THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great-Britain, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for raising a further Sum of Money, by Loans or Exchequer Bills, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty-two.

An Act for granting to His Majesty additional Duties upon Salt, and certain Duties upon Glauber or Epsom Salts, and also on Mineral Alkali or Flux for Glass made from Salt, and to prevent Frauds in the Duty on Foul Salt to be used in Manuring of Land.

An Act for charging a Duty on Persons whose Property shall be insured against Loss by Fire.

An Act for Licencing Lottery-Office Keepers, and regulating the Sale of Lottery Tickets.

An Act to discharge and indemnify the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, from all Damage, Interest, and Losses in respect to their having made Default in certain Payments due to the Publick, on such Payments being made at a future stipulated Time; and to enable the said Company to continue a Dividend of Eight Pounds per Centum to the Proprietors of their Stock, for the present Year.

An Act to enable His Majesty to conclude a Peace or Truce with certain Colonies in North America therein mentioned.

An Act for restraining any Person concerned in any Contract, Commission, or Agreement, made for the Public Service, from being elected, or sitting and voting as a Member of the House of Commons.

An Act for further continuing An Act, made in the Twentieth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intitled, An Act for appointing and enabling Commissioners to examine, take, and state the Public Accounts of the Kingdom, and to report what Balances are in the Hands of Accountants, which may be applied to the Public Service, and what Defects there are in the present Mode of receiving, collecting, issuing, and accounting for Public Money, and in what more expeditious and effectual, and less expensive Manner, the said Services can in future be regulated and carried on, for the Benefit of the Public.

An Act for better securing the Freedom of Elections of Members to serve in Parliament, by disabling certain Officers employed in the Collection or Management of His Majesty's Revenues from giving their Votes at such Elections.

An Act to indemnify such Persons as have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments, and to indemnify Justices of the Peace, or others, who have omitted to register or deliver in their Qualifications within the Time limited by Law, and for giving further Time for those Purposes; and to indemnify Members and Officers in Cities, Corporations, and Borough Towns, whose Admissions have been omitted to be stamped according to Law, or having been stamped have been lost or mislaid, and for allowing them Time to provide Admissions duly stamped; and to give fur-

ther Time to such Persons as have omitted to make and file Affidavits of the Execution of Indentures of Clerks to Attornies and Solicitors.

An Act for punishing Persons wilfully and maliciously destroying any Woollen, Silk, Linen, or Cotton Goods, or any Implements prepared for or used in the Manufacture thereof; and for repealing so much of two Acts made in the Twelfth Year of King George the First, and in the Sixth Year of His present Majesty, as relates to the Punishment of Persons destroying any Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Implements prepared for or used therein.

An Act to rectify a Mistake in an Act of this Session of Parliament, with respect to preventing the Importation and Running of Tea in this Kingdom in Armed Vessels, having Letters of Marque or other Commissions from the Admiralty.

An Act to permit the Importation of British Plantation Tobacco from any Port or Place either in America, or the West Indies, or in Europe, during the present Hostilities.

An Act for restraining Sir Thomas Rumbold, Baronet, and Peter Perring, Esquire, from going out of this Kingdom for a limited Time; and for discovering their Estates and Effects, and preventing the transporting or alienating the same.

An Act for preventing the Slaughtering of Cattle within the City of Edinburgh, and for removing Nuisances and Annoyances therefrom.

An Act more effectually to enable the Inhabitants of the Parish of Saint Luke, in the County of Middlesex, to purchase, hire, or erect a Workhouse, within or near the said Parish, for the better Reception and Employment of the Poor of the said Parish.

An Act for building a new Bridge, instead of the present ancient Bridge commonly called Lancaster Bridge, at a more convenient Place over the River Loyns near the Town of Lancaster, in the County Palatine of Lancaster.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from a Place called The Hardwick, in the Parish of Cliford, to Windmill Hill, and from Vowchurch to Ponttrilas, in the County of Hereford.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the Town of Brecon, through the Town of Hay, in the County of Brecon, and also the Road through Marsh Lane, to the Built and Hay Turnpike Road, near the Village of Llyswen, in the same County.

An Act to repeal an Act, made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the First, intitled, An Act for the better securing the Dependency of the Kingdom of Ireland upon the Crown of Great Britain.

A PROCLAMATION,

For recalling and prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States; for giving Encouragement to Seamen and Able-bodied Landmen to enter themselves in Board His Majesty's Ships of War; and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves.

