the Commissioners of His Majefly's Revenue in Ire- | land, or any other Perfon or Perfons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form herein after mentioned ; which Licences shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which they are respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no fuch Licence as aforefaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of June, One Thoufand Seven Hundred and Ninety, shall be of any Force or Effect : And His Majefty is hereby further pleafed to order, That the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Veffel to whom fuch Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the faid Ship or Veffel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, deliver up the faid Licence to he Collector or other proper. Officer of the Cuftoms there, having first indorfed on the Back of fuch Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the faid Act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Cuftoms at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Mafter, or Perfon having the Charge or Command of fuch Ship or Veffel, of his having received the faid Licence, fo indorfed 'as before directed, and to transmit the fame to the Commiffioners of His Majefty's Cultoms in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majefty's Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom fuch Licence was granted.
