THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Consolidated Fund, for applying a certain Sum of Money therein mentioned, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.

An Act for the Encouragement and Relief of Friendly Societies.

An Act to authorize Justices of the Peace to impose Fines upon Constables, Overseers and other Peace or Parish Officers, for Neglect of Duty, and on Masters of Apprentices for ill Usage of such their Apprentices; and also to make Provision for the Execution of Warrants of Distress granted by Magistrates.

An Act for enlarging, deepening, cleansing, improving and regulating the Harbour of Amblewich, in the Isle of Anglesey.

An Act for making a new Street from St. George's Road, in the Parish of Christ Church, in the County of Surrey, through Holland's Leagure, into and across the Green Walk, and from thence into Gravel Lane, in the said Parish; and for discontinuing, as a Public Highway, Part of a Street called the Upper Ground Street, in the said Parish.

An Act for reviving, continuing and amending an Act passed in the Eleventh Year of the Reign of His present Majesty for repairing and widening the Road leading from Penistone Bridge, in the County of York,

to Grindleford Bridge, in the County of Derby, and the Roads severally leading from Bamford Woodgate, over Yorkshire Bridge, to the Guide Post on Thornhill Moor, to or near the Eighth Mile Stone on Hathersage Moor, and to the Village of Darwent, in the said County of Derby

And to Three Private Bills.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech:

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE Firmness, Wisdom and Public Spirit, by which your Conduct has been eminently distinguished on the many important Occasions which have arisen during the present Session, demand My peculiar Acknowledgements.

Your firm Determination to support the established Constitution, and the zealous and general Concurrence in that Sentiment which My Subjects have so strongly and seasonably manifested, could not fail to check every Attempt to disturb the internal Repose of these Kingdoms; and you will, I doubt not, in your several Counties, encourage the Continuance of the same vigilant Attention to that important Object.

The rapid and signal Successes which in an early Period of the Campaign have attended the Operations of the Combined Armies; the respectable and powerful Force which you have enabled Me to employ by Sea and Land, and the Measures which I have concerted with other Powers for the effectual Prosecution of the War, afford the best Prospect of an happy Issue to the important Contest in which We are engaged: It is only by Perseverance in vigorous Exertions, and by endeavouring to improve the Advantages already acquired, that we can hope to obtain the great End to which My Views are uniformly directed, the Restoration of Peace on such Terms as may be consistent with Our permanent Security, and with the general Tranquillity of Europe.

Gentlemen

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I return you My particular Thanks for the Cheerfulness and Dispatch with which you have granted the necessary Supplies; and I am happy to reflect that you have been enabled liberally to provide for the Exigencies of the Public Service in a Manner so little burthenome to My People.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The Arrangements which you have formed for the Government of the British Territories in India, and for the Regulation of Our Commerce with that Part of the World, will, I doubt not, secure and augment the important Benefits which We have already derived from those valuable Possessions. It has been impossible for Me to see, without Concern, the Embarrassment which has lately arisen in the State of Commercial Credit, but the Steps which you have taken to prevent the Progress of that Evil appear already to have been productive of very salutary Consequences; and while they have afforded a striking Instance of your Attention to the Interests of My People, their Effect has furnished additional Reason to believe that the Distress which has been felt proceeded from a Concurrence of temporary Causes, and not from any Diminution of the real Wealth, or any Failure in the permanent Resources of the Country.

I have much Satisfaction in reflecting on the effectual Protection which I have been enabled to afford to the Trade of My Subjects since the breaking out of the War; I am at the same Time persuaded that if Our Commercial Interests had unavoidably been affected to a more considerable Extent, it would not have been forgotten that We are contending for Our future Security, and for the permanent Preservation of Advantages, the most striking and the most valuable which any Nation has ever, by the Blessing of Providence, been permitted to enjoy.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's Command, said;

