**Y**ESTERDAY being kept as the Anniversary of Her Majesty's Birth-Day, there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment Their Majesties on the Occasion. The Guns in the Park, and at the Tower, were fired at One o'Clock. There was a Ball at Court in the Evening, and Illuminations and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy in London and Westminster.

The following is a List of Prizes taken, on the 12th of last Month, by the Fleet under the Command of Rear-Admiral Kempensfelt, from the Convoy of *Monf. de Guichen's Squadron*, transmitted by the Rear-Admiral in a Letter to Mr. Stephens of Yesterday's Date.

The *L'Emille*, Pierre Scolan, Lieut. de Frigate, Commander, 350 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Portsmouth, 31 Seamen, 149 Soldiers, including a Colonel and Lieutenant of Infantry, laden with 10000 Cannon Balls, Iron Bars, Steel, Twine, and Sail Cloth, and 16 Pieces of Cannon.

The *Guillaume Tell*, Le Coudrais Commander, 390 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Portsmouth, 33 Seamen, laden with Cannon Balls, Howitzers, Soldiers Cloathing and Accoutrements, Flint, Grenades, Shells, and 535 Barrels of Gunpowder of 200 lb. Weight each, on the French King's Account; and, on the Merchants, Iron Bars, Rum and Provisions.

The *Sopbia de Brest*, Jacques Francois Brisson Commander, 160 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Portsmouth, 22 Seamen, laden with Biscuit, Shells of Eight Inches, Grenades, and 29 Chests of Arms, on the French King's Account; and, on the Merchants, Provisions, Cordage and Linen.

The *London*, Videaux, Lieut. de Frigate, Commander, 350 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Milford, 48 Seamen, 201 Soldiers, laden with Sheet Lead, sundry Chests of Small Arms and Artillery Stores, Cloathing, and Bales of Cloth for ditto, Four Months Provisions for the Soldiers, and Six Months Provisions for the Sailors; and some private Trade.

The *La Minerwa*, Pomelle, Lieut. de Frigate, Commander, 300 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Milford, 38 Seamen, laden with Bomb Shells, Shot, 55 Chests of Small Arms, 10 ditto Artillery Stores, 40 Artillery Wheels, a Quantity of Bread, and some private Trade.

The *L'Amitie Royale*, 450 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Tenby, 60 Seamen, 111 Soldiers, laden with 230 Barrels of Wine, 100 Barrels of Beef and Pork, and a large Quantity of other Provisions, 20 Tons of Balls, 150 Muskets, 20 Tons of Lead, Powder, Tents, &c.

The *L'Abundance*, Dupuis Commander, 600 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Plymouth, 90 Seamen, 248 Soldiers, laden with Ordnance Stores, Provisions, &c.

The *L'Hero*, Pierre de Sourde Commander, 160 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Plymouth, 30 Seamen, Cargo not ascertained.

The *Le Victoire*, Jean Baptiste Tierenier Commander, 240 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Plymouth, 21 Seamen, laden with about 350 Hogheads of Wine, 250 Half Barrels of Pork, and 32 Pipes of Brandy, on the French King's Account.

The *Le Mercure*, Jacques Boutel Commander, 500 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Plymouth, 45 Seamen, 10 Servants, some Officers, laden with about 100 Bales of Woollen Goods, 150 Jars of Oil, 80,000 Bricks, 3,500 Barrels of Flour, 60 Hogheads of Wine, sundry Merchandize, and 4 Cartronnades.

The *Le Genreux*, Jean Baptiste Harinnondes Commander, 400 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Plymouth, 40 Seamen, 193 Soldiers, laden with about 100 Hogheads of Wine, 60 Barrels of Flour, 30000 Bricks, Wine, Brandy, Beef, Pork, Biscuit, and sundry other Articles.

The *Margarette*, Francis Caroufin Commander, 160 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Plymouth, 20 Seamen, 1 Officer, laden with a large Quantity of Soldiers Cloathing, Wine, Brandy, and Wet and Dry Provisions.

