The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, 1792, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by his said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, 1793, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or

by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, hath been prolonged and extended to the Twenty-eighth Day of this instant February; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended, from the said Twenty-eighth Day of this instant February to the Thirtieth Day of April next inclusive:—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Now be it known that the said [Person's Name] hath Licence to lade on board the said Ship [Ship's Name], at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, the Produce of the said United States, and no other Article whatsoever, and to carry the said Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock to some Port or Place in the Island of Newfoundland; and on the Arrival of the said Ship, at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of the said Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and the Number of Live Stock, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

**I** Request you will inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that on the 18th Instant, at Seven A.M. I fell in with, Five Leagues to the Westward of Beachy-Head, Le Tartane French Privateer Brig, of Sixteen Guns, Four-Pounders, and Sixty Men, from Dieppe, on a Cruize, had taken nothing.

I feel myself much obliged to Captain Cheshyre, of His Majesty's Sloop Plover, on seeing the Greyhound in Chace, and his being to Leeward, by hawling athwart, occasioned the Capture of the Privateer much sooner than the otherwise would have been.

**Y**OU will be pleased to acquaint their Lordships, that His Majesty's Ship Eurydice, Captain Talbot, arrived here Yesterday, and has brought in with

him a fine French Lugger Privateer. I inclose herewith a Copy of his Letter to me, giving an Account of her Capture.

*Eurydice, in the Downes, February 11, 1797.*

S I R,

**L**AST Sunday Morning, immediately on receiving the Intelligence you sent me by the Phoenix Cutter, relative to the Privateers which have sailed from Ostend and Dunkirk, I proceeded, together with the Queen and Narcissus Cutters, to the Northward, in Hopes of meeting with some of them.

On Monday Night, at Half past Nine o'Clock, being then a few Leagues to the Southward and Westward of the Galloper, we fell in with and captured, after a Chace of Three Hours and an Half, Le Flibustier, French Lugger Privateer, of Sixty Tons, mounting Fourteen Four and Three Pounders, with Six Swivels, and manned with Sixty-three Men: She had sailed the Night before from Dunkirk, and had not taken any Thing; is a very fine Vessel, sails fast, and was bound to the Northward to cruize for our Baltic Trade.
