DISPATCH, of which the following is an A Extract, has been received by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majetty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from Colonel Graham, dated Head Quarters of His Royal Highnels the Archduke Charles, at Vippach, March 20, 1797.

IN my last Dispatch from Udiné of the 14th In-stant, I had the Honour of informing your Lordthip that the Archduke's Head Quarters were just going to be moved forward to Paperiano, near Codroipo, in Confequence of a Report of the French Army being in Motion towards the Piavé. This intelligence was foon after confirmed, with the additional Account of General Maffena's having pe-netrated by Feltri into the upper Valley of the Piavé, and defeated General Lufignan near Bel-lerno; but it was still doubtful whether their principal Corps was advancing towards the Tagliamento merely to cover General Massena's Column, or to undertake offensive Operations. On the 15th General Hohenzollern, who had been

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left with a Detachment on the Piavé, retired behind the Tagliamento, where the Imperial Army was cantoned. On the 16th, about Ten A.M. the Enemy advanced by the high Road of Val-valone, and pulhed fome fmall Parties of Cavalry and Infantry acrofs the River, which, from the extraordinary Drought of the Seafon, was every where fordable, but these were driven back with some A distant Cannonade was then kept up during Lofs. the reft of the Day till Four P. M. when the Enemy, having formed a very ftrong Column of a Demi-Brigade in Front, intermixed with Cavalry and Artillery, advanced tapidly, and croffed the River near the upper End of the extensive and open Plain, oc-cupied by Twelve weak Squadrons. His Royal Highness's personal Exertions could not prevent these from yielding to fuch fuperior Force. After this fuccessful Attack by the Enemy's Left, their Right Wing croffed the River without Oppolition; but the Progrefs of their numerous Cavalry was checked by the fleady Behaviour of the Regiment of Puis, poffed at the End of the Plain next to Codroipo.

The reft of the Infantry was under Arms further back, near their Cantonments, and was not engaged. On feeing the Enemy's Force, which both in Ca-valry and Infantry was greatly fuperior to that of the Imperial Army, the Archduke ordered a Retreat after Sunfet. The Head Quarters were that Night at Ontagnaul, and were removed on the 17th to Vifco; behind Palma, which, not being in a State of Defence; was evacuated on the 18th; the Head Quarters being removed to Gorice.

On the 19th the Enemy advanced towards the Ifonzo, in Two Columns, above and below Gradifka, which ferved as a Tête du Pont over that River. Their Left was repulfed in an Attempt to florm. Gradiska, but their Right found little Difficulty in croffing the River near Cassegliano, though in ordinary Seafons it is fcarcely any where fordable; and as they might there turn the Left of the Position of Gorice it became neceflary to abandon it.

The Head Quarters came here this Morning.
