WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision, without Payment of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks from the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament;" it is enacted, That from and after the passing of the said Act, and until the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, and he and they is and are hereby authorised, with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, whatever may be the general Average Price of any of the said Sorts of Corn, or of Oatmeal, in England or Scotland, respectively from Time to Time, when and as often as the same shall be judged expedient, to prohibit generally, for a limited Time, the Exportation from England and Scotland respectively, of any British or Foreign Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Big, Peas, Beans, Oats, or any Meal, or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt, made thereof, or any Indian Corn, or Maize, or Meal, or Flour made thereof; and to permit, generally, the Importation into England or Scotland respectively, of any Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel, belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and also the taking out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, of any such Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; and in like Manner to recall such Prohibition or Permission, either in Part, or in the Whole, (if Circumstances shall appear so to require,) any Thing in any Act, or Part of any Act, to the contrary notwithstanding, subject, nevertheless, to the Provisions therein mentioned, and hereinafter contained: His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers vested in

him by the said Act, has thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date of this present Order, and until further Order, no Person or Persons whatsoever shall export, or shall load, or lay on board any Ship or other Vessel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place of this Kingdom, any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Big, Peas, Beans, Oats, or any Meal or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or any Indian Corn or Maize, or Meal or Flour made thereof.

His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prohibit the Exportation, from this Kingdom, of any Foreign Corn, Meal, or Flour that shall have been imported and warehoused in the Manner and on the Conditions mentioned in an Act, passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported;" and shall not have been taken out of such Warehouse for Home Consumption, nor to prevent the carrying Coastwise, or carrying out, or the Exportation of the several Sorts of Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, from this Kingdom, for any of the Purposes mentioned in the said Act, passed in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, or an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for amending the last-mentioned Act, or either of them, in like Manner, and in the same Proportions and Quantities, and from and to the same Ports and Places, as is allowed by the said Two Acts, passed in the Thirty-first and Thirty-third Years of His present Majesty's Reign, or either of them, at such Times as any of the several Sorts of Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, are prohibited to be exported, in consequence of the Provisions contained in the Two last-mentioned Acts, subject to the like Securities, Conditions, Regulations, and Restrictions, Forfeitures and Penalties, as are by the said Two Acts, or by either of them, in any such Case required and imposed.

And His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit further to order, and it is

hereby ordered, That from and after the Date of this present Order, and until further Order, it shall be lawful to import into any Port or Place of this Kingdom, any Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel, belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever: And also to take out of Warehouse, for Home Consumption, any such Foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforesaid, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly:

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to encourage the Trade in the Levant Seas, by providing a more convenient Mode of performing Quarantine, and for reducing the Duty granted by an Act of the last Session on Goods the Manufacture of Great Britain, exported to any Place within the Straights of Gibraltar," it is declared to be expedient to permit Goods and Merchandize to be imported from the Levant, under certain Regulations and Restrictions, without having been opened and aired in the Lazarets of any of the Ports or Places mentioned in an Act, passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled "An Act for enlarging and regulating the Trade into the Levant Seas." And it is enacted, That it shall be lawful to and for His Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, by and with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, by any Order or Orders to be issued from Time to Time, to grant Licence and Permission for the Importation into Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man, of all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, coming from the Levant Seas, without clean Bills of Health, without such Goods and Merchandizes having been opened and aired in the Lazarets of any of the Places mentioned in the said recited Act; and that all such Goods and Merchandizes shall and may be admitted to an Entry in any of the Ports of Great Britain, or the said Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, subject, nevertheless, to such Regulations, Rules, Orders, and Directions, with respect to opening and airing such Goods and Merchandizes previous to the landing thereof, and to the Performance of Quarantine by the Crews or other Persons belonging to or being on board of the Ships or Vessels in which such Goods or Merchandizes shall be imported, as His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, shall by any Order or Orders to be issued as aforesaid, make, prescribe, or direct; any Law, Statute, or Usage to the contrary notwithstanding: And whereas, by the Orders of His Majesty in Council now subsisting, all Ships

and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, are subject to a Quarantine of Forty Days, and are required to unpack, open, and air their Cargoes at such Places, and for such Space of Time as are expressed in the said Orders: And whereas it appears to His Majesty, that it will tend to the greater Security of the public Health, and the better Prevention of all Danger of Infection being brought into this Kingdom, if such Ships as shall not be furnished with clean Bills of Health, be permitted to perform their Quarantine at one Place only, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that all Ships and Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes, now arrived, or which may hereafter arrive from the Levant at any Port or Place in this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, without clean Bills of Health, and without having performed Quarantine in any of the Ports of the Mediterranean mentioned in the above-recited Act, passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of His late Majesty King George the Second; and all Ships and Vessels, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes whatsoever, liable to Quarantine, and not being furnished with clean Bills of Health, from whatever Port or Place the same shall come, shall (until further Order) perform their Quarantine in Standgate Creek, and no where else; and that no Person from on board any such Ship or Vessel be permitted to land or come on Shore, until discharged from such Quarantine.