WHEREAS at the Election of Peers of Scotland to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of Great Britain, Fifteen Peers of Scotland only were duly elected for that Purpose: In order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in the said House, We do, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy Rood House in Edinburgh, on Wednesday the Seventh Day of August next, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and chuse another Peer of Scotland to sit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of Great Britain, by open Election

and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall then be present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be absent, such Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing duly signed before Witnesses, and both constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law :) And the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes; and, immediately after such Election made and duly examined, to certify the Name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the same in the Presence of the said Peers, the Electors, and return such Certificate into our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We strictly charge and command that this Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns in Scotland, Twenty-five Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such Election: Given at Our Court at St. James's the Twenty-first Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, in the Thirty-third Year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December last, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under

under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February last, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports, or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirtieth Day of this instant June: And it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the said Thirtieth Day of this instant June to the Thirty-first Day of August next, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to amend an Act made in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of

"Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn-imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, and He and They is and are thereby authorized, with Advice of His or Their Privy Council, at any Time when the General Average Price of any Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, taken as in the said Act passed in the last Session of Parliament is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the same Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from Ireland or the Province of Quebec, or the other British Colonies and Plantations in North America, at the first Low Duties specified in the Table marked E. in the said Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from England and Scotland respectively, as the Case may be, of any such Sort of Corn or other Articles mentioned in the said Acts; and in like Manner, at any Time when the Average Price of any Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland respectively, taken as in the said Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, is directed, shall appear to be at or above the Price at or above which Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour of the same Sort is allowed by Law to be imported from any other Foreign Country at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E. to permit generally the Importation into England or Scotland respectively, as the Case may be, or the taking out of Warehouse for Home Consumption, of any such Sort of Foreign Corn, Meal or Flour, on Payment of the second Low Duty only, and no other; and in the like Manner to recal such Prohibition or Permission, if Circumstances shall appear so to require: Provided always, that as often as the Importation of any Sort of Corn, Meal or Flour, on the Low Duties, shall be permitted by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, such Permission shall continue in Force for the Space of Three Months at least from the Date of the Order in Council made for that Purpose, unless such Order be made before the Thirtieth Day of June, 1793.

And whereas it appears from the Returns received in the Week ending the Fifteenth Day of June, 1793, that the General Average Prices of Wheat, Rye, Peas, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, in that Part of Great Britain called England, are above the Prices at which Wheat, Wheat-Meal and Flour, Rye, Peas, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats and Oatmeal, are allowed by Law to be imported at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E.;

E.; His Majesty therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers given by the said Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this present Order, until the Thirty-first Day of August, 1793, or until such Time as His Majesty shall think fit to revoke this present Order, no Person or Persons whatsoever shall, directly or indirectly, export, transport, transported, carried or conveyed out of or from any carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, or load or lay on board, or cause or procure to be loaded or laid on board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, any Wheat, Rye, Peas, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof.

And whereas it appears, from the Returns received in the Month immediately preceding the Fifteenth Day of May, 1793, that the General Average Prices of Barley, Beer or Bigg, Peas, Beans, Oats and Oatmeal, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, are above the Prices at which Foreign Barley, Beer or Bigg, Peas, Beans, Oats and Oatmeal, are allowed by Law to be imported at the first Low Duty specified in the said Table marked E.; His Majesty therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers given by the said Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the Date of this present Order, until the Thirty-first Day of August, 1793, or until such Time as His Majesty shall think fit to revoke this present Order, no Person or Persons whatsoever shall, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed, out of or from any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, or load or lay on board, or cause or procure to be loaded or laid on board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of any such Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, any Barley, Beer or Bigg, Peas, Beans or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof.

His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prohibit the Exportation from England of any Foreign Wheat, Rye, Peas, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Oats, nor of any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof, nor from Scotland of any Foreign Barley, Beer or Bigg, Peas, Beans or Oats, or any Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made thereof, that shall have been imported, and shall be warehoused in Manner and on the

Conditions mentioned in the said Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, nor to prevent the carrying Coastwise, (except as is hereinafter excepted) or carrying out; or the Exportation of the said several Sorts of Corn or other Articles as aforesaid, from England and Scotland respectively, for any of the Purposes mentioned in either of the said Two Acts, in like Manner, and in the same Proportions and Quantities, and from and to the same Ports and Places, as is by the said Acts allowed, at such Times as any of the several Sorts of Corn, or other Articles before mentioned, are prohibited to be exported, by reason of the Price of such Sort of Corn or of Oatmeal being at or above the Prices mentioned in Table B. in the said Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, contained, subject to the like Securities, Conditions, Regulations and Restrictions, Forfeitures and Penalties, as are in either of the said Two Acts, or by any other Act now in Force, in any such Case required and imposed; nor to prohibit the Exportation of such Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, which shall have been entered Outwards, and shall have been actually shipped or laden on board, or so much thereof expressed in such Entry, as shall have been so shipped or laden on board at the Time of the Date of this present Order, in the same Manner as if this Prohibition to export had not been made.

