire to, burnt and de-stroyed the Materials thereof, and the Furniture and other Effects found therein; and also taken Money from divers of Our Subjects: We therefore, taking the same into Our most serious Confideration, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish and declare Our Resolution, That the Authors, Abettors, and Perpetrators of the said Offences be profecuted as expeditionfly as may be, according to the due Course of Law; and we do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, She riffs, Mayors, Bailiss, Constables, and all other Our loving Subjects, to be aiding and affishing to the utmost of their Power, in detecting, apprehending and bringing to Justice the said Offenders ing and bringing to Justice the said Offenders.
And We are graciously pleased to promise, that if
any Person shall discover any other Person or Persons who are guilty of any of the said Offences, so as that the Person or Persons discovered may be prosecuted for the same, such Discoverer shall have and receive, as a Reward, upon Conviction of such Offender or Offenders, the Sum of FIFTY POUNDS, and also Our Gracious Pardon for the faid Offence, in Case the Person making such Difcovery shall himself be liable to be prosecuted for the same; and the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Treasurer of Our Exchequer are hereby required to make Payment accordingly of the faid Rewards.

THEREAS Information has been received, that the late Riots and Tumults in and about this Metropolis were encouraged and abetted by Money, or other Rewards, given, or promised to be given, to the Persons concerned therein; and also Bells, Flags, and other Signals and Devices, were used during the said Riots and Tumules, to direct the Rioters in their Criminal Acts and Proceedings. and to give Notice of Attempts or Preparations to suppress, resist, or interrupt the same: We there fore, taking the same into Our most serious Consi-

deration, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of any of the Criminal Acts above mentioned, are graciously pleased to promise, That if any Person shall discover any other Person or Persons, who by themselves, or their Agents, gave or offered, or promifed to give, any Money, or other Reward, to any Person or Persons, to engage or continue in the said Riots or Tumults, or to do or affift in any of the Criminal Acts committed during the Continuance of the faid Riots and Iumults, or who made use of any Bells, Fiags, or other Signals or Devices, to direct the Rioters in any of their Criminal Acts and Proceedings, or to give Notice of Attempts or Preparations to Suppress, resist, or interrupt the same, so as that the Person or Perions discovered may be prosecuted, such Discoverer shall have and receive as a Reward, upon Conviction of fuch Offender or Offenders, the Sam of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS; and the Commissioners for executing the Office of Treasurer of Our Exchequer are hereby required to make Payment thereof accordingly.