And His Majesty, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, is hereby further pleased to order, that no Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes imported in any Ship or Vessel arriving without a clean Bill of Health, be admitted to Entry in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, until such Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes shall have been unpacked, opened, and aired, on board One of the Halks stationed in Standgate Creek for the Purpose of airing Goods subject to Quarantine, for the Space of Forty Days, according to such Regulations as have been established in that Behalf by any Order of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, touching Goods liable to perform Quarantine; or any other Regulations, Rules, Orders, and Directions which shall be made or given by any Order of His Majesty in Council with respect to opening and airing such Goods and Merchandizes, previous to the landing thereof; and to the Performance of Quarantine by the Crews or other Persons belonging to or being on board of the Ships or Vessels in which such Goods or Merchandizes shall be imported: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said respective Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Copy of a Letter from Andrew Mitchell, Esq; Vice-Admiral of the Blue, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated on board His Majesty's Ship Babet, Enkhausen-Road, September 24, 1799.

SIR,

I Have the Honor to acquaint you, for their Lordships' Information, that the Weather having moderated on the 21st Instant I shifted my Flag to the Babet: though blowing a Gale of Wind the Day before, Captain Mainwaring, by his great Exertions, had lightened her sufficiently for the Pilot to take Charge, and the Captains of the Bomb-Vessels made equal Exertions for the same Purpose, having lightened their respective Ships to Twelve Feet Eight Inches; I left the Isis, Melpomene, and Juno with Yards and Top-masts struck, having taken all the Seamen and Marines that could be spared from them, with Sir C. Hamilton, Captains Dundas and Oughton, and a proper Number of Officers in large Schuyts to assist me in the Expedition; about Ten we weighed in the Babet, accompanied by the Four Bombs, L'Espeigle and Speedwell Brigs, and Lady Ann Luggar, and Prince William Armed Ship.

We fortunately had a fair Wind which raised the Tide considerably over the Flats, though in many

Parts we had only Twelve Feet Six Inches. On our approaching Medenblic at Noon, I made the Signals for the Dart and Gun Brigs to weigh and join me; and at Three P. M. I anchored with the Squadron off Enkhausen, and a Boat came off with Four Men wearing Orange Cockades; in consequence of which I went on Shore attended by the Captains;—we were received by all the Inhabitants with every Testimony of Joy at their Deliverance from their former tyrannical Government, and in the highest Degree expressive of their Loyalty and Attachment to the House of Orange.

I proceeded to the Stadthouse, and having summoned all the old and faithful Burgomasters, who had not taken the Oath to the Batavian Republic, I instantly reinstated them, until His Highness the Hereditary Prince of Orange's Instructions were received; to whom, and to His Royal Highness the Duke of York, I immediately sent an Express, and at the same Moment summoned before me and dissolved the Municipality, amidst the joyful Acclamations of the Inhabitants around the Stadthouse, Part of them at the same Time cutting down the Tree of Liberty, which they instantly burned; all of which was done in the most loyal, quiet, and regular Manner.

I have detached Capt. Boorder, in the *Espeigle*, with the *Speedwell*, to scour the Coast from *Steveren* to *Lemmer*; but previous to his going on that Service I sent him to *Steveren*, to bring me Intelligence of the Disposition of the Inhabitants: he returned Yesterday Morning with the pleasing Information of their having hoisted the Orange Colours, and most of the neighbouring Towns had done the same, and the Inhabitants joyfully complying with the same Terms as *Enkhausen* and *Medenblic*; I have likewise detached the *Dart*, with Two Gun-Brigs, to cut off the Communication with *Amsterdam* and the Towns in *East Friesland*, that have not returned to their Allegiance.

Our Appearance in the *Zuyder Zee* with such an unexpected Force has had a most wonderful and happy Effect, and given the greatest Confidence to those well disposed to the House of Orange.

I shall not lose a Moment's Time in moving forward, when the Wind and Tide will permit, to complete, as far as lays in my Power, what is finally intrusted to my Charge.

A DISPATCH, of which the following is a Copy, has been received from Lieutenant-Colonel Ramsay by the Right Honorable Lord Grenville, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Foreign Department.

MY LORD, *Zurich, September 8, 1799.*
I Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that the Enemy made an Attack this Morning, with about Three Thousand Men, on the Post of *Waldischoff*, in Front of *Zurich*, occupied by about Six Hundred Men of the Russian Battalion of *Essen*.

The Enemy, by advancing rapidly, and availing themselves of the Darkness of the Night, contrived to fall rather unawares on a small advanced Piquet, and some Prisoners fell into his Hands at the Commencement of the Affair: terminated, however, in a Manner which, if it were possible, would add to the distinguished Reputation of the Russian Troops, and the Enemy were driven back to their Camp in great Disorder by the Battalion of *Essen*, who, without Hesitation, notwithstanding the disproportioned Superiority of the Enemy's Force, immediately advanced upon them and charged them with their Bayonets.

The Russians lost about Thirty Men killed and wounded; that of the French has not been ascertained, but there is Reason to suppose, from the Number of Dead left upon the Field, and other Circumstances, that it was more considerable.
