A PROCLAMATION,

Containing His Majefly's Declaration, That it is ex-pedient that the Lords and Commons of the prefent preterms that the Loras and Commons of the prejent Parliament of Great Britain fould be the Members of the reflective Houfes of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the Part of Great Britain ; and commanding the faid Lords and Commons to give their Attendance accordingly.

W HEREAS by the Fourth' Article of the Articles of the Union of Great Britain and Ireland, as the fame are ratified and confirmed by Two Acts of Parliament, the one pafled in the Parliament of Great Britain, intituled An Act for the Union of Great Britain and Ireland, the other paffed in the Parliament of Ireland, also intituled An Act for the Union of Great Britain and Ireland, to have Force and Effect from the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one, it is provided, that if We, on or before the faid First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and one, on which Day the Union is to take place as aforefaid, should declare, under the Great Seal of Great Britain, that it is expedient that the Lords and Commons of the prefent Par-liament of Great Britain thould be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the Part of Great Britain; then the faid Lords and Commons of the prefent Parliament of Great Britain should accordingly be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the faid United Kingdom, on the Part of Great Britain: And whereas it is Our Intention to appoint Thursday the Twenty second Day of January next enfuing for the allembling of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, by Proclamation under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom; We do judge it to be expedient, that the Lords and Commons of the pre-fent Parliament of Great Britain should be the Members of the respective Houfes of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom, on the Part of Great Britain : And We do, purfuant to the faid | Ceremonies.

Articles of Union, and to the Acts of Parliament ratifying and confirming the fame, hereby declare, under Our Great Seal of Great Britain, that it is expedient that the Lords and Commons of the pre-fent Parliament of Great Britain should be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Bri-tain and Ireland, on the Part of Great Britain; and the Lords and Commons of the present Parliament of Great Britain are accordingly to be the Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the Part of Great Britain : And the faid Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, are hereby required and commanded to take Notice thereof, and to give their Attendance accordingly, at Weltminster, on the faid Twenty-fecond Day of January next enfuing.

Given at Our Court at Saint James's, the Fifth Day of November One thousand eight hun-dred, in the Forty-first Year of Our Reign.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Frederick Watkins, Commander of His Majefly's Ship Nereide, to Evan Nepean, Efq; dated in Curaçao, 15th October 1800. SIR

BE pleafed to inform my Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty that I have thought it indiffenfably neceffary to fend thefe Difpatches to England by my first Officer, Lieutenant Paul, to acquaint their Lordships of the Surrentier of the valuable Island of Curaçao-to His Majesty's Frigate under my Command. I beg Leave to transmit Duplicates of all my Letters to the Right Honourable Lord Hugh Seymour, and the Articles of Capitulation agreed between his Excellency Johan Rudolph Lauffer and myfelf; as alfo Inventories of Warlike Stores, Shipping, &c. I hope their Lordfhips will ianction my Conduct in taking Poffeffion of this centrical and valuable Island in His Majesty's Name.

Lieutenant Paul I cannot recommend in too ftrong a Language to their Lordships, for his zealous Exertions during the whole of the Siege: and for any further Information he is perfectly able to deferibe every Thing their Lordfhips may be defirous of knowing refpecting Curaçao. I have the Honor to be, &c.

His Majefly's Ship Nereide, off Amflerdam, Ifland of Curaçao, 11th September 1800.

MY LORD, Wish not to lose a Moment in fending a fast failing Veffel to inform your Lordship, that the Island of Curaçao has claimed the Protection of His Britannic Majefty. I have in consequence felt it ny Duty to take Possefilion of it in his Name.

I am now running for the Harbour, as it is abfolutely neceffary to lofe no Time to fave the Ifland from the Enemy, who threaten to ftorm the principal Fort To-night; but I truft the Nereide's Affiftance will be the Means of fruftrating the Enemy's Views, and faving a most valuable Colony for His Majesty. I compute the Force of the French to be about Fifteen Hundred now in Posseffion of the West Part of the Island, but no strong Post of any Confequence to prevent my holding the Forts commanding Amfterdam, until I am honoured with an An-

fwer from your Lordship. There is great Property affoat belonging to the Spaniards.

