To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council of the City of Exeter, in Chamber assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign;

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council of the City of Exeter, in Chamber assembled, presume to approach the Throne, to offer to your Majesty our warmest Congratulations on the late Successes with which it has pleased the Divine Providence to bless your Majesty's Arms, and particularly on the great and decisive Victory gained in the West Indies over the French Fleet, under the Command of the Count De Grasse, no less important to the Interests of this Country, than honourable to the Commanders, Officers, and Seamen of your Majesty's Fleet, by whose Bravery, exemplary Conduct, and united Efforts, the Superiority and Splendour of the British Flag have been nobly supported.

We cannot but look forward, with Satisfaction, to the happy Consequences of this Event, which, in the Prosecution of the War, or in promoting your Majesty's gracious Endeavours to bring it speedily to an End, is replete with the most solid Advantages; and we hope and trust, that your Majesty will soon be enabled to defeat the Designs of the several Powers combined against this Country, and to obtain, what we are well assured has been the constant Object of your Majesty's Wishes, a lasting and honourable Peace.