The *Sopbia de St. Maloes*, Pierre le Vigotte Commander, 250 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Plymouth, 30 Men, laden with Brass Cannon, Shot, Carriages, Travelling Magazines, Chests of Muskets, and Provisions.

The *L'African*, 350 Tons, from Brest, arrived at Plymouth, 40 Seamen, 160 Soldiers, 100 Hogheads of Red Wine, 12 Hogheads of Brandy, 200 Barrels of Beef and Pork, 200 Barrels of Flour, and great Quantities of other Provisions, and 30 Chests of Fire Arms.

One Ship arrived at Falmouth, of which no Account has yet been received.

Two or three of the French Transports sunk by the Squadron.

N. B. The Total Number of Soldiers, by the foregoing Account, appears to be 1062, and Number of Seamen, 548.

*AS several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have from Time to Time gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; The following Abstracts of Two Acts of Parliament of George the First and George the Second, to prevent such Practices, are published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them.—And it will be observed, that they extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, and in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.*

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

**I**F any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Information, in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted, shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this

Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from thenceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Person shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, and of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase; and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made upon Oath before any Justice of Peace that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid; such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted upon Indictment of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King, not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

**I**F any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country, not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted upon Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall for every Offence forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in

in Dublin respectively, wherein no Effoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publickly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall for every such Offence forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty:

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

**FROM** Variety of Circumstances, there is the strongest Reason to believe, that one George Weston, and Joseph Weston his Brother, were concerned in the Robbery of the Bristol Mail near Cranford-bridge, on the 29th of January, 1781, for the apprehending of the Person who committed the same, a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS was offered, by Advertisement from hence in the London Gazette of Saturday the 10th of February last, and in several

succeeding Gazettes, to be paid out of this Revenue upon Conviction.

The said George Weston and Joseph Weston are two of the Sons of one George Weston, now deceased, who was born in the Parish of Stone, in Staffordshire, and all resided in that County, and in the Parish of Allchurch in Worcestershire, until the Year 1773 or 1774, when they quitted that Country.

The latter End of 1774, they resided on a Farm near Lynn, by the Names of Stone; having defrauded several Persons there, they decamped in the Spring following.

In 1775, they resided upon a Farm in the Parish of Blackburn, in Scotland, by the Names of Gilbert; and, having conducted themselves there in the same Manner as at Lynn, they speedily left that Country.

The Beginning of the Year 1776, they resided for a short Time at Brough, in Lincolnshire, on the Banks of the Humber, where they acted a similar Part.

In the Spring of 1776, they rented an Estate near Beckenham, in Kent, in the Names of Green, and soon quitted it on the same Account.

In the Summer of 1776, they resided at Braithay, in Lancashire, near Windermere Lake, where they assumed the Names of Gilbert; from thence they absconded in October 1776, were pursued and apprehended at Bishops Cattle in Shropshire, and taken before Mr. Alderman Hewitt at Coventry.

In 1777, they resided upon a Farm of Lord Aldborough's in Ireland, and, during their short Stay in that Kingdom, put off several forged Drafts.

In the Spring of 1778, the two Sons (George taking the Name of Scott, and Joseph taking the Name of James Watson) were at Tenby, in Pembrokeshire, on a Tour of Pleasure, where they negotiated a forged Draft; from thence they went by sea to Biddeford in Devonshire.

In August, 1778, they were in the Neighbourhood of Brecknock, Grouse-shooting, where they went by the Names of James Clark and ——— Smith, and put off a forged Draft at Brecknock: Also, in that Year Joseph put off a forged Draft near Sutton Coldfield, in Warwickshire, taking the Name of Joseph Hart.

The two Westons are supposed to be well known either by some of the before-mentioned Names, or the Names of Smith, Walker, Hill, and West, in almost every Part of this Kingdom, except the West of England, and to be connected with an Attorney of notorious Character in Worcestershire, and his Confederates.

