I Have the Honor to inform you, that on the 10th Instant, His Majesty's Ship Clyde, under my Command, captured L'Air Schooner Letter of Marque, from Brest to Saint Domingo; and on the 13th, a Brig Privateer, called Le Bon Ordre, carrying Sixteen Guns and Sixty-five Men. She sailed from Granville on the 20th December, and had captured One Brig from Newfoundland on the 6th Instant.

THE following Address has been presented to the King; which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's most faithful Subjects, Members of the Kettering Volunteer Association, firmly convinced that the Possession of Liberty, of Property,—in a Word, of whatever is dear to us as Britons and as Men, depends upon the Issue of the Contest in which we are now engaged, beg Leave most humbly thus to approach your Majesty, and, with Sentiments of unfeigned Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, to offer our heartfelt Congratulations on the late numerous, signal, and most important Victories which have attended your Majesty's Arms in different Quarters of the Globe. We particularly congratulate your Majesty on the Deliverance of our Sister Kingdom from the repeated Attacks of a desperate and indefatigable Enemy; and from the still more dreadful Domestic Commotions into which it had been led by the foul Conspiracy of wicked and turbulent Men: nor can we help expressing our confident Hopes, that the same All-ruling Providence, which has so long and so eminently distinguished us among the Nations of the Earth, will

continue to watch over and guard these Realms; and, by giving Efficacy to the firm yet lenient Measures which your Majesty humanely enjoins, not only recall our deluded Fellow-Subjects in Ireland to a due Sense of the incalculable Misery they have thus escaped, but in the End, by uniting us like one People in the Bands of mutual Interest and Affection, augment that Prosperity, Concord, and Strength, which render this Island the Admiration of the World, and the general Asylum of expatriated Virtue. Had we not before been sensible to the Excellence of the Constitution under which we live, the Example of France would have taught us fully to appreciate its Value. We there behold a People, from being unused to the Enjoyment of rational Freedom, commence their Political Reform, by bursting asunder every Tie of social Order, overturning the whole Fabric of Legitimate Authority, and at last, upon the Ruins of Religion and of Civil Government, erecting a System of Anarchy, Proscription, and Murder at Home, that can be equalled only by the unprincipled Ambition and savage Tyranny which they now display Abroad, in their Treatment of those Nations, amongst whom, either by open Force or insidious Professions, they have unhappily gained a Footing. To the unparalleled Exertions of British Valour, directed by the Wisdom and Vigilance of your Majesty's Councils, we owe our Security hitherto; and we trust, that by steadily persevering in the firm and vigorous Measures necessary for Self-Defence, not only the British Empire, but the Nations of Europe in general, will be preserved from the inevitable Ruin that must otherwise have overwhelmed them. Though we deeply lament the Calamities of War, and ardently wish for a Return of the Blessings of Peace, we should be unworthy of the National Advantages we enjoy, as well as of the Confidence reposed in us by your Majesty, did we not declare our firm Determination to defend to the utmost your Majesty's Crown and Dignity, and to maintain unimpaired that happy Constitution which the Wisdom of successive Ages was employed to frame, and which long Experience has shewn to be equally congenial with the Principles of Rational Liberty and the established Sentiments of Englishmen.

That your Majesty may long continue, in the Enjoyment of every Blessing, to reign over a free and happy People, is the ardent Prayer of your Majesty's most faithful Subjects.

Whitehall, January 19, 1799.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to His Majesty, That on Wednesday the 26th Day of December last, between Ten and Eleven o'Clock at Night, Mr. Ambrose Bowden, Sitter of the Custom-House Boat stationed at Cawsand, within the Port of Plymouth, in the County of Devon, being out upon Duty with Four of his Men in his Boat, rowing from Cawsand Beach towards Penlee Point on the Coast of Cornwall, in consequence of Information which he had received, that a Smuggling Vessel called the Lottery was about to land her Cargo near the said Point, he discovered a large Sloop or Cutter lying at Anchor, about Half a Mile from the Point, bearing S. W. by W.

That on coming near to the said Sloop or Cutter, Mr. Bowden perceived several Boats lying alongside of her and at her Stern; and when he got within about One Hundred Yards of the said Sloop or Cutter, some Person on board called out and asked, What Boat that was? Upon which Mr. Bowden answered it was a King's Boat; upon which some Person on board the Smuggling Sloop or Cutter, called out and said, "Keep off, or I will fire into you." Mr. Bowden again said, that his was a King's Boat, and a Revenue Boat, and dared the People on board to fire. That being by this Time within Twenty Yards of the Smuggling Sloop or Cutter, the People on board again ordered Mr. Bowden to keep off, and fired with Guns or Blunderbusses at his Boat Three Times, by which Humphry Glinn One of Mr. Bowden's Men in the said Boat, was killed:—That Mr. Bowden then took up a Musket, which he had in his Boat, and fired at the said Sloop or Cutter several Times, upon which the People on board either cut or slipped their Cable, and sailed away before the Wind to the Westward, at the same Time continuing to fire over her Stern at Mr. Bowden's Boat: That Mr. Bowden, not being able to pursue the said Sloop or Cutter, returned to Cawsand Bay, where he went on board of His Majesty's Ship Stag, and the Surgeon and his Mate examined the said Humphry Glinn, when they found that the fore Part of his Skull was shot away, and that he was quite dead.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this Felony and Murder, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One or more of the said Offenders (except the Master or Commander of the said Sloop or Cutter, and the Person or Persons who actually fired) who shall discover his or their Accomplices, so that any One or more of them may be apprehended.

THE Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have given Directions for paying off Exchequer-Bills bearing the following Dates, viz. all Bills dated the 21st, 22d, 23d, 24th, and 27th of November, 1797, the 2d and 4th of January, 19th of March, 22d, 23d, and 24th of May, 1st and 7th of June, 1798, issued pursuant to an Act of Parliament passed in the 37th Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for raising a certain Sum of Money, by Loans or Exchequer-Bills, for the Service of the Year 1797; and that the Principal and Interest on such Bills shall be paid at the Exchequer-Bill-Office, in Saint Margaret's-Street, between the two Palace-Yards, Westminster, on Thursday the 7th of February, 1799; and Attendance will be given on Wednesday the 16th of this instant January, and every succeeding Day until Tuesday the 29th of this instant January inclusive, from Ten o'Clock in the Morning till One in the Afternoon, (Sundays and Holidays excepted,) for the Purpose of receiving the same: And for the greater Dispatch, the Bearers of the said Bills are desired to bring Lists thereof, containing the Numbers, in numerical Order according to the Value of the said Bills, Times of Commencement of Interest, with the Principal Sums and Interest due on such Bills, to be computed at Three Pence Halfpenny by the Day on every 100l. from the Time of Commencement to the said 7th Day of February, 1799; on which Day the Interest on the said Exchequer-Bills will cease: And they are desired to write their Names and Places of Abode on such Lists, and indorse their Names on the Back of the said Bills.
