And His Majesty doth strictly charge and command, That no Edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed but in the Form aforementioned; and that in the mean Time, and until Copies of such Edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars and Curates within this Realm, do (for the preventing of Mistakes) with the Pen, correct and amend all such

Prayers in their Church Books, according to the aforegoing Direction: And, for the better Notice hereof, that this Order be forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several Parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take Care that Obedience be paid to the same accordingly.

HIS Catholic Majesty having conferred on his Excellency the Marquis del Campo, his Ambasfador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary at this Court, the Grand Cross of the Order of Charles the Third of Spain, (he being already a Knight of that Order) and having requested that His Majesty would be pleased to invest his Excellency with the Ensigns thereof, the Marquis was, after the Levee, introduced to the King by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, preceded by Don Carlos Martinez de Yrujo, Secretary of the Spanish Embassy, bearing, on a Crimson Velvet Cushion, the Ensigns of the faid Order, accompanied by Don Manuel De Las Heras, Conful-General of Spain; and advancing into His Majesty's Presence, with the usual Reverences, his Excellency knelt down, and the King put the Ribband, with the Badge of the Order pendant thereto, over his Excellency's Right Shoulder, and delivered to him the Star. This being done, the Ambassador to him the Star. rose up, and His Majesty was graciously pleased to congratulate him on this distinguished Mark of his Sovereign's Approbation. His Excellency then returned his Thanks, in the most respectful Manner, to His Majesty; and, withdrawing from the Royal Closet, received the Compliments of the Great Officers and. other Persons of Distinction present.

Extract of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Colonys to
Mr. Nepean, dated on Board His Majefty's Ship
London, at Spithead, the 16th of April, 1795.

PLEASE to acquaint the Lords Commissioners of
the Admiralty of my Arrival here with His Majesty's Ships under my Command:

That on the 29th of March Le Jean: Bart, a French Corvette, of 20 Guns and 120 Men, bound to Brest, was captured by His Majesty's Ships Cerberus and Santa Margaretta; she had been charged with Dispatches from the French Minister in America:

That on the 30th of March the Robust recaptured the Caldicott Castle, of Chepstow, from Barcelona, bound to Guernsey; she was taken on the 18th of March, off Cape St. Vincent's, by Six French Ships of the Line, Two Frigates and a Corvette:

That on the 10th Instant we discovered and gave Chace to Three French Frigates, which soon shaped different Courses. I made the Signal for the Hannibal and Robust to follow the Two which pointed most to the Westward. The Astrea, Lord Henry Powiett, with his accustomed Promptitude and Attention, kept after the largest and seemingly best goer of the Three, with which he closed about Teno'Clock at Night, and obliged her to surrender, after a well-fought Action of 58 Minutes, which does great Credit to his Lordship's good Conduct, as well as the Discipline of his Officers and Ship's Company. The Particulars I transmit in a Copy of his Lordship's Letter to me, which accompanies this.

P. S. The Robust joined me off the Isle of Wight. Captain Thornbrough reports that La Gentille, of 40 Guns, was taken on Saturday last by the Hannibal, but that La Fraternité escaped.

Copy of a Letter from Lord Henry Powlett, Captain of His Majesty's Ship Astrea, to Regr-Admirel Colpoys, acied at Sea, the 11th of April, 1795. Lat. 49 deg. 30 min. N. Long. 10 deg. 46 min. W. S. I.R.

IN Obedience to your Signal from the London, Yesterday Morning, I gave Chaee to the North-West, and at Ten o'Clock at Night came up with and engaged La Gloire, French National Frigate, mounting 26 Twelve-Pounders on the Main Deck, 10 Six-Pounders and 4 Thirty-six-Pounder Carronades on the Quarter-Deck, and 2 Six-Pounders on the Forecastle; having on Board 275 Men. After a close Action of 58 Minutes she struck.

It is very satisfactory to me to be able to say, that I had no Person killed, and only Eight Men wounded; Three of them, I am forry to add, are in some Danger. I am also very sorry to say that the Slaughter on Board the Enemy has been very considerable; the Killed and Woanded, from the best Accounts I have been able to collect, amounting to Forty: Among the latter is her Captain, Citizen Beens, who received a Contusion on the Head.—He seems to be an able, humane, and intelligent Officer.

I have fent Mr. Talbot, my First Lleutenant, on Board La Gloire, which will I hope meet your Approbation. I must not omittee mention the just Senie I entertain of his Services and good Conduct upon this Occasion; and it gives me the greatest Pleasure to add, that the Conduct of the Officers and Ships Company in general afforded me particular Satisfaction.

The Two Frigates, after which you dispatched His Majesty's Ships Hantibal and Robust, are exactly of the same Force with La Gloire. They had been Three Weeks out from Brest, and had made but One Capture, a small Spanish Brig.