Immediately after committing the Robbery of the Mail, George Weston set out in a Post-Chaise and Four from London, (or the Neighbourhood) through Leicestershire, Nottinghamshire, Derbyshire, Yorkshire, and Northumberland, to Newcastle, from thence to Carlisle, and from that City by the Great North Road to London, putting off Bills and Notes at various Places in his Route; and one or both of them are supposed to have been last Summer at a Fair at Mortham, near Rotherham, and at Launceston, at each of which Places a Bill taken out of this Mail was negotiated by them.

Within the two last Months they have put off several Notes and Bills at Lottery-Offices in London, and George by himself has, within that Time, put off one at Richmond in Surry, and another at Hackney, assuming the Name of John Ward.

George Weston is about 29 Years of Age, 5 Feet 7 Inches high, square set, round faced, fresh coloured, pitted with the Small Pox, has a short thick Nose, his upper Lip rather thick, his Hair of a lightish-brown Colour, which is sometimes tied behind, at other Times loose and curled; has much the Appearance of a Country Dealer, or a Farmer; one of his Thumb Nails appears, from an Accident, of the Shape of a Parrot's Bill, and he is supposed to have a Scar upon his Right Hand from a Stroke with a Cutlafs.

Joseph

Joseph Weston is about 23 Years of Age, 5 Feet 9 Inches high, slender made, of a fair and smooth Complexion, genteel Person, has grey Eyes, and large Nose with a Scar upon it, his Hair is of a light brown Colour, sometimes tied behind, at other times loose and curled, his Voice strong, and he speaks a little through his Nose; has a remarkable small Hand and long Fingers.

Whoever shall apprehend, or cause to be apprehended, the said George Weston and Joseph Weston, or either of them, will, upon the Conviction of one or both of them for the said Robbery of the Mail, be intitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending Highwaymen, agreeably to the said Advertisement. — And, as it is well known that a Person in the Mercantile Line has assisted them in the Negotiation of some of the Bills, if he, or any other Accomplice in the Robbery, or knowing thereof, will make Discovery, whereby either or both of the said Westons may be apprehended and convicted of the same, he or they will be intitled to the said Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

THE Post-Boy, carrying the Chester Mail from this Office last Tuesday Night to Barnet, was attacked a little beyond Highgate, between the Five and Six Mile Stones, about Half past Four o'Clock, by Three Persons on Foot, who drove back the Cart near Half a Mile on the Road to London, then turned into a Field on the Right Hand Side, and, at the Distance of about Half a Mile from the Road, broke open the Cart, and took away a Number of the Bags in a single Horse Chaise, which it appears they had awaiting near the Place, and the following Bags are still missing, viz. Chester, St. Asaph, Ruthin, Denbigh, Northop, Conway, Carnarvon, Beaumaris, Bangor, Holyhead, Wrexham, Stockport, Manchester, Blackburn, Preston, Lancaster, Wigan, Ormskirk, Warrington, Holms-Chapel, Middlewich, Drayton, Macclesfield, Knutsford, Newcastle, Leek, Stone, Leicester, and One Irish Bag.

The Robbery was committed by the Persons hereafter described, viz.

William Smith, otherwise James Flood, by Trade a Shipwright, who lodged in Long-lane, Smithfield, was apprehended on Thursday Evening last.

Robert Thompson, a Tin-Man, who for many Years kept a Shop in St. John-Street near Hicks's-Hall, and has travelled for Orders in that Branch through many Parts of England.

Thomas Baker, by Trade a Turner, who for Eight Nine Years last has worked in Fan's-Alley, Goswell-Street.

Thompson is about Twenty-eight Years of Age, Five Feet Six Inches high, thin made, sharp Nose, has Hair of a dark Colour, which he wears curled, was born in London, and is a Freeman of Lincoln.

Baker is about Twenty-five Years of Age, Five Feet Six Inches high, stout made, bow-legged, wears his Hair curled, was born in Ireland.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Persons who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending Highwaymen: Or if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Persons who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party, be intitled to the said Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