Lieutenant Paul will have the Honor of delivering this Difpatch to your Lordship, of whole Exertions and Zeal for the Service I cannot fpeak in too ftrong Terms.

His Majelly's Ship Nereide, off Amsterdam, September 14 1800.

SINCE fending my last Dispatch of the 11th In-ftant, Governor Johan Rudolph Lausser has finally furrendered the Island of Curaçao and its Dependencies to His Majesty's Arms.

Enclosed I have the Honor of transmitting to your Lordship a Copy of the Terms of Capitulation. I have the Honor to be, &c.

ARTICLES of CAPITULATION agreed be-tween Frederick Watkins, Efq; Captain of His Britannic Majefly's Ship Nereide, now lying off the Harbour of Curaçao; and Johan Rudolph Lauffer, Governor (interim) of the faid Island, and its Dependencies, and Commander in Chief of all the armed Force of the faid Ifland; namely, That the faid Island of Curaçao and its Dependencies shall furrender and be placed under the immediate Protection of His, Britannic Majefly, in Conformity to the following Articles, viz.

Art. I. 'The Ifland of Curaçao and its Dependencies shall be placed under the Protection of His Britannic Majefty, and shall peaceably and quietly fubmit to the Government of His faid Majesty.

Anfwer.-Agreed to.

Art. II. The Inhabitants of this Island and its Dependencies shall enjoy perfect Security in their Perfons and Properties, and the full Exercise of their Religion, except fuch as shall appear to belong to the Subjects of the Powers now actually at War with Great Britain; fuch Property only excepted as was on board the Veffels in the Harbour on the 10th Inftant.

Anfwer.-Agreed to.

Art. III. All Ships and Veffels of War that may be in the Harbour, and all Artillery, Warlike Stores, Ammunition, &c. that may be found in the Forts and public Magazines, and all Property of whatfoever Nature it may be, belonging to the Batavian Republic, shall be delivered up to His Britannic Majefly in the State in which they now are, and Officers shall be appointed on each Side by the joint Parties to take Inventories thereof.

Anfwer.-Agreed to.

Art. IV. All Debts due by the Government of this Island shall be punctually paid out of the Revenue of the faid Island.

Anfwer .- Agreed to.

Art. N. No Alteration shall be made in the established Laws of the faid Island; except that in future luch might be found neceffary for mutual Benefit or Safety, and which must be regulated by the Concurrence of both Parties.

Anfwer.-Agreed to.

Art. VI. During the Time this Island may remain under the Protection of His Britannic Majefty, or in cafe this Ifland and its Dependencies should, at the Conclusion of the War, remain in the Possefici-tion of Great Britain, the Inhabitants of the faid Island and its Dependencies shall enjoy the fame Rights and Privileges of His Majefty's Subjects in the Weft Indies.

Anfwer.--Agreed to.

MY LORD;

Art. VII. The Laws heretofore observed refpecting Property shall remain in full Force.

As it is impossible for the Inhabitants Private: of the faid Island, and its Dependencies, to sublist without a free Intercourfe with the Spanish Main, the Ports of Curaçao and its Dependencies shall be open to all Spanish Vessels.

Anfwer.—Agreed to be allowed the fame free Trade as the Island of Jamaica.

Signed, fealed, and ratified in the Prefence of Cornelius Spencer and E. A. Van Eck; on the Part of Johan Rudolph Lauffer; and in the Presence of John Lewis March, on the Part of Frederick Watkins; at the Port of Amsterdam, in the Island of Curação, this 13th of September 1800.

