A Schooner under Danish Colours, from St. Thomas bound to New Orleans, laden with Provisions: detained by Ditto.

Ship Thomas, under American Colours, from Matanzas bound to Charlestown, laden with One Thousand Two Hundred and Thirty Boxes of Sugar: detained by the Volage.

Ship Diana Clark, under American Colours, from New York bound to Havanna, laden with Rice and sundry Merchandize: detained by Ditto.

Spanish Polacre St. Josef Joachim, from Havanna bound to Barcelona, laden with Pimento Wood: taken by the Maidstone and Volage.

Brig Ariel, under American Colours, from Jeremie bound to Baltimore, with a Cargo of One Hundred and Forty-six Thousand Pounds of Coffee: taken by the York and Maidstone.

Schooner Lydia, under American Colours, from Tauxillo bound to Havanna, laden with Sugar and Indigo: taken by Ditto.

Brig Romulus, under American Colours, from Havanna bound to Charlestown, with Six Hundred and Sixty-two Boxes of Sugar: detained by Ditto.

Ship Flora, with Spanish and American Papers, from Carthagena, Spanish Main, bound to New York and Cadiz, with a Cargo of Cotton and Fustick, and Eighty-one Thousand Dollars in Gold (secreted): taken by Ditto.

Schooner Fair American, under American Colours, from Barracoa bound to Baltimore, with One Hundred and Eighty-eight Thousand Pounds of Coffee, and Ten Thousand Pounds of Sugar: detained by Ditto.

Brig Sally, under American Colours, from St. Thomas bound to Havanna, with Twenty-three new Negroes: taken by the Lark.

Copy of a Letter from Admiral Kingmill, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Cork, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated in London the 8th Instant.

SIR,

PLEASE to lay before my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty the accompanying Letter which I have received from Captain Macnamara, of His Majesty's Ship Cerberus, giving an Account of his having captured L'Exchange French Letter of Marque.

SIR, *Cerberus at Sea, Sept. 28, 1799.*

HIS Majesty's Ship under my Command has this Day captured L'Exchange French Letter of Marque, pierced for Fourteen but carrying only Ten Guns and Forty Men; Six Days from Bourdeaux bound to St. Domingo, with a Cargo of Bale Goods, Wines, &c.
