Extract of a Letter from Captain George Countefs, Commander of His Majesty's Ship Ethalion, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated in Plymouth Sound, November 8, 1798.

Have to request you will be pleased to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that fince my Letter of 22d September by Captain White, of the Sylph, I continued to watch the Motions of the French Squadron in His Ma-Motions of the French Squadron in His Majefty's Ship under my Command, (having with me
the Anson and Amelia,) until the 4th October
at Noon, when a hard Gale of Wind coming
on, we lost Sight of them in Lat. 53 Deg. 13 Min.
North, and Long. 16 Deg. 15 Min. West, SligoBay bearing North 77 East, Distance 91 Leagues.
The Wind being off Shore we carried Sail to get
in with the Land to give the necessary Information. The Amelia separated on the Night of the ation. The Amelia separated on the Night of the 8th. I had previously defined, in case of Separation, each Ship to make the best of her Way to give the Alarm. On the 11th we fell in with the Squadron under Sir John B. Warren, but it blowing strong, could not get on board to communicate any Intelligence; but seeing the Amelia with him, I was satisfied he had all the Information I could give. Soon after our joining the above Squadron, the Anson made the Signal for the Enemy, whom we discovered coming down, but they hauled to the Wind on observing us. We chased and kept close to them during the Night, and next Morning the Attack commenced, which no Doubt you have been fully informed of by Sir John Borlase Warren. After the Hoche struck, we pursued the Weathermost Frigate, who was making off, and failed very After a confiderable Chace we came up with and engaged her; she made an obstinate Refisance for an Hour and Fifty Minutes, after we got a-breast of her, when she struck her Colours, most of her Sails having come down, and Five Feet Water in her Hold. She proved to be the Bellone, of Thirty-fix Guns, Twelve Pounders, having Three Hundred Soldiers on board besides her Crew. The Squadron chafed to Leeward, and of courfe we feparated, being obliged to remain by the Prize, and have been under the Necessity of keeping the Sea ever fince.

I cannot speak too highly of the Bravery and Conduct of all my Officers during the Action, as well as of their extreme Vigilance in watching them for Seventeen Days. Mr. Sayer, First Lieutenant, is in the Prize, and I can with Pleasure say, His Majefty has not a more zealous or a better Officer. We had One Man killed and Three wounded: The Enemy appear to have had Twenty killed.

London, November 10, 1798.

On Thursday last Sir Richard Carr Glynn, Knt. Lord Mayor Elect for the Year enfuing, was fworn at Guildhall; when the Chair and other Enfigns of Mayoralty were furrendered to him in the accustomed Manner.

Yesterday the new Lord Mayor, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, Recorder, and Sheriffs, in their Scarlet Gowns, went in their Coaches to the Water-fide, the Sword and Mace being carried before them, and the City Officers attending; and from thence proceeded in the City Barge, attended by the feveral Companies in their respective Barges, adorned with Streamers and Pendants, to Westminster; and having walked round the Hall, and folemnly faluted all the Courts, they went to the Exchequer Bar, and the new Lord Mayor did there take the Oaths appointed; and having recorded Warrants of Attorney in the proper Courts, returned by Water to Black Friars, and from thence in Coaches, with the usual Solemnity, to Guildhall, where a magnificent Entertainment was provided; at which were present several of the Foreign Ministers, the Great Officers of State, divers of the Nobility, Lords of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, the Judges, and many other Perfons of Quality and Distinction.
