SIR PLEASE to lay before my Lords Commissioners P of the Admiralty the accompanying Letter which I have received from Captain Macnamara, of His Majesty's Ship Cerberus, giving an Account of his having captured L'Echange French Letter of Marque.

SIR, Cerberus at Sea, Sept. 28, 1799. IS Majefty's Ship under my Command has this Day captured L'Exchange French Letter of Marque, pierced for Fourteen but carrying only Ten Guns and Forty Men; Six Days from Bour-deaux bound to St. Domingo, with a Cargo of Bale Goods, Wines, &c.