WHEREAS We are informed, that great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom: And whereas Our Service doth at this Time require a speedy Supply of Seamen and Seafaring Men to man such of Our Ships as are now ready to be commissioned: We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever and wheresoever, (being Our natural-born Subjects) who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel, that forthwith they, and every of them, do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit such Foreign Services, and return home to their native Countries: And farther, We do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever, (being Our natural-born Subjects) from entering, and do charge and command them and every of them from henceforth to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever, without Our special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf; to all which We expect due Obedience and exact Conformity. And We do hereby publish and declare, that the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur Our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And We do hereby declare, That if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, or other Seafaring Men, (being Our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service by the Turks, Algerines, or any others, they shall not be reclaimed by Us as Subjects of Great Britain. And whereas it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen, Seafaring Men, and Able-bodied Landmen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service. We do hereby promise and declare, that all such Able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Thirtieth Day of September next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on board such Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Five Pounds each Man; and all such Ordinary Seamen, fit for Our Service, who shall to enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Two Pounds Ten Shillings each Man, as Our Royal Bounty; and that every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall voluntarily enter themselves as aforesaid to serve on board any of Our Ships, shall receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man; such respective Sums to be paid by the respective Clerks of the Cheque residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships into which they shall be entered shall be immediately after the Third Muster of such Seamen and Landmen. And We do declare, that the Qualification of the Seamen to entering themselves as aforesaid shall be certified by the Captain, Master and Boatswain of the Ship or Vessel where they shall enter: And for Prevention of any Abuses by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on board any other Ship or Vessel, in order to obtain the said Bounty Money, We do hereby declare and command, that such Seamen or Landmen, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any

of the Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits. And We do hereby further promise and declare, that a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, shall be paid any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secrete themselves, that so such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service, by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the 30th Day of September next; the said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen, so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, and, at the Out-Ports, by the Naval Officers, (where there are any) and, where there are no Naval Officers, by the Collectors of Our Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names and Number of Seamen procured in consequence of his Discovery; the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 14th of December last, for continuing the Prohibition on the Exportation or Carrying of Copper Coastwise, (except as therein mentioned) will expire on the 22d of this instant June: And whereas, upon the Application of the several Companies of Copper Smelters within the Kingdom of Great Britain, His Majesty (in order to remove all Obstructions upon Trade, so far as might be consistent with sound Policy) was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 10th of last Month, to permit and allow Copper of the Weight and Dimensions described in the said Order, to be carried Coastwise or exported, under certain Restrictions and Conditions therein specified: And whereas His Majesty judges it necessary for the Public Good, at this critical Conjunction, that the Exportation or Carrying Copper Coastwise, should continue to be prohibited for some Time longer, except under the Restrictions and Conditions allowed by the above-recited Order of the 10th of May last. His Majesty is thereupon pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Prohibition upon the Exportation or Carrying of Copper Coastwise be continued for Six Months, to commence from the 22d Day of this instant June; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure that the same shall not be taken to extend to any Sort of Copper to be exported or sent Coastwise by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, or their Officers or Agents, for His Majesty's Service; or to the carrying Coastwise or exporting of Copper in Sheets, weighing less than Twelve and more than Forty Ounces to the Foot superficial, to any Parts beyond the Sea, to which the same may be lawfully exported, upon Condition

dition, that all such Copper be inspected and examined by an Agent or Agents appointed or to be appointed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; and that a Certificate, under the Hand and Seal of the said Agent or Agents shall be first had and obtained, setting forth, that no Part of such Copper consists of Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and less than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot superficial; which Certificate from the said Agent shall be delivered to the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port in which the said Copper is intended to be shipped, and shall be their Authority for allowing the Quantity of Copper specified in the said Certificate to be put on Board, in order to be carried Coastwise or exported: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to permit and allow the Exportation of Copper in Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and less than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot superficial, provided that the same shall consist of Pieces not exceeding Four Pounds Weight in any One Piece; and that a Certificate thereof be obtained in Manner above directed, before such Copper be laden or put on Board; and also to permit the carrying Coastwise of Copper in Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and less than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot superficial, upon Condition that no more than Five Hundred Weight of such Copper shall be shipped by any one Person or Partnership, and that the Quantity put on Board any one Ship or Vessel shall not exceed Ten Hundred Weight in the Whole, unless Security by Bond hath first been given to the proper Officers of His Majesty's Customs, in Treble the Value of such Copper, to carry the same to the Places proposed, and none other; and to produce and deliver a Certificate or Certificates, within Two Months from the Date of the Bond, from the proper Officers of the Customs at the Ports for which any such Copper shall be entered and cleared out, of the same having been all duly landed at such Ports; which Certificate or Certificates such Officer is hereby required to give; and the same Certificate or Certificates the Commissioners of the Customs are hereby required to transmit to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in order to be laid before this Board. And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WE, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens, of the City of Dublin, should feel ourselves extremely defective, if we omitted to express those Sentiments of Loyalty and Affection for your Majesty's Person and Government, which we have invariably possessed, and which the Circumstances of the present Period of Time peculiarly demand.

Your Majesty's Paternal Attention to the Wishes and Representations of this Kingdom, and your earnest Desire to remove all Cause of Discontent and Jealousy, are Proofs of your Majesty's Wisdom, and will strengthen the Constitutional Connexion between Great Britain and Ireland, so essential to the Interest and Happiness of both Nations.

Permit us to assure your Majesty, that we consider it as a strong Mark of your Majesty's Affection for your faithful Subjects of Ireland, that your Majesty has been graciously pleased to appoint the Duke of Portland to the Government of this Country, a Nobleman not less distinguished by his Attachment to your Majesty's Illustrious House than his Reverence for the Constitutional Rights of all his Fellow Subjects. And we are persuaded that his Grace's Administration will continue to be as highly beneficial to the People, as it already has been truly honourable to the Vice-Roy.

We conclude with this solemn Declaration, that we shall be as assiduous in promoting the Glory of your Majesty, and the Prosperity of Great Britain, as we have been zealous in asserting the Liberties of Ireland.
