

under the Command of M. de Bron, having entered the Austrian Territory by Queivrain, and advanced beyond Bouffut, were opposed by Lieutenant-General Beaulieu, at the Head of 1,800 Infantry and between 14 and 1500 Cavalry, and obliged, with the Loss of 20 Men killed, and several wounded, to retire towards Bouffut and the Forest of Bouffut, where, however, they remained in Sight of the Austrians.

That, on the Day following, at Day-Break, the French put themselves in Motion to attack Lieutenant-General Beaulieu, who had, in the mean Time, been reinforced by Two Battalions, and who advanced Part of his Troops to meet the French. A short Action took Place, which ended in the complete Rout of the latter, who lost, on this Occasion, about 250 Men killed, a considerable Number taken Prisoners, and Five Pieces of Cannon. The French, by Eleven o'Clock the same Morning, had already repassed the Austrian Frontiers, and retreated towards Valenciennes.

**A**t the Lent Assizes, 1792, for the County of Cambridge, an Indictment was found by the Grand Jury against Spence Broughton and John Oxley for robbing the Cambridge Mail, near Bourn Bridge, on the 9th of June last; and at the same Assizes for the County of York an Indictment was likewise found against them for robbing the Mail between Sheffield and Rotherham on the 29th of January, 1791; on which last Indictment Broughton was tried and convicted.

Oxley escaped out of Clerkenwell Bridewell on the 31st of October last.

He is about Twenty-five Years of Age, Five Feet Ten Inches high, pale faced, rather pitted with the Small Pox, and his Nose turned a little to the Right.

#### Royal Lancashire Militia.

Notice for Annual Exercise at Preston, the 30th Day of July, 1792.

**I**n pursuance of the Directions of an Act passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, entitled, An Act for amending and reducing into One Act of Parliament the Laws relating to the Militia in that Part of Great Britain called England; Notice is hereby given, that the Battalion of the Royal Lancashire Militia is to assemble at Preston on Monday the 30th Day of July next, there to be trained and exercised for the Space of Twenty-four Days, exclusive of the Two allowed for coming and Two for returning.

The Act directs that every Militia Man or Substitute, as well those who were exercised last Year, as those who were dismissed, who shall not appear at the Time and Place appointed, shall be deemed a Deserter; and if taken during the Time of Exercise, shall be liable to Punishment by Military Law; if not taken till after the Time of Exercise, shall forfeit and pay the Sum of Twenty Pounds, or in Default of Payment shall be committed to Prison for the Space of Six Months, or until he shall have paid the said Penalty.
