Intelligence has been received here, that the Senate of Venice has lately issued a Decree, suppressing the extraordinary Duty on Ships (called Novissimo) for the Term of Five Years, and allowing Ships of any Nation to load Currants at this and the neighbouring Islands, paying only the ordinary Duties; without requiring the Ships, in the first Instance, to bring their Cargoes to Venice, which they were obliged to do by the former Regulations.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that, in the Night between the 29th and 30th Days of March last, several Stacks of Corn, in the Barn Yard of Glencarse, in the Parish of Kinfauns and County of Perth, were burned to the Ground; and that, from several Circumstances it appears evident, that this Fire did not happen from Accident, but that the said Stacks were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire:

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in setting Fire to the said Stacks of Corn as above mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually set Fire thereto) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
