HIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by wirtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Ass agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, impowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Duke of Leeds, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Ast for enabling-Ilis Majesty to raise the Sum of One Million, for the Uses and Purposes therein mentioned.

An All for giving Relief to such Persons as have suffered in their Rights and Properties during the late unhappy Dissentions in America, in Consequence of their Loyalty to His Majesty and Attachment to the British Government; for making Compensation to Persons who surnished Provisions or other necessary Articles to the Army or Navy in America during the War, or whose Property was used, seized or destroyed, for the carrying on the Public Service there; and also for making Compensation to such Persons as have suffered in their Properties, in Consequence of the Cession of the Province of East Florida to the King of Spain.

An Ast for fettling and securing a certain Annuity for the Use of the Heirs and Descendants of William Penn, Esquire, the original Proprietor of the Province of Pennssivania, in Consideration of the meritorious Services of the said William Penn, and of the Losses which his Family have sustained in Consequence of the unbappy Dissentions in America.

An Ast to continue Two Asts, made in the Twentyeighth and Twenty-ninth Years of the Reign of His
present Majesty, for discontinuing, for a limited Time,
the several Duties payable in Scotland upon Low
Wints and Spirits, and upon Worts; Wash and other
Liquors there used in the Distillation of Spirits, and
for granting to His Majesty other Duties in Lieu
thereof; and for better regulating the Exportation of

British-made Spirits from England to Scotland and from Scotland to England; and to continue, for a limited Time, an AA, made in the Twenty-fixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, to discontinue, fir a limited Time, the Payment of the Duties upon Low Wines and Spirits for Home Consumption, and for granting and securing the due Payment of other Duties in Lieu thereof; and for the better Regulation of the making and vending British Spirits and for discontinuing, for a limited Time, certain Imposts and Duties upon Rum and Spirits imported from the West Indies; and for amending the said AA made in the Twenty-ninth Year of His present Majesty's Reign.

An Act for making Allowances to Diffillers of Low Wins and Spirits from Malt, Corn or Grain, in Scotland, in Respect to the Duties imposed by an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of His' present Majesty.

An Ast to enable His Majesty to settle a certain Annuity on the Reverend Francis Willis, Dostor of Physic.

An Act to impower Justices and other Persons to wifit Parish Work-houses or Poor-bouses, and examine and certify the State and Condition of the Poor therein

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Uther of the Blick Rod, was fent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Ast for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money, to be raised by a Lottery.

An Ast for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Consolidated Fund; for applying certain Monies therein mentioned for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and rivery and the Year One thousand seven hundred and ninety; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.

An Act for repealing the Duties upon Licences for retailing Wine and Sweets, and upon Licences for retailing Distilled Spirituous Liquors, and for granting other Duties in Lieu thereof.

An Act for laying a Duty on the Importation from any of the Provinces in North America of Rape Seed and all other Seeds used for extracting Oil; and for allowing the Importation from the faid Provinces of Rape Cakes, or Cakes made of Rape Seed, used for Manure, Duty free.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech:

My Lords, and Gentlemen.

THE necessary Public Business being now con-cluded, I think it right to put an End to this Session of Parliament.

I have not hitherto received the Answer of the Court of Spain to the Representation which I have directed to be made at that Court, in Support of the Dignity of My Crown, and of the Interests of My People. I continue to entertain the strongest Desire for the Maintenance of Peace on just and honourable Grounds; but, under the present Circumstances, I feel it indispensably necessary to proceed with Expedition and Vigour in those Preparations, the Objects of which have already reclived your unanimous Concurrence.

The Affurances and Conduct of My Allies on this interesting Occasion have manifested, in the most satisfactory Manner, their Determination to fulfil the Engagements of the existing Treaties; and I trust that Our mutual good Understanding and Concert will be productive of the happiest Estects in the pre-

fent Conjuncture of Affairs in Europe.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I return you my particular Thanks for the Readiness with which you granted the Supplies for the current Service, and for your Unanimity and Dispatch in enabling Me to take those Measures which the present Crisis has rendered necessary.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

As I think it may be of material Convenience that the Election of a new Parliament should take Place without Delay, it is My Intention forthwith to give Directions for diffolving the present and for calling a new Parliament. But, in fignifying to you this Intention, I cannot omit to assure you of the deep and grateful Sense which I must ever entertain of that affectionate and unshaken Loyalty, that uniform and zealous Regard for the true Principles of our invaluable Constitution, and that unremitting Attention to the Happiness and Prosperity of My People, which have invariably directed all your Proceedings.