Provided, nevertheless, that any such Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, shall not be permitted to be carried Coastwise, or to be otherwise carried from any Port, from which the Exportation thereof is not, at the Time of Shipping the same, allowed by Law, and be landed and unshipped at any other Port from which the same may then be legally exported.

And His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit further to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, from and after the Date of this present Order, until the Thirty-first Day of August, 1793, it shall be lawful to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called England, and to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any Foreign Wheat, Wheat Meal or Flour, Rye, Peas, Beans, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Oats or Oatmeal, and also to import into any Port or Place in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, and to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any Foreign Barley, Peas, Oats and Oatmeal, on Payment of the second Duty only, mentioned in the said Table marked E. and no other.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 7th of December, 1792, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, expired upon the 7th Day of this instant June: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 7th Day of this instant June, presume to transport, into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twentieth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Edward Pellew, of His Majesty's Ship *La Nymphe*, to Mr. Stephens, dated off Portland, June 19, 1793.

I Have the Honor to inform you, that, at Day-light Yesterday Morning, I was so fortunate as to fall in with the National French Frigate, *La Cleopatra*, mounting Forty Guns, and manned with 320 Men, commanded by Monsieur Jean Mullon, Three Days from St. Maloes, and had taken nothing.

We brought her to close Action at Half past Six, and in Fifty-five Minutes took Possession of her; the two Ships having fallen on board each other, we boarded her from the Quarter-Deck, and struck her Colours; and, finding it impossible to clear the Ships, then hanging Head and Stern, we came to Anchor, which divided us, after we had received on board 150 Prisoners. The Enemy fought us like brave Men, neither Ship firing a Shot until we had hailed. Her Captain was killed, Three Lieutenants wounded; the Number of Men not yet ascertained, but, from the best Accounts, about Sixty; her Mizzen-Mast overboard, and her Tiller shot off.

I am extremely concerned she was not purchased at a less Expence of valuable Officers and Men on our Part, whose Loss I cannot sufficiently regret, and to whose Gallantry I cannot possibly do Justice. We had Twenty-three Men killed, and Twenty-seven wounded, of which a List is enclosed.

I am very particularly indebted to my First Lieutenant, Mr. Amherst Morris, and no less so to Lieutenants George Luke and Richard Pellew, and I was ably seconded on the Quarter-Deck by Lieutenant John Whitaker, of the Marines, and Mr. Thomson, the Master; and I hope I do not presume in recommending those Officers to their Lordships Protection and Favour: And I should do Injustice to my Brother, Captain Israel Pellew, who was accidentally on board, if I could possibly omit saying how much I owe him for his very distinguished Firmness, and the encouraging Example he held forth to a young Ship's Company, by taking upon him the Directions of some Guns on the Main Deck.

Intelligence has been received here, that the Dutch Forces quartered at Menin, and a Part of those at Ipres, had received Orders to march, on the 11th Instant, at Midnight, in Two Columns, with a View to surround a Body of French Troops in the Neighbourhood of Vervick: That the Column under the Command of the Prince of Waldeck attacked one of the Enemies Batteries, and were on the Point of carrying it, when the Prince was dangerously wounded in the Breast and Thigh, and they were thrown into Confusion and retreated. This Corps being soon afterwards supported by the Arrival of the Column from

from Ipres, under the Command of Prince Frederick of Orange, renewed the Attack, and took Possession of Vervick. The Dutch have lost on this Occasion between 50 and 60 Men killed, amongst whom are Five Officers. The Loss on the Part of the French is supposed to amount to 400 Men killed, and upwards of 100 taken Prisoners, besides several Pieces of Cannon.

The Prince of Waldeck died Yesterday of his Wounds.

The Transports from England arrived here this Morning without any Accident, and are safely moored in this Harbour.
