That the Sitting Member Lord John Townshend delivered in a Statement as follows: " The Right of Election is in the Inhabitants, Householders of the Parishes of Saint Margaret and Saint John, Saint George Hanover-Square, Saint James Westminster, Saint Martin in the Fields, Saint Clement Danes, Saint Mary-le-Strand, Saint Mary-le-Savoy, Saint Paul Covent-Garden, Saint Ann Soho, and the District of Saint Martin-le-Grand." That upon the Statements delivered in by the Petitioners the said Select Committee have determined, " That the Right of Election for the City and Liberty of Westminster is in the Inhabitants, Householders paying Scot and Lot, within the united Parishes of Saint Margaret and Saint John, and the several Parishes of Saint Paul Covent-Garden, Saint Ann, Saint James, Saint George Hanover-Square, in the Liberty of Saint Martin-le-Grand in the County of Middlesex, and in so much of the Parishes of Saint Martin in the Fields, Saint Clement Danes, and Saint Mary-le-Strand, as are not within any of the Four Wards of the Liberty of the Dutchy of Lancaster." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Sitting Member the Committee have determined, " That Right of Election, as set forth in the said Statement, is not the Right of Election for the said City and Liberty of Westminster."

That the Petitioners are advised, and humbly insist, that the Right of Election, which hath been deemed valid in the Judgment of the said Select Committee, is not the ancient and true Right of Election for the said City and Liberty; and therefore pray that they may be admitted as Parties to oppose the Right of Election which has been deemed valid in the Judgment of the said Select Committee; and that the Petitioners may have such further and other Relief in the Premises as to the House shall seem meet, and the Nature of the Case may require: I do hereby give Notice that the House has appointed Tuesday the Twenty-seventh Day of July next, at Three of the Clock in the Afternoon, to take the said Petition into Consideration. WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, That there are at this Time several Deserters from the different Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's gracious Pardon, and that such an Instance of His Royal Clemency would have due Influence upon their future Behavior; His Majesty is pleased to grant His free Pardon to all Deserters from His Land Forces who shall surrender themselves before the Tenth Day of July next, either to the Regiments to which they belong, or to some other Corps in His Majesty's Service, or to any Recruiting Party in Great Britain or Ireland.

Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men and fit for Service, shall be attested in the Corps to which they surrender, and not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged.

And whereas many of the said Deserters may have enlisted in other Corps, and are now serving therein; His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon, and to direct,

that they shall continue to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, and not be claimed by that in which they formerly served.

And whereas several of the said Deserters have been apprehended, and are now in Gaol or in Regimental Custody; His Majesty is likewise pleased to grant to them His free Pardon, of which they are to have the Benefit upon their Arrival at their respective Regiments, or upon their being enlisted by some other Corps, or Recruiting Party.

Any Soldier who may desert, after these His Majesty's most gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.
