A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS an Address has been presented to Us by Our Two Houses of Parliament, requesting Us to iffue Our Royal Proclamation, recommending to all such Persons as have the Means of procuring other Articles of Food the greatest Economy and Frugality in the Use of every Species of Grain: We, having taken the said Address into Consideration, and being persuaded that the Prevention of all unnecessary Consumption of Corn will furnish one of the surest and most effectual Means of alleviating the present Pressure, and of providing for the necessary Demands of the Year, have, therefore, in pursuance of the faid Address, and out of Our tender Concern for the Address, and out of Our tender Concern for the Welfare of Our People, thought fit (with the Advice of Our Privy Council) to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation, most carneftly exhorting and charging all those of Our loving Subjects who have the Means of procuring other Articles of Food than Corn, as they tender their own immediate Interests, and feel for the Wants of others, to practife the greatest Economy and Erugality in the Use of greatest Economy and Frugality in the Use of every Species of Grain: And We do, for this Purpole, more particularly exhort and charge all Masters of Families to reduce the Confumption of Bread in their respective Families, by at least One-Third of the Quantity confumed in ordinary Times, and in no Case to suffer the same to exceed One Quartern Loaf for each Person in each Week; to abitain from the Use of Flour in Pastry, and, moreover, carefully to restrict the Use thereof in all other Articles than Bread: And do also, in like Manner, exhort and charge all Persons who keep Horses, especially Horses for Pleasure, as far as their respective Circumstances will admit, carefully to restrict the Consumption of Oats and other Grain or the Subsistence of the same. And We do hereby further charge and command every Minister, in his respective Parish Church or Chapel, within the Kingdom of Great Britain, to read, or cause to be read, Our faid Proclamation, on the Lord's

Dzy, for Two successive Weeks after receiving the said Proclamation.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Third Day of December One thousand eight hundred, in the Forty-sirst Year of Our Reign.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS it has been represented to His Majesty at this Board that the Epidemic Fever which some Time since raged in the Town of Norfolk, in Virginia, and at Baltimore, in Maryland, within the United States of America, has totally ceased; His Majesty, taking the same into Confideration, and being defirous to remove all Restraints upon Trade so far as may be con-sistent with the Safety of his Subjects, is pleased, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Quarantine laid by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twelfth of November last upon all Ships, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes, which, since the First Day of the said Month of November had arrived, or which should thereafter arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from any of the Ports of Virginia or of Maryland, be taken off; and that all fuch Ships and Veffels be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings without unpacking, opening, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine, as freely as they might have done in case such Order of the Twelsth of November last had not been made; any Thing in the said Order contained to the contrary notwithstanding: Provided such Ships and Vessels shall have failed from the said Ports of Virginia or Maryland subfequent to the Fourth Day of November last, and that none of the Crew or other Persons on board have died or been fick with the faid Fever during the Course of the Voyage.-And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's

Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant Governor and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the faid respective Isles of Guernfey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respec-Steph. Herewith transmit a Letter which I have received from Captain King, of His Majesty's Ship Sirius, giving an Account of his having captured a Spanish Brig from Corunna bound to Monte

Beg Leave to acquaint you, that His Majesty's A Ship Sirius, under my Command, captured on the 11th Instant (Sisarga bearing W. by N. Three Miles) the Spanish Merchant Brig Melchura, from Corunna bound to Monte Video, out of Port only Twenty-four Hours. It may be some Satisfaction to your Lordship in hearing it is the only Spanish Vessel that has sailed from Corunna since the Ship taken by His Majesty's Ship Boadicea in August

Copy of a Letter from Lieutenant Matthew Smith, commanding His Majesty's Schooner Milbrook, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated Oporto, 14th November 1800.

Have the Honor to enclose, for their Lordships' Information, a Copy of a Letter I have this Day written to the Right Honorable Lord Keith. MATTHEW SMITH.

I am, &c.

His Majesty's Schooner Mibrook, off Oporto,
MY LORD, November 14, 1800. November 14, 1800.

Have the Honor to inform your Lordship, that being off Oporto, in His Majesty's Schooner Milbrook, under my Command, early on the Mornming of the 13th Infant we fell in with a French Ship wearing a Pendant, apparently a Frigate, mounting Thirty-fix Guns; and as I had at that Time Two Brigs of the Newfoundland Convoy under my Protection, and feveral Vessels appearing in the Offing, which I have every Reason to suppose Part of that Convoy also, I determined as the only Means of preserving them, to give her Battle, and made Sail to close with her accordingly; at the fame Time with a View of increasing our Distance from the Convoy.

It was nearly Calm when the Action commenced at Eight A. M. and continued till near Ten, when

the Enemy's Colours came down; but the Milbrook at this Time having her Masts, Yards, Sails, and Rigging very much cut, and Ten of her Guns difabled, I could not prevent his taking Advantage of a light Breeze springing up, assisted by his Sweeps,

to get away from us.

The Bravery and steady Conduct of the Officers and Seamen under my Command against such superior Force, in the disabled State of the Milbrook, for a long Time with only Three Guns opposed to the Enemy's Broadside, and their Activity in changing her Position with the Oars (not a Sail fet) whilst exposed to his raking us for Fifteen Minutes, merits my highest Commendation, and does them the greatest Credit; but I should fail in my Duty if I did not in the strongest Manner recommend to your Lordship's Notice Mr. Thomas Fletcher the Master, who, wounded in the Beginning of the Action, continued on Deck, exerting himself with the greatest Bravery; as did also Mr. Thomas Groves the Clerk, and Mr. Jose da Sa, the Portuguese Pilot.

Copy of a Letter from Mr. Richard Le Gallais, Com-mander of the Comus Private Ship of War, to Evan Nepean, Eff; dated at Jersey, the 20th Instant. SIR

Have the Honor to inform you, that being on a Cruize in the Comus Privateer, I captured, the 7th Instant, a French Chasse Marée, mounting Three Three-Pounders, laden with Hides; and the next Day, 8th Instant, after a Chase of Seven Hours, boarded and took Poffession of the French Brig Letter of Marque Rocou, pierced for Four-teen Guns, and had on board Twelve Six and Two Two-Pounders, but only Four Six-Pounders mounted, from Cayenne bound to Bourdeaux, laden with Cotton and Rice. I am happy to add the Brig is fafely arrived in Guernsey, and the Chasse Marée in this Island.
