*His Majesty's Ship Indefatigable at Sea, May 31, 1799.*

MY LORD,  
BEING in Latitude 43 Deg. 7 Min. North, and Longitude 11 Deg. West, I fell in with and captured the French Privateer Brig *Le Venus*, mounting Twelve Four and Two Nine-Pounders,

and manned with One Hundred and One Men, from Rochfort; had been out Nine Weeks, and taken the Schooner *Clarence*, from Lisbon bound to London, and a Ship, from Lisbon bound to Hamburg; laden with Salt.

The Privateer therein mentioned failed from Passage with *Le Bordelais* French Ship Privateer and *Le Grand Decidé* Brig; they were victualled for Three Months, and were to return themselves and send their Prizes to Passage.

MY LORD,

RECEIVING Information of several large Privateers that had been hovering on the Coast of Portugal having gone to the Westward, I thought it expedient, for the Commercial Interest, to exceed the Limits of my Station, and on the 22d of June, in Latitude 38 Deg. 50 Min. North, Long. 31 Deg. West, a Ship boarding an American was seen, which I chased; she parting, the American made to and told me she was French, then distant Two Leagues; the Weather being clear I saw his Manœuvres, and acted accordingly throughout the Night, and by using every possible Exertion I got round the Island of Corvo, in Calms and light Winds, on the 23d; the Enemy, equally active in his Endeavours to avoid, preserved his Distance by towing and sweeping to the Westward. On the 24th and 25th I passed Two English Brigs, and upwards of Forty Sail of Merchant Vessels, steering for Lisbon: A Breeze from the Northward on the 26th brought me by Six in the Morning within Gun-Shot of the Enemy; a running Fight commencing, she struck after Seven, in Latitude 39 Deg. 29 Min. North,

Longitude 33 Deg. West, having suffered in her Hull, Sails, and Rigging; is named the *Courageux*, of Bourdeaux, pierced for Thirty-two, but carrying only Twenty-eight Twelves and Nine-Pounders, (of which some were thrown overboard during the Chace,) with Two Hundred and Fifty-three Men, commanded by Jean Bernard; Twenty-three Days last from Passage, expressly to intercept a Brazil Convoy.

*Copy of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Harvey, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Leeward-Islands, dated June 8, 1799, to Evan Nepean, Esq.*

YOU will be pleased to acquaint their Lordships, that Captain Ekins, of His Majesty's Ship *Amphitrite*, captured on the 22d Ultimo, to Windward of Antigua, Le Duquesne French Privateer Coppered Brig, of Sixteen Guns, Nine-Pounders, and One Hundred and Twenty-nine Men, belonging to Guadaloupe, which he sent to Barbadoes.

This Vessel had been out but Three Days, and made no Captures. She was bound on a Cruise to Windward of the Islands, is a very fast Sailer, and one of the finest Privateers in these Seas.

I Transmit, for their Lordships' Information, another Letter from Captain Winthrop, of His Majesty's Ship *Circe*; much Praise is due to him and the Officers under his Command, for their Spirit and Enterprize and good Conduct on this as well as on a former Occasion.

*Circe, off Ameland,  
July 11, 1799.*

MY LORD,

I Feel great Pleasure in acquainting your Lordship that the Boats of our little Squadron\* made another Dash into the Watt, at the Back of Ameland last Night, and brought out Three valuable Vessels deeply laden with Sugar, Wine, and Brandy, they also burnt a large Galliot, laden with Bras Ordnance and Stores, which could not be brought off, notwithstanding the Perseverance of Captain Mackenzie, to whom I am very much indebted for his Coolness and Judgment in the Management of this Affair; and also to Captain Boorder, whose local Knowledge has been of great Use to me. Lieutenant Searle, who commanded a Schoot converted into a Gun Boat, and Lieutenant Pawle, who commanded the *Circe's* Boats, upon this (as well as upon a former) Occasion, conducted themselves very much to my Satisfaction, as did the honest Fellows under their Command, who were at their Oars Fifteen or Sixteen Hours in a very hot

Day, opposed to an Enemy of superior Force, but I am happy to say not a Man was hurt.

DISPATCHES, of which the following are Copy and Extract, have been received from Lieutenant-Colonel Robert Craufurd by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Foreign Department.

MY LORD,

*Zurich, July 6, 1799.*

I Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that on the 3d Instant, a considerable Corps of the Right Wing of General Massena's Army under the Command of the General of Division Le Courbe, attacked General Yellachitz's Position in the Canton of Schweitz, on the whole Extent of his Front, from the Sill to Schweitz and Brunn.

The Affair lasted the greater Part of the Day; and although the French at first gained some Ground, they were afterwards completely repulsed; and General Yellachitz's Corps reoccupied all its former Posts, except Brunnen, of which the Enemy retained Possession on the Evening of the 3d, but from whence he was also repulsed the next Morning.

Major-General Yellachitz bestows great Praise on the Conduct of the Contingent Troops of the Cantons of Glavis and Schweitz.

*Extract of a Letter from Lieutenant-Colonel Craufurd to Lord Grenville, dated Zurich, 7th July, 1799.*

I Have much Satisfaction in being able to inform your Lordship, that in consequence of the total Defeat of General Macdonald's Army and the Retreat of Moreau, General Haddick's Corps, the Destination of which has been so frequently changed, is now decidedly on the Point of entering the Valais.

*St. James's, July 17, 1799.*

THE following Address from the British Inhabitants of Bombay and its Dependencies, was this Day presented to the King by the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and was received by His Majesty in a very gracious Manner.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, your Majesty's most faithful Subjects the British Inhabitants of Bombay and its Dependencies, animated by an ardent Zeal for our Country, which we trust will ever be the distinguishing Characteristic of Britons, have exerted our best Endeavours, by a general Contribution in support of the present just and necessary War in which we are engaged, in Opposition to an unprovoked Combination of your Majesty's Enemies. Reflecting with equal Pride and Gratitude on the Blessings we derive from a Constitution which has elevated the National Character through Ages; and by the Security it affords to Religion, Liberty, and Property, has roused and maintained a Spirit of Commercial Adventure equally productive of Public Wealth and Individual Prosperity, it became our Duty as well as our earnest Inclination to unite for its Protection. Of this invaluable System we look up to your Majesty, under the Divine Ruler of the Universe, as the faithful Guardian, and as further endeared to us by those amiable Personal Virtues which are the peculiar Ornaments of your Character.

We feel particular Pleasure at this Period in congratulating your Majesty on the late Success, which, by the Blessing of God, your Naval Arms have obtained in the Mediterranean under Admiral Sir Horatio Nelson, against an inveterate and usurping Foe, whose Hostility is directed to the Destruction of every Tie that can bind Society in good Order and Government. A Victory, which, while it has eminently displayed the Wisdom and Vigilance of Your Majesty's Counsels, in the Means of its Attainment, and the Bravery and good Conduct of your Officers in its Accomplishment, has averted

from your Subjects in this remote Situation an intended Blow which threatened their Existence.

While we express to your Majesty the Exertions of your British Subjects here in the Public Cause, it is with much additional Satisfaction that we fulfil a Duty incumbent upon us in conveying to you the unsolicited Concurrence we have experienced in the Natives of this Island, through their different Casts, and the Aid they have afforded on the present Occasion; Effects which can only be ascribed to the benign Influence of your Majesty's Government in the Support and Protection of all to whom it is extended.

With the most fervent Wishes for the long Continuance of your Majesty's Reign with Increase of Glory and Prosperity, and the Enjoyment of your Domestic Felicity, we have the Honor of subscribing ourselves, with the warmest Sentiments of Veneration and Gratitude;
