My Lord, Kilkenny, June 26, 1798.

EARING the Confequences that must result from allowing the Debelson. from allowing the Rebels who fled from Wexford to remain any Length of Time in this County, I preferred attacking them with a small Number of Men to waiting till a Reinforcement arrived. My Force amounted to 1100 Men. The Rebels confifted of about 5000. I attacked them this Morning at fix o'Clock in their Position at Kilconnel Hill, near Gore's Bridge, and foon defeated them. Their Chief, called Murphy, a Priest, and upwards of 1000 Men, were killed. Ten Pieces of Cannon and Two Swivels, the Colours, and Quantities of Ammunition, Arms, Cattle, &c. were taken; and I have the Pleasure to add that some Soldiers, who were made Prisoners the Day before, and who were doomed to suffer Death, were fortunately released by our Troops. Our Loss consisted of seven Men killed and wounded. The Remainder of the Rebels were purfued into the County of Wexford, where they dispersed in different Directions.

I feel particularly obliged to Major Matthews, of the Downshire Militia, who, at a short Notice and with great Alacrity, marched with 400 Men of his Regiment, and Captain Poole's and Captain Gore's Yeomanry Corps from Maryboro', to co-operate with me, Lord Loftus, and Colonel Ram of the Wexford Militia, Lieutenant-Colonel Howard, and Lieutenant-Colonel Radcliffe; of the Wicklow. Major Donaldson, of the Ninth Dragoons, who commanded the Cavalry, as well as all the Officers and Privates, are entitled to my Thanks for their fpirited Exertions. Nor can I withhold the Praises fo justly due to all the Yeomanry Corps employed

on this Occasion.

I also beg Leave to mention my Aid-de-Camp, Captain Ogle, and Lieutenant Higgins, of the Ninth Dragoons, who has acted as my Brigade Major.

My Lord, Dublin Caftle, June 25, 1798.

HAVE the Honour to acquaint your Grace that this Day Advices were received from Lieut. Gardner of the Antrim Militia, dated from Baltinglas the 26th Instant, which state, that early in the Morning of the 25th, a very large Body of Rebels attacked his Post at Hacketstown. They were in Number many Thousands. Lieutenant Gardner's Force consisted of 50 Upper Talbotstown, and 24 Shebagh Cavalry, 50 of the Antrim Regiment, 46 Hacketstown, and 30 Coolattin Yeoman Infantry. He at first took an advantageous Situation in Front of the Town; but, after a few Shots without Effect, the Rebels filed off in every Direction to furround him. He then retreated into the Town to defend the Barracks. A Contest took place in the Midst of Flames for near nine Hours, for the Rebels fet Fire to the Town. They were at last repulsed with considerable Loss; many Dead were found in the Streets and Ditches, and 30 Car Loads of Killed and Wounded were carried off in their Retreat.

Lieutenant Gardner speaks in the highest Terms of the Gallantry of his whole Detachment. He particularly praises Lieutenant Rowan of the Antrim, Captain Hume of the Upper Talbotstown Cavalry, Captain and Lieutenant Charnley of the Coolattin, Lieutenants Saul and Thomas of the Hallanders Captain and Lieutenant Charnley and Lieutenants Braddell and Hacketstown Cavalry, and Lieutenants Braddell and Taylor of the Shebagh Cavalry; and he strongly mentions the good Conduct of Serjeant Nixon of the Antrim Regiment.

He feverely laments the Lofs of a good Officer, Captain Hardy of the Hacketstown Yeomen Infantry, who fell early in the Action. His other Loss consists of 10 Privates killed, and of 1 Serjeant

and 19. Privates wounded.

I inclose to your Grace a further Account of the Action near Goresbridge, and a Return of Killed and Wounded, which has been received from Major-General Sir Charles Afgill.

Fourteen Guns, but having only Seven mounted, and Four Swivels, manned with Thirty Men; slie has been Six Week's from Holland.

Ieutenant Rofs, Commander of His Majesty's Schooner Recovery, having captured the Privateers mentioned in a Letter to Captain Brooking, and which has been transmitted to me, I fend you enclosed a Copy of the said Letter, which I desire you will be pleased to lay before my Lords Com-missioners of the Admiralty, not doubting but they will highly approve of the Conduct of that Officer.

You will also receive on the other Side a List of Armed Veffels taken or destroyed by the Cruizers under my Command, fince my last.

and 40 Ditto and Ceres, St. Mary de Lovaine, do. 2 Montego Bay, May 1, 1798. SIR, Beg Leave to inform you that on the 17th Ultimo, at Ten A.M. the French Privateer Schooner Re-La Revanche struck to His Majesty's Schooner Re-covery, under my Command, after engaging from 45 to 50 Minutes. La Revanche is pierced for 12 Guns, and had to Guns and 54 Men on board when the engaged. She belonged to Cape François, captured to Veffels last Cruize, and to the preceding one. She was commanded by Citizen Antoing Martin, who shortened Sail, and hove to, to engage me. I had the Weather Gage of him, and went within Piftol Shot before we commenced firing. The Enemy had three Men killed and nine wounded, four of them not expected to recover; the Hull and Riglatter Part of the Action, he endeavoured to effect his Escape by the Use of his Sweeps, for he had not

a Sail to fet except his Standing Jib.

I am happy to add, that His Majesty's Schooner has not received any Damage, excepting one Gundimounted and some small Shot in her Masts, &c. nor are any of her small Crew hurt. They are most of them young and inexperienced Boys and Lads, but it is with real Satisfaction I affure you, that all of them displayed the greatest Chearfulness and Firmiess during the Action, and that their Conduct would do much Honour to the most experienced Seamen.

On the zoth Ultimo at Noon, a little to Leeward of St. Ann's Bay, I fell in with the French Privateer Schooner L'Incredule, two long Six-Pounders, four Swivels, and 33 Men: After two Hours Chace to Leeward, I captured her, and was obliged to come in here to land the Priloners. She is coppered, and fails very fast; had only captured a Danish Vessel and a Shallop with 20 Hogsheads of Sugar, which was afterwards retaken by a Merchant-Ship.

PLEASE to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that His Majesty's Ship Shannon has captured and fent in here a fine French Privateer ont of Nantes, mounting 18 Guns and 120 Men; further Particulars of which will be feen in the accompanying Letter to me from Captain Frafer.

SIR, Shannon at Sea, June 26, 1798. Have the Honour to acquaint you, that on the 23d Instant, at Five P. M. being in Latitude 50 Degrees North, and Longitude 21 Degrees West, I fell in with, and after a Chace of 12 Hours captured La Julie Privateer, of Nantes, commanded by Citizen Gautreau, mounting 18 Twelve and Six Pounders, and manned with 120 Men. She had been from Corunna ten Days; and it gives me much Satisfaction to have taken this Privateer, being quite new, Copper bottomed; and, though not of large Dimensions, is a remarkable fine Vessel, and sails extremely well. Her Length is 78 Feet Keel, 27 Feet Breadth of Beam, 11 Feet Depth of Hold, and is about 270 Tons Burthen.
