Copy of a Letter from Vice-Admiral King smill, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Cork, dated September the 13th, 1797, to Evan Nepsan, Esq;

I Request you will acquaint my Lords Commissioners of the Admirate, that His Majesty's Sh p Dryad returned here Yesterday; and also that you will lay before their Lordships the accompanying Letter from Lord Amelius Beauclerk, giving Account of his having sunk a French Brig Privateer, La Cornelie, of Nautz, mounting 12 Guns.

Dryad, Cork Harbour, Sept. 12, 1797.

SIR,

I Have to inform you, that on the 9th Instant, at Eight P. M. in Latitude 50 deg. Longitude 73 deg. we discovered a Sail to the S. F. At Half past Nine we came alongside of her, after various Manceuvres on her Part to get away; the Consequence of which was, I was under the Necessity of firing several Shot at her, which proved in the End her Destruction; running alongside of her for some Time, frequently desiring of her to bring to, but without Essect; when all of a sudden I heard a great Noise from her, and was informed his Vessel was on Fire. Fearing the Consequence of that, I sheered off a little, but soon found he was sinking, upon which I ordered him to run on Board of us; but I believe she was then too far gone, as I perceived her to settle very sast, and in a few Minutes she went down. I immediately hoisted the Boats
