Copy of a Letter from the Earl of St. Vincent, K. B. Admiral of the White, &c. to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated on board His Majesty's Ship Royal George, at Sea, the 8th Instant.

SIR, *Uranie, at Sea, July 28, 1800.*

CRUISING according to your Instructions in His Majesty's Ship under my Command, I beg Leave to acquaint you of my having captured this Day La Revanche French Schooner Privateer, mounting Fourteen Six-Pounders with Eighty Men, belonging to Bayonne, had been out from thence about Four Months; but last from Vigo, (Nineteen Days,) into which Port she had carried Three Prizes, an English Brig called the Marcus, a Portuguese Ship, and a Spanish Brig, Prize to the Minerve.

Dublin-Castle, August 13, 1800.

FEELING as we do, in common with your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the utmost Horror and Indignation at the late Attempt made upon your Majesty's most sacred Person by the Hands of a Maniac Assassin, and urged by like Sentiments of Loyalty, Duty, and Attachment to your Majesty, we beg Leave, equally to assure you of our sincere and heartfelt Satisfaction at your Majesty's providential Escape from the Danger which threatened your Majesty's Life, and to express our unfeigned Gratitude to the Supreme Disposer of all human Events for having preserved a Life so truly dear to us; that your Majesty may long, very long continue to reign in the Hearts of an affectionate and loyal People, and that at a very late Hour when the unrelenting Hand of Time shall tear a beloved and revered Sovereign from the Bosom of his grateful and loyal Subjects; your Majesty may attain that Reward which a Life uninterruptedly employed in promoting the Welfare and Happiness of an Empire over which you were born to reign, sanctions the Hope for, is the most ardent Wish, and fervent Prayer of your Majesty's most faithful and devoted Subjects, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Galway.

Accept then, gracious Sovereign, the sincere and warmest Hopes and Wishes that your Majesty may long in Health and Happiness continue to be the Instrument of Blessing, and when it shall please the Almighty to take you hence, that your Virtues, without Interruption, may descend with your Title.
