A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the First Day of October next; We, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said First Day of October, to Thursday the Twenty-ninth Day of October, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-five: And We have given Order to Our Chancellor of Great Britain to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly: And We do hereby further declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Twenty-ninth Day of October, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-five, be held for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burghes, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give Attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said Twenty-ninth Day of October, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-five.

Given at Our Court at Weymouth, the Fifteenth Day of September, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-five, in the Thirty-fifth Year of Our Reign.

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Countries belonging to the United Provinces have, for some Time past, been, and still continue, in the Possession of the Armies of France, and under the immediate Influence and Direction of the Persons who exercise the Powers of Government in France: And whereas divers injurious Proceedings have lately been had in the said United Provinces, in Derogation of the Honour of His Majesty's Crown, and the just Rights of His Subjects; and Ships of War, fitted out from the Ports of the said United Provinces, have received Orders to take and destroy all British Vessels, and some British Vessels have been actually so taken:—His Majesty, therefore, being determined to take such Measures as are necessary for vindicating the Honour of His Crown, and for procuring Reparation and Satisfaction, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that General Reprizals be granted against the Ships, Goods and Subjects of the United Provinces, so that as well His Majesty's Fleet and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vessels that shall be commissioned by Letters of Marque or General Reprizals, or otherwise, by His Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully seize all Ships, Vessels

Vessels and Goods belonging to the United Provinces, or their Subjects, or others inhabiting within any of the Territories of the aforesaid United Provinces, and bring the same to Judgment in any of the Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominion: And to that End His Majesty's Advocate General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are forthwith to prepare the Draught of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorizing the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, or any Person or Persons by them empowered and appointed, to issue forth and grant Letters of Marque and Reprizal to any of His Majesty's Subjects, or others, whom the said Commissioners shall deem fitly qualified in that Behalf, for the apprehending, seizing and taking the Ships, Vessels and Goods belonging to the United Provinces, and their Vassals and Subjects, or any inhabiting within the Countries, Territories or Dominions of the aforesaid United Provinces; and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents. And His Majesty's said Advocate General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are also forthwith to prepare the Draught of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorizing the said Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral to will and require the High Court of Admiralty of Great Britain and the Lieutenant and Judge of the said Court, his Surrogate or Surrogates, as also the several Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions, to take Cognizance of, and judicially proceed upon all and all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes and Reprizals of all Ships and Goods that are or shall be taken, and to hear and determine the same; and, according to the Course of Admiralty, and the Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemn all such Ships, Vessels and Goods as shall belong to the United Provinces, or their Vassals and Subjects, or to any others inhabiting within any of the Countries, Territories and Dominions of the aforesaid United Provinces; and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents: And they are likewise to prepare, and lay before His Majesty at this Board, a Draught of such Instructions as may be proper to be sent to the Courts of Admiralty in His Majesty's Foreign Governments and Plantations, for their Guidance herein; as also another Draught of Instructions for such Ships as shall be commissioned for the Purposes aforementioned.

P R E S E N T.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 15th of July last, to order, That no Person or Persons whatever should, until further Order, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed, any Rice out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain; or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be loaded or laid on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, any Rice, in order to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, (except as in the said Order is excepted): And whereas it has been represented by the Merchants, Importers of Rice from South Carolina, That the various Dealers in the Article of Rice, for Home Consumption, being amply supplied, the said Importers can no longer find Sale for considerable Quantities which remain on Hand, and that they are apprehensive, if the said Prohibition continues, that a very small Portion of the new Crop of Rice will be brought to this Kingdom; His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, is pleased, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That the said Prohibition, laid by His Majesty's said Order in Council of the 15th Day of July last, be taken off, and that the Exportation of Rice be permitted and allowed, upon the same Conditions, and under the same Restrictions, as before the issuing of the said Order of the 15th Day of July last, and as if such Order had not been made; any Thing in the said Order contained to the contrary notwithstanding. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

Yesterday being the Feast of St. Lewis, and the Name-Day of the Queen, it was celebrated at Court with unusual Magnificence. In the Evening the following Marriages were solemnized in the great Apartment of the Palace, viz. the Infanta Donna Maria, eldest Daughter of the King, with her Uncle the Infant Don Antonio, Brother to the King, and the Infanta Donna Maria Louisa, second Daughter to His Majesty, with the Hereditary Prince of Parma, who is declared Infant of Spain.