The rapid Increase of our Manufactures, Commerce, and Navigation, the additional Protection and Security afforded to the distant Possessions of the Empire, the Provisions for the good Government of India, the Improvement of the Public Revenue, and the Establishment of a permanent System for the gradual Reduction of the National Debt, have furnished the best Proofs of your Resolution in encountering the Difficulties with which you had to contend, and of your Steadiness and Perseverance in those Meafures which were best adapted to promote the essential and lasting Interests of My Dominious.

The Loyalty and Public Spirit, the Industry and Enterprize of My Subjects, have seconded your Exertions. On their Semse of the Advantages which they at present experience, as well as on their uniform and affectionate Attachment to My Person and Government, I rely for a Continuance of that Harmony and Confidence, the happy Effects of which have so manifestly appeared thring the present Par-

feat Majefty, intituled, An AA for limiting the Num- liament, and which must, at all Times, afford the furest Means of meeting the Exigencies of War, or of cultivating, with increasing Benefit, the Bleffings of Peace.

WHEREAS We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to dissolve this present Parliament, which now stands prorogued to Tuesday the Third Day of August next: We do, for that End, publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby dissolve the said Parliament accordingly. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs, of the House of Commons, are discharged from their Meeting and Attendance on Tuesday the said Third And We being defirous Day of August next. and resolved, as soon as may be, to meet Our People, and to have their Advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all Our loving Subjects Our Royal Will and Pleasure to call a New Parliament: And do hereby further declare, that, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, We have, this Day, given Order to Our Chancellor of Great Britain to issue out Writs, in due Form, for Calling a New Parliament; which Writs are to bear Teste on Saturday the Twelfth Day of this instant June, and to be returnable on Tuesday the Tenth Day of August following.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Eleventh Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and ninety, in the Thirtieth Year of Our Reign.

GOD Save the KING.

By the KING, A PROCLAMATION,

In order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We have, in Our Council, thought fit to declare Our Pleasure for Summoning and Holding a Parliament of Great Britain, on Tueflay the Tenth Day of August next ensuing the Date hereof: In order, therefore, to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to sit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament, We do, by the Advice of Our Privy Council lifting forth this Our Persyl Proplems Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy Rood House, in Edinburgh, on Saturday the Twentyfourth Day of July next enfuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers, to sit and vote in the House of Peers in the said ensuing Parliament, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be absent, (such Proxies being Peers) and producing a Maidate in Writing, duly figned before Witnesses, and both the Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes; and, immediately after such Election made and duly examined, to certify the Names of the Sixteen Peers so elected, and sign and attest the same, in the Presence of the said Peers the Electors; and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We do, by this Our Proclamation, strictly command and require the Provost of Edinburgh, and all other the Magistrates of the said City, to take especial Care to preserve the Peace thereof, during the Time of the said Election; and to prevent all Manner of Riots, Tumults, Disorders, and Violence whatsoever. And We strictly charge and command, That this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twenty-sive Days at less before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such Election.

Witness Ourself at Westminster, the Eleventh Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and ninety, in the Thirtieth Year of Our Reign.

GOD Save the KING.

N. B. BY the 25th of George III. Chap. 84. Sect. 4. it is enacted as follows: "And whereas Inconveniencies may arise from the Time allowed by the Laws now in Being for proceeding to an Election of a Knight or Knights to ferve in Parliament, for any County or Shire in England or Wales; be it enacted, That, immediately after the Receipt of the Writ for making any such Election, and indorsing on the Back thereof the Day of receiving the same, as by Law required, it shall and may be lawful for the Sheriff of such County or Shire, and he is hereby required; within Two Days after the Receipt thereof, to cause Proclamation to be made at the Place where the ensuing Election ought by Law to be holden, of a special County Court to be there holden, for the Purpose of such Election only, on any Day, Sunday excepted, not later from the Day of making such Proclamation than the Sixteenth Day, nor fooner than the Tenth Day; and that he shall proceed in such Election, at such special County Court, in the same Manner as if the said Election was to be held at a County Court, or at an adjourned County Court, according to the Laws now in Being: Provided always, that the usual County Court for all other Purposes, or any Adjournment made thereof, shall take Place, be held, and proceeded in, by the Sheriff, or his Deputy, and may, from Time to Time, be further adjourned and proceeded in, in fuch and the same Manner, and at the same Times and Places, as if the Writ for the Election of a Knight or Knights of the Shire had not been received."