Have now the Satisfaction to inform your Lordthip that the English Colours are flying in this Island, and that I have entered this Harbour in confequence of the total Evacuation of the French Forces laft Night. I am now arranging Affairs in fuch a Manner as to tranquilize the Minds of the Inhabitants, reftore perfect Peace, in the Name of His Majefty, in this valuable Island. I have been received with great Faith, and will do my utmost in establishing the Security of the principal Fortrefs till I receive your Lordship's Answer for my further Conduct. Enclosed I have the Honor of transmitting to you an Inventory of Warlike Stores, Ammunition, &c. in the Garrifon, except those lately in Poffession of the Enemy, which I have not yet received the regular Returns of, but have given the neceffary Orders. It was my Intention to have fent any farther Difpatch my Intention to have lent any larther Dipactu to your Lordfhip by, the remaining Lieutenant, Mr. James Hodgion; but, as I do not exactly con-ceive myfelf in a perfect State of Safety, without having perfect Polfeffion of the principal Fortrefs which commands the Town, I have appointed him, with a Party of my own Men, to that Command: his Zeal Bravery, and univerfal fready Conhis Zeal, Bravery, and univerfal fteady Con-duct in any Service he is ordered on, makes my Mind perfectly eafy in doing fo: he has been of the utmost Service in a new crected Battery in annoying the Enemy, and indeed may be confidered the prin-cipal Caufe of their Retreat. Lieutenant Fitton, commanding the Active Tender, I have much Plea-fure in recommending to your Lordship's Notice, from his Activity and spirited Conduct fince he has joined me. From him, my Lord, you will receive material Information as to all Situations of the Island and its valuable Harbour.

Downing-Streef, November 29th, 1800. Extract of a Letter from Mr. Penrofe, His Majefly's Chargé d'Affaires at Florence, to Lord Grenville, dated Monte Varchi near Florence, October 16, 1800.

IT is with the greatest Satisfaction that I acquaint your Lordship, that the Property of His Majefty's Subjects at Leghorn has been, as well as Circumstances would permit, prevented from falling into the Hands of the Enemy, under the Protection of His Majefty's Ships of War stationed at that Port, off which a Frigate will still remain, to prevent any Veffels from going in.

Statute 5 George I Chap. 27. I F any Perfon shall contract with, entice, or folicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shalf be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Informa-tion in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Affizes or Quarter Seffions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Diferetion of the Court, and imprifoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being fuch Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Maicers, man go into any Country out of His Ma-jefty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the faid Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the faid Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Conful of Great Britain, in the Country where fuch Artificers shall be; or by any Perfon authorifed by fuch Ambaffador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm ; fuch Perfons fhall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Defcent, Devife, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majefty's Ufe, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majefty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Perfon is endeavouring to feduce any fuch Artificer, or that any fuch Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purpoles aforefaid, fuch Juffice may fend his Warrant to bring the Perfon complained of before him, or before fome other Juffice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witnefs, or by Confeffion, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, fuch Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions: And if fuch Perfon shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions, and until he shall be delivered by due Courfe of Law. And if any

fuch Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any fuch Promife, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpole aforefaid, he shall give fuch Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reafonable, and shall be imprifoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the fame shall be profecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to feduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Coun-try not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Affizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein fuch-Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Jufficiary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if fuch Offence be committed in Ireland; the Perfon fo convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or feduced, forteit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and fhall fuffer Impriforment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offeuder shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in cafe of a fubfequent Offence of the fame Kind, the Perfons fo again offending fhall forfeit, for every Perlon contracted with or feduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Perfon in Great Britain or Ireland fhall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to fome other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any fuch Tools or Utenfils as are commonly ufed in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finifhing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of fuch Tools, he fhall, for every Offence, forfeit all fuch Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Weftminfter, or in the Court of Seffion in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin refpectively, wherein no Effoin, &c. fhall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to feize and fecure, in fome of His Majefty's Warehoufes, all fuch Tools or Utenfils prohibited to be exported, as fuch Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to fome other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools fo feized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly fold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of

the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and fecure the same.

If the Captain of any Veffel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the faid Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Veffel, he fhall, for every fuch Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Perfons exporting the Tools; and, if the Veffel belongs to His Majeity, the Captain fhall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but fhall alfo forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majefty. If any Officer of the Cuftoms in Great Britain

If any Officer of the Cuftoms in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly fuffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the faid Tools, or knowingly fuffer the fame to be done, he thall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforefaid, and alfo forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majefty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His prefent Majefly.
