A Letter, of which the following is a Copy, has been received from Mr. Conful Foresti, by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Foreign Department,

> Port of Corfu, March 3, 1799, on board of the Ruffian Ship of Warthe Saint Paul, commanded by Vice-Admiral Uchakoff.

My Lord, Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that on the 1st Instant am: Attack was made by the United Turkish and Russian Forces on the Island fituated in this Port, called Lo Scoylio di Vido, and by the French, L'Isle de la Paix. After a very brisk Fire of about Two Hours and a Half from the Ships of War, the Troops were landed, and the faid Island was captured. An Attack was made at the same Time on the Ontworks of the Town, and Fort Saint Salvador was taken by the Russian and Turkish Troops, and the French themselves evacuated another Outwork called Il Monte di Abram.

On the Morning of the 2d, a Flag of Truce was

fent off by the French Commander of the Garrison of the Town of Corfu to the Russian Vice-Admiral, for the Purpose of informing him of the Wish of the Garrison to capitulate; a Russian Officer was therefore fent to the Town with the Propositions of the Russian and Turkish Commanders, and they were accepted of with little Variation.

The Capitulation of the Garrison, of which I have the Honor to enclose a Copy, was figned this Afternoon, on board of the Ruffian Vice-Admiral's Ship.

THE Citizens Dulour, Chief of Brigades Vareze, Naval Agent, Briche, Commillary of the Executive Power, and Grouvelle, Aide-de-Camp and Commodore, appointed by the Council of War in the Town of Corfu, to ftipulate in the Name of the French Republic the Articles of Capitulation for the Surrender of the Town and Forts of Corfu, conjointly with Vice-Admiral Uchakoff, the Capitan Bey Cadir Bey, commanding the Combined Ruffian and Turkill Squadrons, met or board the Russian Admiral's Ship, where they respectively agreed upon the following Articles, subject to the Ratification of Citizen Dubois, Commissary-General of the Government, and of Citizen Chabot, General of Division, commanding in the Levant Islands.

Art. I. The French shall give up to the Turkish and Russian Commissaries the Town and the Forts of Corfu, together with the Artillery, Ammunition, Provisions, Stores, and all other Public Effects, as they actually exist in the Archaels and Magazines. The Turkish and Russian Commissaries shall give Receipts for every Thing that may be delivered to

them upon Inventories.
II. The Garrison shall march, with all Military Honors, out of all the Forts and Posts which they may occupy, one Day after the Signature of the present Capitulation. They shall be drawn up in Line of Battle upon the Esplanade, where they shall lay down their Arms and Standards, with the Ex-

ception of the Officers, as well Civil as Military, who shall retain their Arms; after which the Allied Troops shall take Possession of the Posts The French shall enter immediately after into the Citadel, where they shall continue to be lodged until the Time of their Embarkation, which shall take place at the Port of Mandaccio. The Commissary-Genteral and the Staff shall have a Russian Guard of

Honor until their Embarkation.

III. The Garrifon shall be conveyed to Toulon in Veffels furnished by the Combined Squadron, and at the Charge of the faid Squadron, and shall be convoyed by Ships of War, after having given their Word of Honor not to bear Arms for Eighteen Months against His Majesty the Grand Signior, His Majelly the Emperor of all the Russias, or against their Allies the King of England, the King of the Two Sicilies, and the present Allies of the Two

IV. All the other Frenchmen employed in the Island of Corfu, as well Civil as Military, are comprehended in the preceding Article; as also the Civil and Military Officers and Crews of the Ship the Leander, the Corvette La Brune, and of every Vessel belonging to the Republick: They are permitted to carry away with them (as are also all the Individuals compoing the Garrison of Corfu) all-their Effects and Moveables which are their own private Property.

V. All Frenchmen, who have been made Pri-foners during the Blockade and Siege, are in like Manner admitted and entitled to the Advantages specified in Articles III. and IV. They shall only be bound by the Parole of Honor not to carry Arms against the Contracting Powers during the present War, unless an Exchange be made with

the Turkish and Russian Empires.

