M. ſaw a Lugger and gave Chace; after a running Fight of Two Hours I came up with and captured her; ſhe proves to be L'Aimable Thereſe, of Four Carriage Guns and Twenty-seven Men.

I Have the Satisfaction to inform your Lordſhip, that on the 11th Inſtant, I captured off Aya-

monte the French Privateer l'Eſcamoteur, carrying Three Six-Pounders and Thirty-four Men.
