'The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 16th of November 1ast, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire on the 23d Day of this Inflant February: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His feveral Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23d of August and 25th of September, 1776, of the 16th of April, the 13th of August, and the 3d and 10th of October, 1777, of the 19th of June, the 7th and 26th of August, and the 10th of September, 1778, and of the 17th of May, 1780, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coastwife, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions and Restrictions mentioned in the said Orders: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the faid 23d Day of this instant February, presume to transport, into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council, without Leave or Permission in that Council, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf sirst obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forseitures and Penalties instituted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwife " His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." - And the Lords Commif-Coners of His Majetty's Treasury, the Commis-Coners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. 

IT is recommended to all Persons, at present uninformed, who may have Occasion to send BANK NOTES by the Post, to cut them in Two Parts, according to the following Specimen, where it is marked with a Black Line, and send them by different Posts, first writing the Name, Date and Year at one End of the Note, and the Letter and Number at the other End: By this Means each Part will contain a sufficient Specification of the Whole, and prevent any Kind of Difficulty in the Payment of it at the Bank of England to the right Owner, in case of the Loss of the other Part.

General Post-Office, January 8, 1782.

FROM Variety of Circumstances, there is the strongest Reason to believe, that one George Weston, and Joseph Weston his Brother, were concerned in the Robbery of the Brissol Mail near Cranford-bridge, on the 29th of January, 1781, for the apprehending of the Person who committed the same, a Reward of IWO HUNDRED POUNDS was effered, by Advertisement from hence in the London Gazette of Saturday the 19th of February last, and in several succeeding Gazettes, to be paid out of this Revenue upon Convision.

The faid George Weston and Joseph Weston are two of the Sons of one George Weston, now deceased, who was corn in the Parish of Stone, in Staffordshire, and all resided in that County, and in the Parish of Allchurch in Worcestershire, until the the Year 1773 or 1774, when they quitted that Country.

The latter End of 1774, they refided on a Farm near Lynn, by the Names of Stone; having defrauded feveral Persons there, they decamped in the Spring following.

In 1775, they resided upon an Estate of George Moncrief, Esq; at Blackburn in the Parish of Lindithgow in Scotland, by the Names of either Weston or Gilbert; and, having conducted themselves here in the same Manner as at Lynn, they speedily left that Country.

The Beginning of the Year 1776, they resided for a short Time at Brough, in Lincolnshire, on the Banks of the Humber, where they acted a similar Part.

In the Spring of 1776, they rented an Estate near Beckenham, in Kent, in the Names of Green, and soon quitted it on the same Account.

In the Summer of 1776, they resided at Brathey, in Lancashire, near Windermere Lake, where they assumed the Names of Gilbert; from thence they abscorded in October 1776, were pursued and apprehended at Bishops Casile in Shropshire, and taken before Mr. Alderman Hewitt at Coventry.

In 1777, they refided npon a Farm of Lord Aldborough's in Ireland, and, during their fhort Stay in that Kingdom, put off feveral forged Drafts.

In the Spring of 1778, the two Sons (George taking the Name of Scott, and Joseph taking the Name of James Watson) were at Tenby, in Pembrokeshire, on a Tour of Fleasure, where they negociated a forged Draft; from thence they went by Sea to Biddeford in Devonshire.

The two Westons are supposed to be well known either by some of the before-mentioned Names, or the Names of Smith, Walker, Hill, and West, in almost every Part of this Kingdom, except the West of England, and to be connected with an Attorney of notorious Character in Worcestershire, and his Confederates.

Mail, George Weston set out in a Post-Chaise and Four from London, (or the Neighbourhood) through Leicestershire, Nottinghamshire, Derbyshire, York. thire, and Northumberland, to Newcastle, from thence to Carlifle, and from that City by the Great North Road to London, putting off Bills and Notes at various Places in his Route; and one or both of them are supposed to have been last Summer at a Fair at Mortham, rear Rotherham, and at Laun-ceston, at each of which Places a Bill taken out of . this Mail was negociated by them.

Within the two last Months they have put off s feveral Notes and Bills at Lottery-Offices in London, and George by himself has, within that Time, put off one at Richmond in Surry, and another at Hack-

ney, assuming the Name of John Ward.

George Weston is about 29 Years of Age, 7 Inches high, fquare set, round faced, fresh coloured, pitted with the Small Pox, has a short thick Nose, his upper Lip rather thick, his Hair of a ; lightish-brown Colour, which is sometimes tied be-, hind, at other Times loose and curled; has much the Appearance of a Country Dealer, or a Farmer; one of his Thumb Nails appears, from an Accident, of the Shape of a Parrot's Bill, and he is supposed to . have a Scar upon his Right Hand from a Stroke with , a Cutlass.

joseph Weston is about 23 Years of Age, 5 Feet o Inches high, slender made, of a fair and smooth Complexion, genteel Person, has grey Eyes, and large Nose with a Scar upon it, his Hair is of a light brown Colour, sometimes tied behind, at other times loofe and curled, his Voice strong, and he fpeaks a little through his Nose; bas a remarkable

finall Hand and long Fingers.