VI. A Ship of War of not less than Twenty Guns, shall be granted, in order to transport the Commissary-General, the General, and Staff.
VII. The General of Division Chabot, and his

Staff, a Secretary felected by the Commissary-General, the Two Chiefs of Administration of Land and Sea, with their Families, and Two Secretaries for each, shall be permitted to go either to Toulon or to Ancora at their Pleasure, and at the Expence of the Contracting Powers; but if they prefer to go to Ancona, their Paffage shall take place within One

Month from the present Day.

VIII. All Public Property, whether belonging to the Town or to the Garrison, (the Ship the Leander, the Corvette La Brune, and all other Veffels belonging to the French Republick included,) thall be given up entirely to the Commissaries of the

Turkish and Russian Powers.

IX. The Commanders of the Allied Squadron declare, that every Individual, of what Religion or Nation soever, as well as all the Inhabitants of the Town and Island of Corfu, shall be respected in their Persons and Property. They shall not be prosecuted, molested, or pursued on Account of the political Opinions which they may have held, or for their Actions, or for the Employments which they may have alled under the French Government up to the Date of the Capitulation. The Space of Two Months is granted to all those of the faid Inhabitants who may be defirous of removing themselves and Property elfewhere.

X. The Sick, who cannot accompany the Garrison, shall be treated in the same Manner as the Turks and Russians, and at the Expence of the said Powers, and shall also, when cured, be sent to Toulon. The French General shall be permitted to leave at Corfu an Officer with a Sum of Six Thousand Livres, and also the necessary Number of Officers of Health to dress and take care of the

XI. The Garrison, the Officers, and those employed in a Civil or Military Capacity, shall receive, as well on Shore as on board the Vessels, the same Number of Rations which are allowed to them, according to their Rank, in conformity to the French Laws, until their Debarkation at Toulon, or at

Ancona.

XII. The Ships of War and Transports which shall be employed in conveying the French either to Toulon or Ancona, shall not make any Prizes either in going or returning, and the Commiliary-General engages in the Name of the French Government to cause said Vessels to be respected by the French Ships and Vessels, and to guarantee their Return to Corfu, in like Manner as the Turkish and Rusfian Admirals respectively promise in the Name of their Courts to cause all the French comprised in the present. Capitulation to be conveyed to the Destination agreed upon.

Erewith you will receive a Copy of a Letter from Captain Keats, of His Majelty's Ship Boadicea, which is transmitted for their Lordships Information; and I am very much concerned for the Misfortune which happened to the Prize Brig La Requin, by which so many valuable Lives have been lost to the Service of their King and Country.

Boadisea, at Sca, 24th My Lord, March, 1799. Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that on the 7th Instant I retook an American, from Charles Town bound to Hamburgh; on the 8th fell in with and liberated a Neutral Ship, from Charles Town, bound to Embden, and took the Privateer La Requin, a Brig, pierced for Eighteen, mounting Fourteen Guns, with Seventy Men, which, when I first discovered her, was in the Act of taking Posfession of the Neutral. It is with extreme Concern I add, that on the Day following, in a violent Gale of Wind, the Requin overfet, although at the Time she had no Canvass spread; by which Missortune Mr. W. Clay, Matter's-Mate of the Boadicea, a young Man of much Merit, Nine valuable Seamen, and One Prisoner lost their Lives.

As feveral Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, bave, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercife their feveral Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artistical Control of the C cers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27. IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Informa-tion in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Affizes or Quarter-Seffions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, Forfeiture be paid.

&c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; fuch Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to feduce any fuch Artificer, or that any fuch Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforefaid, fuch Jullice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, fuch Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Sef-fions: And if fuch Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpole aforesaid, he shall give fuch Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the fame shall be profecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotto seduce any Artificer in wool, Monair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manusactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Countilling the Dominions of the Crown of try not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein fuch Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprifonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the fame Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forseit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put ! on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utenfils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manusactures, or any Part of fuch Tools, he shall, for every Of-fence, forfeit all fuch Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Sesfion in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.
